# TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

- 1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office at the Bank of England on Friday, the 16th September 1921, at 1 o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the War Loan Acts, 1914 to 1919, to the amount of £45,000,000.
- 2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any date from Monday, the 19th September, to Saturday, the 24th September, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.
- 3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.
- 4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.
- 5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.
- 6. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than two o'clock (Saturday twelve o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills are dated.
- 7. In virtue of the provisions of Section 26 of the Finance Act, 1915, Members of the House

- of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.
- 8. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES (AS VARIED) FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS, EFFECTIVE AS FROM 9TH SEPTEMBER 1921 UNTIL 8TH JANUARY 1922.

Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in any case not later than 15th September 1921.

Note. — The method of remuneration prescribed in the foregoing proviso for a Weaving Mistress who has immediate responsibility for the instruction of not more than one Female Weaving Learner shall not apply in cases where a Weaving Mistress is engaged in instructing Learners of Weaving under a group system of instruction.

# PART III.

OVERTIME RATES (AS VARIED) FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS EMPLOYED ON TIME-WORK.

Section I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week ... ... 48
On any day (other than Saturday)  $8\frac{3}{4}$ On Saturday ... ...  $4\frac{1}{4}$ 

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

Section II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by Male or Female Workers employed on Time-Work in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows:—

- (a) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, as specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule, i.e., Double Time.
- (b) For Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable as specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule, i.e., Time-and-a-half.
- (c) For all time worked in any week, in excess of 48 hours, One-and-a-half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, as specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule, i.e., Time-and-a-half, except where a higher amount is payable under Sub-Section (a) of this Section.
- (d) The Overtime Rates shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) the number of hours worked exceed 8\frac{3}{4}, or in the case of Saturday exceeds 4\frac{1}{4}, notwithstanding

that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

Provided that in the case of those classes of workers in the Municipal Burgh of Brechin, the Parish of Brechin, the Municipal Burgh of Forfar, the Parish of Forfar, the Burgh of Kirriemuir, the Parish of Kirriemuir, the Parishes of Blairgowrie and Rattray, the Burgh of Carnoustie or the Parish of Logie Pert, who in accordance with the established practice of the establishment attend for nine hours per day on five days of the week and for three hours on Saturday, the Overtime Rate specified in Sub-Section (b) of this Section shall not be payable in respect of the first quarter of an hour in excess of 8\frac{3}{4} hours on any day except Saturdays, Sundays, and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, but shall be payable in respect of all hours worked on any such day in excess of nine hours.

Provided also that in the case of those classes of workers in the areas specified in the first proviso to this Section who, in accordance with the established practice of the establishment attend only on five days a week, the Overtime Rate specified in Sub-Section (b) of this Section shall not be payable in respect of the first three-quarters of an hour in excess of  $8\frac{3}{4}$  hours on any day except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, but shall be payable on any such day in respect of all hours worked in excess of  $9\frac{1}{2}$  hours.

Note.—The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

# PART IV.

The General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule are weekly rates based on a week of 48 hours, and are subject to a proportionate adjustment according as the number of hours of employment in any week is less than 48.

#### PART V.

For the purpose of this Notice a Female Weaving Learner means a Female Worker who is:

(a) Definitely and effectively learning weaving under the immediate instruction of a Weaving Mistress; and

(b) Employed under conditions such that she shall cease to be employed on time work, and shall be employed on piece-work at the earliest date practicable.

# PART VI.

The respective Minimum Rates set out in this Schedule shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Male and Female Workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, that is to say:—The preparing, spinning or weaving (a) of jute or (b) of jute and any other fibre, except flax or hemp;

(1) The preparing and spinning of waste

reclaimed at any stage; and

(2) All packing, despatching, warehousing, storing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the above-mentioned work; but

# Excluding-

(1) The calendering, bleaching, dyeing or finishing of any of the above-mentioned materials; and

- (2) The preparing or spinning of materials required for the making or re-making of (a) rope (including driving rope and banding), (b) cord (including blind and window cord, but excluding silk, worsted and other fancy cords), (c) core for wire ropes, (d) lines, (e) twine (including binder and trawl twine), (f) lanyards, (g) net and similar articles, when such preparing or spinning is carried on in the same factory or workshop as the said making or re-making; and
- (3) The making or repair of sacks or bags; and also
  - (4) The weaving of carpets, rugs or mats.

# PART VII.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

Section II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

# PART VIII.

The Trade Board further give notice that they have withdrawn their Notice J. (4) dated 26th August 1920, proposing to vary and fix certain Minimum Rates of Wages for Certain Classes of Female Workers in the County Borough of Bootle.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES (AS VARIED AND FIXED) FOR MALE WORKER'S AND (AS FIXED) FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

The rates as legally enforceable are set out in the Schedule below and are effective in the case of Male Workers as from 12th September 1921, and in the case of Female Workers from 26th May 1920:-

Should these dates not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days the rates become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in no case later than 18th September 1921, or 1st June 1920, respectively.

Provided that a Male Worker entering the trade as a Dresser, Stamper, Polisher, Planisher or Wheeler for the first time at or over the age of 21 may be employed, during the first three months of his employment, at a rate of 10s. per week less, and during the second three months of his employment at a rate of 5s. per week less than the minimum rate otherwise applicable as set out above.

Definitions.—For the purpose of the above rates the following definitions shall apply:-

Dressers.—A Dresser of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Dressing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Dresser of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Dresser and who turns, screws inside and out, files flat and square at the vice, and finishes his own work throughout.

A Dresser of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. as above defined, is also an expert in all processes or is a Charge Hand responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Stampers.—A Stamper of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Stamping and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade III. or Grade III. next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Stamper of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Stamper and is an expert in all processes, and who undertakes all classes of work of all strengths of metal used.

A Stamper of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. as above defined, is an expert in all classes of Stamping, Pressing and Cutting-out by hand or who is a Charge Hand responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Polishers.—A Polisher of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Polishing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Polisher of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Polisher and is an expert in all processes of any class of common work and can emery-bob and mop best work.

A Polisher of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. as above defined, is also an expert in all processes of both common and best work or is a Charge Hand responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Planishers or Wheelers.—A Planisher or Wheeler of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on Planishing or Wheeling and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. next hereinafter respectively defined.

A Planisher or Wheeler of Grade II. is a Male

Workers of Grade II. as hereinafter defined, | Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Planisher or Wheeler and is an expert in all processes and is able to go good class work.

> A Planisher or Wheeler of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. as above defined, is employed in making Mitred Breast Plates or Handled Plates of any design.

- B.—Workers of under 21 years of age—
  - 1. Workers under 15 years of age, 14s. per week of 47 hours.

  - (b) Who have had 1 year's and less than 2 years' experience in the Cerement-Making Section of the Trade, 8d. per hour.
  - (c) Who have had not less than 2 years' experience in the Cerement-Making Section of the Trade, 8½d. per hour.
  - Provided that with respect to workers of 24 years of age or over who have had not less then 4 years' experience in the Cerement-Making Section of the Trade the minimum rate payable shall be 9d. per hour.

SECTION VIII. Pinkers—The General Minimum Time-Rates for Female Pinkers shall be those set out in Section VII. above, with the addition thereto of 1d. per hour in each case.

SECTION IX.—Choppers.—The General Minimum Time-Rates for Female Choppers shall be those set out in Section VII. above, with the addition thereto of ½d. per hour in each case.

# PART II.

PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

Section I.—The Coffin Furniture Section of the Trade.—The Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for Male and Female Piece-Workers in the Coffin Furniture Section of the Trade specified in Part IV. of this Schedule shall be as follows:—

- (i) For all Male Workers of 21 years of age and over: 12½ per cent. above the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate as set out in Sections I. and II. of Part I. of this Schedule.
- (ii) For all Female Workers of 18 years of age and over: 15 per cent. above the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate as set out in Sections III., IV., and V. of Part I. of this Schedule.

The Cerement-Making Section of the Trade.—

The Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for all Female Piece-Workers of 18 years of age and over employed in the Cerement-Making Section of the Trade specified in Part IV. of this Schedule shall be 1d. per hour higher than the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate as set out in Sections VII., VIII., and IX. of Part I. of this Schedule.

SECTION II.—In cases where a worker is employed on Piece-Work each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate or, in the case of male workers under 21 years of age and in the case of female workers under 18 years of age, not less than the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate.

#### PART III.

OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS (ALL AGES).

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week (exclusive of Sunday and any Customary Public or Statutory Holidays) . . . . . . 47
On any day other than Saturday . . . . . . 9
On Saturday . . . . . 5

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

Section II.—The Overtime Rates in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall, in the case of workers employed on Time-work, be as follows:—

- (a) For all time worked on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays. the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-half, and
- (b) For all time worked on Sundays, the Overtime Rate shall be twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Double-time.
- (c) For all other Overtime worked, oneand-a-fifth times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-fifth.

The Overtime Rates shall be payable in respect of all hours worked in excess of 5 on a Saturday and in respect of all hours worked in excess of 9 on any other day (not being a Sunday or Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 47.

SECTION III.—The Minimum Rates for overtime in respect of each hour of overtime as defined above, worked by workers employed on Piece-Work shall be:—

(a) For all time worked on Sundays, Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to

- an Ordinary worker at least the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, or where no Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate has been fixed the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable, with the addition of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable as set out above.
- (b) For all time worked on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker at least the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, or where no Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate has been fixed the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable, with the addition of one-half of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable as set out above.
- (c) For all other overtime worked, Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker at least the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, or where no Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate has been fixed the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable, with the addition of one-fifth of the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable as set out above.

N.B.—The hours which Female Workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

# PART IV.

The Minimum Rates of Wages for Male and Female Workers set out in Parts I., II., and III. of this Schedule shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Coffin Furniture and Cerement-Making) Order, 1919, that is to say:—

- (a) The manufacture, wherever carried on, of Coffin Furniture from any metal by any process.
- (b) The manufacture of Cerements, including shrouds, face curtains, face cloths, sidecloths, winding sheets, pillow covers, coffin pads, sleeves or frilling.

Including—

(c) The operations of folding, packing, warehousing, despatching or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of any of the above-mentioned articles.
