TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office at the Bank of England on Friday, the 14th October 1921, at 1 o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877; the National Debt Act, 1889; and the War Loan Acts, 1914 to 1919, to the amount of £60,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any date from Monday, the 17th October, to Saturday, the 22nd October, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London banker, discount house or broker.

6. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of cash

or a banker's draft on the Bank of England not later than two o'clock (Saturday twelve o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills are dated.

7. In virtue of the provisions of Section 26 of the Finance Act, 1915, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

8. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

AERATED WATERS TRADE BOARD (ENGLAND AND WALES).

PROPOSAL TO VARY MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established in England and Wales under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Aerated Waters Trade, as specified in the Trade Boards (Aerated Waters) Order, 1919, hereby give notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to vary the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers as set out in the Schedule to their Notice A (2) dated 30th April 1920, and effective under an Order of the Minister of Labour dated 26th April 1920, and to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates in substitution for those declared and set out in the Notice A (2) referred to above, the variations proposed and the proposed normal number of hours of work in the trade being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

PART I.

Provided that a Male or Female Worker who enters the trade for the first time at the age of 15 years or over and is employed on Time-Work shall until the expiry of two months employment in the trade be paid at the rate of not less than three-quarters of the General Minimum Time-Rate which would otherwise be applicable according to his or her age under Sub-Sections (a) and (b) of this Section.

SECTION II.—The above proposed General Minimum Time-Rates are Weekly Rates based on a week of 48 hours and shall be subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours spent by the worker in the factory or workshop under contract of employment in any week is less than 48.

PART II.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES.

In the case of all Workers employed on Piece-Work each Piece-Rate paid shall be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate to an Ordinary Worker, *i.e.*, a worker of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question.

PART III.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES—MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS—(ALL AGES).

SECTION I.—In substitution for the declared normal number of hours of Work in the trade, as set out in Section I. of Part III. of the Trade Board's Notice A (2), dated 30th April 1920, the Trade Board propose to declare in accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week	48
On Saturday	4½

Provided that any other day, not being Sunday, may, by agreement in writing between an employer and a worker, be substituted in the place of Saturday, as the weekly short day, and in such case the normal number of hours on such substituted day shall be 4½.

Provided also that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and on Statutory Bank Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime, to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—In lieu of the Minimum Rates for Overtime set out in Section II. of Part III. of the Trade Board's Notice A (2), dated 30th April 1920, and effective under an Order of the Minister of Labour, dated 26th April 1920, Overtime Rates for all Male and Female Workers, whether employed on Time-Work or on Piece-Work in excess of the normal number of hours of work in the trade proposed to be declared by the Trade Board in Section I. of this Part of this Notice shall be as follows, that is to say:—

- (1) For all time worked on Sundays and Statutory Bank Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Double-Time, that is to say, twice the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable.
- (2) For all time worked in excess of 4½ hours on a Saturday (or on the weekly short day substituted therefore under the terms of the first Proviso to Section I. of this Part of this Notice) the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Time-and-a-Half, that is to say, one-and-a-half times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week may not exceed 48.
- (3) For all time worked in excess of 48 hours in any week the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Time-and-a-Quarter for the first two hours, and Time-and-a-Half thereafter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (1) and (2) of this Section.

PART IV.

The above proposed variations shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in England and Wales who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Aerated Waters) Order, 1919, and set out in Part IV. of the Trade Boards Notice A (2), dated 30th April 1920.

NOTE.—The employment of female workers, young persons and children is subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and to the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above proposal to vary which may be lodged with them within two months from 8th October 1921. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address) and should be sent to the Secretary of the Aerated Waters Trade Board (England and Wales), 7-11 Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4. It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

RETAIL BESPOKE TAILORING TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES (AS VARIED AND FIXED) FOR MALE AND FEMALE LEARNERS AND CERTAIN CLASSES OF MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS IN THE RETAIL BESPOKE SECTION OF THE TAILORING TRADE. EFFECTIVE AS FROM 10TH OCTOBER 1921.

Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days the rates become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in any case not later than 16th October 1921.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE LEARNERS AND A CERTAIN OTHER CLASS OF MALE WORKERS.

SECTION I.

General Minimum Time-Rates for Male Learners.

(A) Male Learners (as defined in Part III. of this Schedule):—

For the 1st year of Learnership, 12s. per week of 48 hours.

For the 2nd year of Learnership, 15s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

For the 3rd year of Learnership, 21s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

For the 4th year of Learnership, 30s. per week of 48 hours.

For the 5th year of Learnership, 40s. per week of 48 hours.

General Minimum Time-Rates for Female Learners.

(B) Female Learners (as defined in Part III. of this Schedule):—

For the 1st year of Learnership, 10s. per week of 48 hours.

For the 2nd year of Learnership, 15s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

For the 3rd year of Learnership, 21s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

For the 4th year of Learnership, 27s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

In the application of the above General Minimum Time-Rates the following provisions shall apply:—

Experience of Learners prior to 14 to be disregarded.

(a) In determining the year of learnership of a Male or Female Learner all employment of the Learner prior to the age of 14 shall be disregarded. The General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to a Learner under 14 shall be the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate for the first year of learnership.

Previous experience in Tailoring and Mantle Trades to be counted.

(b) Any Male or Female Learner who has been previously employed in (i) any branch of Retail Bespoke Tailoring as defined in Section II. of Part V. of this Schedule or

(ii) any branch of Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring coming within the scope of the Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain), or (iii) any branch of the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade Board (Great Britain), shall be entitled subject to the provisions of paragraph (a) of this Section, to count the whole period of such previous employment.

Proportion of previous experience in Schools or Institutions to be counted in the case of Male Workers.

(c) In the case of a Male Learner who, prior to being registered as a Learner under the provisions of this Notice, has received continuous instruction in Retail Bespoke Tailoring at any School or Institution where there is a class for Retail Bespoke Tailoring which is approved by the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain), every two School or Institutional years during which the Learner has been so instructed at any such School or Institution shall, for the purposes of this Notice and subject to the provisions of paragraph (a) of this Section, be reckoned as one year of Learnership.

Completion of Learnership.

(d) (i) A Female Learner shall cease to be a Learner and shall be entitled to the Minimum Rate applicable to her under the provisions of the Notice R.B. (7) issued by the Trade Board and dated 8th October 1920, upon the completion of four years' learnership.

(ii) A Male Learner shall cease to be a Learner and shall be entitled to the Minimum Rate applicable to him under the provisions of the Notice R.B. (4) issued by the Trade Board and dated 4th June 1920, upon the completion of five years' learnership. Provided that in determining whether for the purposes of Section I. of Part I. of the Trade Board's Notice R.B. (4), dated 4th June 1920, a Male Worker has completed a period of five years' learnership, any previous experience in Retail Bespoke Tailoring in any School or Institution specified in paragraph (c) of this Section, shall be reckoned in accordance with the provisions of such paragraph.

SECTION II.

General Minimum Time-Rates for Certain Male Workers.

All Male Workers employed in any branch of Retail Bespoke Tailoring specified in Section II. of Part V. of this Schedule, excluding (i) Cutters and Trimmers, (ii) Workers specified in Part I. of the Trade Board's Notice R.B. (4), dated 4th June 1920, (iii) Apprentices whose indentures (a) were made prior to the 10th October 1921, and (b) provide for the Apprentice being supplied by the employer with board or with board and lodging, (iv) Apprentices specified in the Trade Board's Notice R.B. (11), dated 8th October 1921, and (v) Learners specified in Section I. (A) of this Part of this Schedule—1s. 2d. per hour.

SECTION III.

General Minimum Time-Rates based on a week of 48 hours.

The General Minimum Time-Rates for Learners set out in Section I. of this Part of this Schedule are weekly rates based on a week of 48 hours, and shall be subject to a proportionate decrease according as the number of hours of employment in any week is less than 48.

PART II.

OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE LEARNERS AND A CERTAIN OTHER CLASS OF MALE WORKERS.

Calculation of Overtime Rates.

Overtime Rates, calculated on the General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Part I. of this Schedule as follows:—

- (a) For Male Learners and the class of Male Workers specified in Section II. of Part I. of this Schedule, in the manner specified in the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice R.B. (6), dated 15th July 1920,
- (b) For Female Learners in the manner specified in Part II. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice R.B. (7), dated 8th October 1920,

shall apply in substitution for the rates set out in Part I. of this Schedule in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in their said Notices R.B. (6) and R.B. (7) respectively to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

PART III.

For the purpose of this Notice, and subject to the provisions of Section I. of Part I. of this Schedule, the following definition shall apply:—

Definition of Male and Female Learners and conditions under which they must be employed.

A Male or Female Learner is a worker who, in the case of a Male Learner, has not been employed for more than Five years, and in the case of a Female Learner, has not been employed for more than Four years, in the Retail Bespoke Section of the Tailoring Trade as specified in Section II. of Part V. of this Schedule, and:—

- (a) Is employed during the whole or a substantial part of his or her time in learning any branch or process of Retail Bespoke Tailoring as specified in Section II. of Part V. of this Schedule by an employer who provides the Learner with reasonable facilities for such learning, and
- (b) Has received a certificate, or has been registered in accordance with Rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board or has made an application for such certificate or registration, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration.

Provided that the certification or registration of a Learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided also that an Employer may employ a Learner on his or her first employment in any branch of Retail Bespoke Tailoring, as specified in Section II. of Part V. of this Schedule without a certificate or registration for a probationary

period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such Learner being continued thereafter at his or her employment the probation period shall be included in his or her period of learnership.

Notwithstanding compliance with the conditions specified in this part of this Schedule, a person shall not be deemed to be a Learner if he or she works in a room used for dwelling purposes, and is not in the employment of his or her parent or guardian.

PART IV.

The Trade Board have varied the Minimum Rates of Wages at present effective for Male and Female Workers in their application to certain classes of workers as follows:—

Exclusion of certain Packers from Minimum Rates.

- (a) By excluding Packers from the operation of the Minimum Rates of Wages for Male and Female Workers set out in the Schedules to the Trade Board's Notices R.B. (4), R.B. (5), R.B. (6) and R.B. (7) respectively, dated the 4th June 1920, the 19th June 1920, the 15th July 1920, and the 8th October 1920, except where they are employed on Packing operations which are performed in a workroom.

Exclusion of certain Female Apprentices from General Minimum Time-Rates for certain Adult Female Workers.

- (b) By excluding from the operation of the General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Section III. (a) of Part I. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice R.B. (7), dated 8th October 1920, Female Apprentices specified in Sections I. and III. of Part II. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice R.B. (11), dated 8th October 1921.

Exclusion of certain Female Apprentices from Minimum Rates for Female Workers.

- (c) By excluding Learners from the operation of Section II. of Part IV. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice R.B. (7) dated 8th October 1920, so that the provisions of such Section shall apply only to Female Apprentices who have entered or shall enter the trade under 21 years of age, and who are employed under a contract in writing entered into prior to the 10th October 1921, providing for their effective instruction for a period of not less than three years by a fully qualified tailor or tailoress in making a bespoke garment throughout and by including such Learners within the scope of the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate for Female Workers set out in Section III. (c) of Part I. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice R.B. (7), dated 8th October 1920.

PART V.

SECTION I.

Applicability of Minimum Rates.

Subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, the respective Minimum Rates of Wages set out in this Schedule apply to all Male and

Female Workers in Great Britain of the classes specified in this Schedule in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of Retail Bespoke Tailoring, as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, and dated 12th December 1919, and set out below.

SECTION II.

Definition of the Retail Bespoke Section of the Tailoring Trade to which the Trade Boards Acts apply.

The Section of the Tailoring Trade specified in the above-mentioned Regulations is as follows :

Those branches of Men's, Women's, Boys' and Girls' Bespoke Tailoring in which the tailor supplies the garment direct to the individual wearer and employs the worker direct.

A worker shall be deemed to be employed by the tailor direct, if employed by another worker in the employ of the tailor, to whom a Minimum Rate of Wages fixed under the Trade Boards Acts is applicable, or if employed by a sub-contractor engaged in cutting, making or finishing garments exclusively for the tailor in the tailor's shop, or in a building of which the shop forms part or to which the shop is attached ;

including :—

- (1) (a) The altering, repairing, renovating, or re-making of Men's, Women's, Boys' or Girls' Tailored Garments where carried out for the individual wearer by a tailor who employs the worker direct as defined above.
- (b) The cleaning of such garments where carried on in association with, or in conjunction with, the repairing, renovating, or re-making of the garments ;
- (2) The lining with fur of the above-mentioned garments where carried out in association with, or in conjunction with, the making of such garments.
- (3) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework where carried out in association with, or in conjunction with, the above-mentioned branches of tailoring ;
- (4) the packing and all other operations incidental to, or appertaining to, any of the above-mentioned branches of tailoring,

but excluding :—

- (1) All or any of the above-mentioned operations where carried on in a factory where garments are made up for three or more retail establishments ;
- (2) The making of headgear.

NOTE.—The employment of Women, Young Persons and Children is subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and to the provisions of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART VI.

SECTION I.

Minimum Rates to be paid clear of Deductions.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.

Minimum Rates without prejudice to Workers earning higher Rates.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made, or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these Minimum Rates of Wages.

Coats, 5 years.

Coats, Trousers, Breeches and Waistcoats,
5 years.

FEMALE APPRENTICES.

Periods of Apprenticeship.

Garment or Garments—

- Coats, 5 years.
- Coats and Skirts, 5 years.
- Skirts and Waistcoats, 4 years.
- Trousers and Waistcoats, 4 years.
- Skirts, 3 years.
- Waistcoats, 3 years.
- Trousers and Breeches, 3 years.

MALE AND FEMALE APPRENTICES.

Periods of Apprenticeship.

Garment or Garments—

Any other combination of Garments not specified in this part of this Schedule, 5 years,

and

- (b) Has been registered with the Trade Board in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, or has made application for such registration, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration.

Provided that :—

- (i) The registration may be cancelled if the other conditions of apprenticeship are not complied with.
- (ii) An employer may employ a worker at the rates and under the conditions specified in this Schedule for apprentices without registration for a probationary period not exceeding three months, but in the event of such worker being continued thereafter at his or her employment as an apprentice, the probationary period shall be included in his or her period of apprenticeship.

Proportion of previous Experience in Schools or Institutions to be Counted in the Case of Male Apprentices.

Provided also that :—

If a Male Apprentice, prior to being registered as an Apprentice under the provisions of this Schedule, has received continuous instruction in Retail Bespoke Tailoring at any Institution or School where there is a class for Retail Bespoke Tailoring which is approved by the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain), the period of apprenticeship applicable as specified in this part of this Schedule shall, in such a case, be reduced by one year for every two School or Institutional years during which the Apprentice has been so instructed subsequent to his attaining the age of 14 years, and that every two School or Institutional years during which the Apprentice has been so instructed at any such School or Institution shall be reckoned as one year of apprenticeship for the purpose of ascertaining the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to him under the provisions of this Notice during the period of his apprenticeship. In determining whether for the purposes of Section I. of Part I. of the Trade Board's Notice (R.B. 4) dated 4th June 1920, a male apprentice has completed a period of five years' apprenticeship, any such previous experience in Retail Bespoke

Tailoring in any such School or Institution shall be reckoned in accordance with this proviso.

- During the fourth year of their Apprenticeship, 7s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.
- During the fifth year of their Apprenticeship, 14s. per week of 48 hours.

SECTION II.

General Minimum Time-Rates for Male Apprentices not Supplied with Board or with Full Board and Lodging.

Male Apprentices (as defined in Part I. of this Schedule) other than Male Apprentices as specified in Section I. of this Part of this Schedule :—

General Minimum Time-Rates.

- During the first year of their Apprenticeship, 10s. per week of 48 hours.
- During the second year of their Apprenticeship, 12s. per week of 48 hours.
- During the third year of their Apprenticeship, 17s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.
- During the fourth year of their Apprenticeship, 25s. per week of 48 hours.
- During the fifth year of their Apprenticeship, 35s. per week of 48 hours.

Provided that, notwithstanding anything contained in this Notice, Male Apprentices who are registered with the Trade Board as Apprentices under the provisions of Section II. of Part I. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice (R.B.4) dated 4th June 1920, prior to the 10th October 1921, shall be entitled to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rates specified in such

Section during the continuance of their apprenticeship in accordance with the conditions specified therein.

Provided also that on and after the said 10th October 1921, the provisions of Section II. of Part I. of the Schedule to the said Notice R.B.4. shall cease to apply to any Male Apprentices other than those so registered with the Trade Board prior to the 10th October 1921.

- (e) That if the Employers [or the survivor of them shall die or become permanently incapacitated through illness or injury to be certified by a duly-qualified medical practitioner or ‡] shall cease to carry on said the trade of Retail Bespoke Tailoring before the expiration of the said term of apprenticeship the Employers [or the survivor of them or their/his Executors or Administrators as the case may be‡]

- (2) The making of head-gear.

The Minimum Rates of Wages set out in this Schedule shall be paid direct to the Apprentice by the Employers.

SECTION III.

Minimum Rates to be Paid clear of Deductions.

The Minimum Rates of Wages set out in this Schedule shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or under the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION IV.

Minimum Rates not to apply to certain Apprentices apprenticed prior to.

Subject to the provisions of Section II. of Part II. of this Schedule, nothing in this Schedule shall apply to Apprentices employed under an Indenture or Contract in writing respectively entered into prior to the 10th October 1921, providing for the effective instruction of the Apprentice in making one or more of the garments specified in Part I. of this Schedule.
