The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Representation of the People Acts, 1918 to 1921, power is conferred on His Majesty to make provision for various matters by Order in Council.

And whereas by the Representation of the People Order His Majesty was pleased, by Order in Council to make provision for various matters under those Acts :

And whereas by Section 40 (2) of the Representation of the People Act, 1918, any Order in Council made thereunder may be revoked or varied as occasion requires by any subsequent Order in Council :

And whereas it is expedient that the Representation of the People Order should be amended in the manner hereinafter appearing :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon Him by those Acts and of all other powers enabling Him in that behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. The following forms shall be substituted for the forms under Heading I. in Schedule II. to the Representation of the People Order :—

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

LAUNDRY TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PROPOSAL TO VARY MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF MALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, for that branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919, as varied by the Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919, the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920, and the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchiefs and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods), Order, 1920, hereby give notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to Vary the General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates at present fixed for certain classes of Male Workers, as set out in their Notice W. (3), dated 7th July 1920, as shown in the Schedule set out below.

## SECTION II.

The proposed General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Section I. of this Part of this Schedule are subject to the proviso that in the case of workers who return to the trade after an absence of not less than four years, the minimum rates payable to such workers unless they had previously had a period of unbroken experience in the trade of not less than one year's duration, shall be those applicable under Section I. to workers of the same age, who have had no previous experience in the Industry.

### PART II.

#### PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE WASH-HOUSE AND GENERAL INSIDE WORKERS EMPLOYED ON TIME-WORK.

##### SECTION I.

The Trade Board propose to declare in accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the normal number of hours of work in the Trade to be as follows:—

In any week ... ..	48
On Saturday ... ..	5

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

##### SECTION II.

In lieu of the Overtime Rates at present fixed the proposed Minimum Rates for Overtime to apply in respect of all hours worked by Time-Workers in excess of the normal number of hours of work in the trade proposed to be declared, as set out in Section I., shall be as follows:—

(a) For all hours worked in excess of 5 on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter, for the first four hours, and One-and-a-Half Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half thereafter, notwithstanding that the total

number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(b) For all time worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.* Double Time, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(c) For all hours worked in excess of 48 in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be Time-and-a-Quarter for the first six hours and Time-and-a-Half thereafter except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of Sub-Sections (a) and (b) of this Section.

(d) The Overtime Rates shall not apply to Piece-workers.

Provided that, where, in the case of Workers to whom the Shops Act applies, the day which under that Act constitutes the weekly short day (half holiday) is a day other than Saturday, and in the case of other Workers another day is substituted for Saturday, under the provisions of Section 43 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, as respects Female Workers and Young Persons, the above provisions shall apply as though such half holiday or short day were substituted for Saturday and Saturday were substituted for such half holiday or short day.

Provided also that in cases in which another day is substituted for a Statutory Holiday under the provisions of Section 35 of the Factory Act, 1901, the above provisions shall apply as though such other day were the Statutory Holiday and the Statutory Holiday were an ordinary working day.

## PART III.

## SECTION I.

The Minimum Rates set out in this Notice shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Male Wash-House and General Inside Workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919 (that is to say, the laundering of articles of every description and all processes and operations incidental thereto performed by the way of trade or for the purpose of gain) as varied by the Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919, the Trade Boards (Shirt-making) Order, 1920, and the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen and Piece Goods) Order, 1920, by virtue of which all processes of laundering and other similar operations incidental to or appertaining to the making of the articles specified in the Appendices to the three last-mentioned Orders are excluded from the scope of the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919.

Provided that the Minimum Rates set out in this Notice shall not apply to Male Workers wholly or mainly employed as Transport Workers, Enginemens or Stokers.

## SECTION II.

The Minimum Rates set out in this Notice shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

## SECTION III.

The Minimum Rates set out in this Notice are without prejudice to Workers earning higher rates of wages.

\* NOTE.—The General Minimum Time-Rates as at present fixed and set out above are for a week not exceeding 48 hours, and save as provided in Section V. hereof no deductions shall be made from such rates where the number of hours of work in a week is less than 48 except:—

(a) Where the worker is absent without the permission of the employer or at his own request or in order to comply with an obligation imposed by Law, or through being incapacitated from work by illness or other cause, or during any customary local holidays.

(b) Where, at his own desire, it is agreed that any worker shall be regularly employed for a less period than the full working week of the Laundry.

(c) Where, in pursuance of an agreement made in writing between an employer and the workers affected (and registered with the Trade Board) it is provided that by reason of seasonal trade, or for any cause not within the control of the employer, short time is regularly to be worked for any period commencing not less than seven days after the date of such agreement.

(d) Where in any week a worker is required to stand off for not less than a quarter of the normal working week of the Laundry by reason of a stoppage of work caused by a breakdown in machinery, a stoppage in supplies of water, gas, electric current or fuel, a general breakdown in transport services or other similar emergency over which the employer has no control. Provided that this clause shall not operate until the expiration of at least seven days from the date on which notice so to stand off is given to the worker by the employer.

In such cases a proportionate deduction may be made according as the number of hours worked is less than the full working week of the Laundry when not on short time.

Provided that for the purpose of calculating the proportionate deduction under the provisions of the foregoing clause, no deduction shall be made in respect of absence from work on any day during which the Laundry is closed by reason of such day being a holiday allowed to female workers under the provisions of Section 35 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, except where in any week in which such holiday occurs the worker without reasonable and sufficient cause absents himself for more than two hours during the period in which he had the opportunity of working.

† The General Minimum Time-Rates at present fixed and set out in the first column under paragraphs (a) and (b) of this Proviso apply to workers entering the trade at the ages shown.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposals to vary which may be lodged with them within two months from 9th November 1921. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Laundry Trade Board (Great Britain), 7-11 Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible, with reasons, what is objected to.

## THE EXPLOSIVES IN COAL MINES ORDER OF THE 9TH NOVEMBER 1921.

In pursuance of the power conferred upon them by Section 61 of the Coal Mines Act, 1911,\* and under the provisions of the Mining Industry Act, 1920,† the Board of Trade hereby make the following Order:—

(1) The Explosives in Coal Mines Order of the 1st September 1913,‡ as amended by the Explosives in Coal Mines Orders of subsequent dates, shall be amended and shall take effect as if the explosive named and defined in the Schedule to this Order were named and defined in the First Schedule to that Order, and in all respects as if the Schedule to this Order formed part of the First Schedule to that Order.

(2) This Order may be cited as the Explosives in Coal Mines Order of the 9th November 1921.

- which may be used in any one shot-hole shall not exceed 36 ounces;\*
- (4) That the explosive has been made at the works of the Miners' Safety Explosive Company Limited, at Stanford-le-Hope, in the County of Essex;
  - (5) That the explosive is in all respects similar to the sample submitted to test on the 27th and 28th days of September 1921;
  - (6) That each cartridge, in addition to any marking required in the Third Schedule to this Order, shall also be clearly marked with the words "Not more than 36 ounces in any one shot-hole"; and
  - (7) That in addition to the marking on the outer package required by an Order of the Secretary of State, made under the Explosives Act, 1875, and in force for the time being, such outer package shall bear the words "As defined in the List of Permitted Explosives"; and, further, that each inner package shall be clearly marked with the words "Permitted Explosive, to be used only with not less than No. 6 detonator," and also with the name of the explosive, the name of the manufacturer, the date and place of manufacture, and the nature and proportion of the ingredients.

Four ounces of Tyne Powder gave a swing of 2.56 inches to the Ballistic Pendulum compared with a swing of 3.27 inches given by four ounces of Gelnite containing 60 per cent. of nitro-glycerine.

(Construction of New and Abandonment of Authorised Works; Incidental Works and Powers; Rates Tolls Charges and Dues; Increase of Existing Rates Tolls Charges and Dues; Amendment and Extension of Powers and Provisions of Portknockie Harbour Order, 1913; Assessment on Owners and Occupiers of Property; Borrowing Powers and other Financial Provisions; Amendment Repeal and Incorporation of Acts and Orders; Miscellaneous and Incidental Provisions.)

NOTICE is hereby given that application is intended to be made to the Minister of Transport on or before the 23rd day of December 1921 for a Provisional Order (hereinafter called

“the Order”) pursuant to the provisions of the General Pier and Harbour Act 1861 and the General Pier and Harbour Act 1861 Amendment Act 1862 by the Provost, Magistrates, and Councillors of the Burgh of Portknockie in the County of Banff (hereinafter called “the Town Council”) for all or some of the following powers and purposes (that is to say) :—

To empower the Town Council to construct and maintain in connection with the Portknockie Harbour Undertaking of the Town Council (hereinafter referred to as “the Harbour Undertaking”) the following works (that is to say) :—

WORK No. 1.—An extension seawards of solid construction of the existing South Pier in a direction approximately North for a distance of fifty feet or thereabouts commencing at the northern end of the said existing Pier and terminating on the bed of the sea.

WORK No. 2.—A solid wall or quay and roadway commencing by a junction with the said South Pier at a point distant one hundred and

ninety feet or thereabouts measured along the eastern face of the said South Pier from the seaward end thereof and extending in a direction approximately South for a distance of eighty feet or thereabouts then in a direction approximately East for a distance of one hundred and ninety feet or thereabouts then in a direction approximately North for a distance of sixty-five feet or thereabouts and there terminating by a junction with the existing Jetty at a point distant one hundred and seventy feet or thereabouts measured along the west face of the said Jetty from the seaward end thereof.

**WORK NO. 3.**—The excavation of and formation of a slope over the area bounded on the west by the existing South Pier on the South by the said proposed wall or quay and roadway (Work No. 2) on the East by the said existing jetty and on the North by an imaginary straight line drawn in a Westerly direction from a point on the said existing jetty 137 feet or thereabouts measured from the Northern end thereof to a point on the Eastern face of the existing South Pier 170 feet or thereabouts measured from the Northern end thereof; and also the excavation to a depth of three feet below the level of low water of ordinary spring tides of the area bounded on the West by the said South Pier on the South by the last-mentioned imaginary straight line on the East in part by the said existing jetty and in part by the proposed extension thereof (Work No. 4 hereinafter described) and on the North by an imaginary straight line drawn in an Easterly direction from the North Easternmost corner of the existing South Pier to the said proposed extension of the existing jetty.

**WORK NO. 5.**—A solid pier commencing on the southern side of the existing North Pier at a point one hundred and eighty feet or thereabouts measured along that pier in an easterly direction from the junction therewith of the North Breakwater and extending in a direction approximately South for a distance of fifty feet or thereabouts and terminating on the bed of the sea.

**WORK NO. 6.**—A solid wall or quay and roadway commencing by a junction with the existing wall and roadway at the southern end of the existing Jetty at a point opposite or nearly opposite the existing weighbridge and extending approximately in the direction of the curved line of the existing road on the southern and eastern sides of the Harbour for a distance of six hundred feet or thereabouts and terminating by a junction with the quay and roadway at the commencement of the existing North Pier.

**WORK NO. 7.**—The excavation of and formation of slopes over the area bounded on the West in part by the existing jetty and in part by an imaginary curved line approximately parallel to the line of the said proposed wall or quay and roadway (Work No. 6) and distant therefrom 200 feet or thereabouts, on the North by the existing quay and roadway leading to the North Pier, and on the East, South-East, and

South, by the said proposed wall or quay and roadway (Work No. 6); and the excavation to a depth of three feet below the level of low water of ordinary spring tides of the area bounded on the North by the said existing quay and roadway leading to the North Pier on the East and South by the aforesaid imaginary curved line and on the West in part by the said existing jetty, in part by the said proposed extension of that Jetty (Work No. 4), in part by an imaginary straight line drawn from the North Westernmost corner of the said proposed Work No. 4 to the South Westernmost corner of the proposed Pier (Work No. 5) hereinbefore described, and in part by the said proposed Work No. 5.

The said works will be situate in the Parish of Rathven Burgh of Portknockie and County of Banff and in the bed of the Portknockie Hythe and the foreshore thereof being part of the Moray Firth.

To authorise the Town Council in connection with the proposed works or any of their existing harbour works and also upon any lands for the time being belonging to them or under their control to construct and maintain all necessary approaches roads communications steps slips slipways embankments walls fences landing places quays wharves staiths beacons buoys dolphins moorings rails tramways sidings and other works conveniences and appliances necessary or convenient for or ancillary or incidental to the said proposed works or the Harbour Undertaking.

To authorise the Town Council to deviate laterally and vertically from the lines and levels of the said works as shown upon the plans and sections to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned.

To provide that the works to be authorised by the Order and any subsidiary or other works constructed or provided by the Town Council under the powers of the Order shall form part of the Harbour Undertaking and to provide that the Town Council may in respect of any such works or the use thereof take such tolls rates charges or dues as are now authorised to be taken by them or such increased or other tolls rates charges or dues as may be authorised to be taken by them under the Order.

To empower the Town Council to purchase by agreement and to hold lands for the purposes of the proposed works and other Harbour works of the Town Council and for the future development of the Harbour Undertaking and other the purposes of the Order and to dispose of lands not required for the purposes of the Harbour Undertaking.

To provide for the abandonment of the works authorised by Sections 15 and 16 of the Portknockie Harbour Order 1913 (hereinafter referred to as "the Order of 1913") scheduled to and confirmed by the Pier and Harbour Orders Confirmation (No. 2) Act 1913 and more particularly described in Section 16 of the Order of 1913.

To extend to the works proposed to be authorised by the Order the provisions or some of the provisions of the Order of 1913 including among other provisions the provisions of that Order with reference to the construction provision maintenance and repair of incidental works conveniences apparatus and appliances; the construction and maintenance of warehouses offices buildings and machinery and the laying down and mainten-

ance of rails tramways sidings and turntables ; the dredging scouring deepening excavation and improvement of the Harbour and the entrances channels and approaches thereto ; the removal appropriation sale and disposal of rock stone shingle sand mud and other materials and the provision or hire of steam or other dredgers engines tugs lighters and other vessels plant and apparatus.

To authorise the Town Council to make by-laws and regulations for the regulation of the Harbour Undertaking and of the proposed works and to make provision for the enforcement of such by-laws and regulations by penalties or otherwise and for the recovery thereof.

To provide that the proposed works shall be deemed for all purposes to be within the Police Burgh of Portknockie.

To provide for increasing the rates tolls dues and charges specified in the Schedule to the Order of 1913 and to provide for the recovery of such increased rates dues tolls and charges.

To make provisions with reference to the application and appropriation of the tolls rates charges dues and other revenue derived from the Harbour Undertaking.

To confer further financial powers upon the Town Council including the provision or raising of moneys required for the purposes of the Order of 1913 or of the intended Order or otherwise for the purposes of the Harbour Undertaking and to authorise the provision of moneys for the purposes aforesaid out of the revenue of the Harbour Undertaking or in the event of the said Revenue being insufficient out of moneys to be raised by means of the Assessment hereinafter referred to.

To authorise the Town Council for the purposes aforesaid to charge the owners and occupiers of lands or premises within the Burgh of Portknockie with an assessment and to provide for the levy and recovery of such assessment in the same manner as the General Improvement Rate authorised by the Burgh Police (Scotland) Acts 1892 to 1911 and any Act or Acts amending those Acts or otherwise as may be provided by the Order.

To authorise the Town Council to borrow further moneys for the purposes of the Harbour Undertaking and of the said Order of 1913 and of the intended Order upon the security of the Revenue of the Harbour Undertaking or upon the said assessment or upon the said Revenue and the said assessment or upon such other security as may be prescribed by the intended Order.

To make provision with reference to various financial matters and among other things with reference to the taking of credit by the Town Council from Banks and Banking Companies the formation of a Contingency Fund and the amount thereof ; sinking funds for repayment of borrowed money ; and the borrowing re-borrowing and repayment of moneys.

To make all such provisions as may be necessary or desirable for the purpose of giving effect to any of the matters hereinbefore referred to whether incidental thereto or otherwise and to confer vary or extinguish all rights powers authorities jurisdictions privileges or exemptions which may in any way interfere with any of the objects or purposes aforesaid or of the Order and to confer vary or extinguish other rights powers authorities jurisdictions privileges and

exemptions including exemptions from tolls rates or duties.

To incorporate with the Order with or without modification some or all of the provisions of the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847, the General Pier and Harbour Act 1861, the General Pier and Harbour Act 1861 Amendment Act, the Lands Clauses Acts, and the Burgh Police (Scotland) Acts 1892 to 1911 and any amendments or modifications of the said Acts and to amend so far as may be necessary or desirable any Act or Order which would in any way affect or interfere with the carrying into effect of the provisions of the intended Order.

To alter amend repeal and re-enact with or without alterations the provisions or some of the provisions of the Order of 1913 and any other Act or Acts Order or Orders of or relating to the Town Council or the Harbour Undertaking.
