The following Agreement regarding the mutual settlement of questions arising out of the sequestration of property in Great Britain and Belgium has been concluded by the Governments of the two countries by means of an Exchange of Notes, and came into force on the 8th August last. The French text of the

Agreement was published in the *Moniteur Belge* of the 16th September :—

Agreement.

The Sequestration Authorities of each of the two countries will remit to the nationals of the other country, as to their own nationals, the shares of which the latter are owners, and which are included in the sequestrated property under their control, on condition that the said owners establish in every legal way their ownership of these shares, and that they have no debts payable to the sequestrated establishment. In case of need the British Government would be satisfied with an attestation emanating from the German Directorate of the sequestrated establishment that no sum is due on the shares since the 1st August 1914. -

In the case of securities deposited with London branches of enemy banks, the Certificate furnished by the claimant will be required (a) to be signed or counter-signed by a responsible official of the Head Office of the enemy bank, and (b) to state that the securities had not at any time during the period of the war been subject to a lien or charge in favour of a German or other former enemy subject.

ROPE, TWINE, AND NET TRADE
BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

The Rope, Twine, and Net Trade Board (Great Britain) have issued a Notice varying by a reduction of approximately 10½ per cent. the General Minimum Piece-Rates, and varying the Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers employed in Hand Machine Braiding, the variations becoming effective under an Order of the Minister of Labour as from the 14th November 1921.

The Trade Board have also issued a Notice varying by a reduction of approximately 6 per cent. the General Minimum Piece-Rates for Female Home-Workers, the rates as varied becoming operative under an Order of the Minister of Labour as from the 14th November 1921.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES (AS FIXED AND AS VARIED) FOR FEMALE AND MALE WORKERS.
EFFECTIVE AS FROM 14TH NOVEMBER 1921.

Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in any case not later than 20th November 1921.

SECTION V.—Notwithstanding anything contained in Sections I., II., III., and IV. of this Part of this Schedule a Female Worker entering the Trade for the first time at or over the age of 16 years and a Male Worker entering the Trade for the first time at or over the age of 18 years, may be employed for a period not exceeding six months at a General Minimum Time-Rate which is less by ½d. per hour in the case of Female Workers and less by 1d. per hour in the case of Male Workers than the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable under Sections I., II., III., and IV. of this Part of this Schedule.

SECTION VI.—In cases where a worker is employed on piece-work, each piece-rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker an amount not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable as set out in Sections I., II., III., and IV. of this Part of this Schedule. Provided that in determining as to whether any Piece-Rate satisfies the foregoing condition, regard shall only be had, in the case of female workers, to the earnings of workers of 18 years of age and over, and in the case of male workers, to the earnings of workers of 21 years of age and over, who have had not less than six months' experience in the Trade.

PART III.

Overtime Rates for Certain Classes of Female and Male Workers. (All ages.)

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade to be as follows:—

In any Week	48
On any Day (other than Saturday)	9
On Saturday	5

Provided that any other day not being a Sunday may, by agreement in writing between an employer and a worker, be substituted in place of Saturday as the weekly short day, and in such case the normal number of hours on such substituted day shall be five, and the

normal number of hours on Saturday shall be nine.

Provided that all hours worked on Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime, to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime for Female and Male Workers to apply in substitution for the Minimum Rates which would otherwise be applicable in respect of all hours worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows:—

A.—For all Female Workers (other than Home Workers) and for all Male Workers employed on Time Work.

(i.) For the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Saturday, Sunday, and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable—i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter.

(ii.) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all Overtime on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable—i.e., Time-and-a-Half.

(iii.) For all time worked on Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable—i.e., Double Time.

(iv.) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48 the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable—i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter—except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (ii.) and (iii.) of Subsection A of this Section.

B.—For Certain Classes of Female and Male Workers Employed on Piece-Work.

Female and Male Workers (other than Female Home-Workers and other than Male Hand-Hacklers to whom the General Minimum Piece-Rates set out in Part II. of this Schedule are applicable, and other than Female and Male Workers employed in Hand Machine Braiding to whom the General Minimum Piece-Rates set out in the Trade Board's Notice R (20) are applicable) employed on Piece-Work shall be entitled to receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker not less than the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, an amount equal to One Quarter of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, One Half of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, or the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Subsection A of this Section if the worker had been employed on Time Work, were Time-and-a-Quarter, Time-and-a-Half, or Double Time respectively.

C.—For Male Workers employed in Hand-Hackling on Piece-Work for which General

Minimum Piece-Rates have been Fixed in Part II. of this Schedule.

(i.) For the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Saturday, Sunday, and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be the appropriate General Minimum Piece-Rate with the addition of 4d. per hour.

(ii.) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays and for all Overtime on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be the appropriate General Minimum Piece-Rate with the addition of 8d. per hour.

(iii.) For all time worked on Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be the appropriate General Minimum Piece-Rate with the addition of

(iv.) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48 the Overtime Rate shall be the appropriate General Minimum Piece-Rate with the addition of 4d. per hour, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (ii.) and (iii.) of Subsection C of this Section.

SECTION III.—Notwithstanding anything contained in Sections I. and II. of this Part of this Schedule:

(a) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require the attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rate shall only be payable on such days after 9½ hours have been worked.

(b) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall not be payable in the week on which attendance on Saturday is required until 50 hours have been worked.

PART IV.

A Home-worker or Out-worker is a worker who works in her own home or in any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

PART V.

SECTION I.—Subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, the respective Minimum Rates of Wages set out in this Schedule apply to all workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the Rope, Twine, and Net Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Rope, Twine, and Net) Order, 1919, as varied by the Trade Boards (Made-Up Textiles) Order, 1920, and set out in Section II. below.

SECTION II.—The Rope, Twine, and Net Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Rope, Twine, and Net) Order, 1919, as varied by the Trade Boards (Made-Up Textiles) Order, 1920, is as follows:—

The making or re-making of (a) rope (including driving rope and banding), (b) cord (including blind and window cord, but excluding silk, worsted, and other fancy cords), (c) core for wire ropes, (d) lines, (e) twine (including binder and trawl twine), (f) lanyards, (g) net and similar articles; the bleaching, teasing, hackling, carding, preparing, and spinning of the materials required for the making or re-making of any of the articles (a) to (g) above when carried on in the same fac-

tory or workshop as such making or re-making; the manufacture of packings, gaskins, and spun yarns, when carried on in the same factory or workshop as the making or re-making of any of the articles (a) to (g) above; the braiding or splicing of articles made from rope, cord, twine, or net, the mending of nets and the winding, twisting, doubling, laying; polishing, dressing, tarring, tanning, dyeing, balling, reeling, finishing, packing, despatching, warehousing, and storing of any of the above articles, where these operations or any of them are carried on in a factory or workshop in which any of the articles (a) to (g) above are made or re-made; *but excluding* the making of wire rope (unless made in the same factory or workshop as hemp or similar rope or core for wire rope), *and excluding* the making of net in connection with the lace curtain trade and the weaving of cloth; *and excluding also* the splicing or braiding of rope, twine, or cord performed by hand or machine when incidental to or carried on in association with or in conjunction with the operations specified in paragraphs 1 and 2 of the Appendix to the Trade Board (Made-Up Textiles) Order, 1920, or any other processes or operations which are specifically mentioned in such Appendix.

Note.—The employment of Women, Young Persons and Children is subject to the provi-

sions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and to the provisions of the Employment of Women, Young Persons, and Children Act, 1920.

PART VI.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act, to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

Signed by Order of the Trade Board and in pursuance of an Order of the Minister of Labour confirming the Minimum Rates of Wages as fixed and as varied by the Trade Board and set out above and specifying the 14th day of November 1921 as the date from which they should become effective.

This Notice sets out all the Minimum Rates of Wages which have been fixed or varied by the Trade Board and are effective under the Trade Boards Acts for Female Workers in any branch of the Trade other than Retail Bespoke Dressmaking, and takes the place of the Notice W.D. (2) issued by the Trade Board and dated 21st May 1920, so far as it relates to minimum rates of wages for Female Workers of the classes specified above.

GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES.

Female Workers (other than Learners and Home-workers)	8½d. per hour.
Home-workers (as defined in Part IV., Section II. below)	8½d. ..
Learners (as defined in Part IV., Section I. below and employed under the conditions therein laid down by the Trade Board)	See Part I., Section II. below.

PIECEWORK BASIS TIME-RATES.

Female Workers (other than Home-workers)	9½d per hour.
Home-workers (as defined in Part IV., Section II. below)	9½d. ..

OVERTIME RATES.

(See Part III. of the Schedule below)

The rates in full as legally enforceable are set out in detail in the Schedule below and are effective as follows :—

1. The General Minimum Time Rates marked As from 14th November 1921.*
2. In all other cases As from 24th May 1920.

* Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, these minimum rates become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in any case not later than 20th November 1921.

- (i) The General Minimum Time-Rate for Learners under 14 years of age shall be 6s. per week of 48 hours, or 1½d. per hour, and from the age of 14 years they shall be entitled to the amounts shown in column I above as if they had commenced at 14.
- (ii) The advances to be given to Learners shall become due as from the first Monday in January and July of each year, the Learner being entitled to her first advance from the first Monday in January or July as the case may be, provided that she has been in the trade at least three months.
- (iii) A Learner shall cease to be a Learner, and be entitled to the full General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to workers other than Learners, upon the fulfilment of the conditions appropriate to her as set out below:—

Age of entering Employment and Conditions.

Under 15 years of age, the completion of not less than three years' employment in any branch of the trade other than Retail Bespoke Dressmaking and the attainment of the age of 18 years.

15 and under 16 years of age, the completion of not less than two years' employment in any branch of the trade other than Retail Bespoke Dressmaking and the attainment of the age of 18 years.

16 and under 21 years of age, the completion of two years' employment in any branch of the trade other than Retail Bespoke Dressmaking.

21 years of age and over, the completion of one year's employment in any branch of the

trade other than Retail Bespoke Dressmaking.

Provided that in determining the age of entry and the length of employment, all service prior to the age of 14 shall be disregarded.

PART II.

PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES AS FIXED FOR FEMALE WORKERS IN ANY BRANCH OF THE TRADE OTHER THAN RETAIL BESPOKE DRESSMAKING.

SECTION I.—(a) Workers other than Homeworkers, 9½d. per hour.

(b) Homeworkers (as defined in Part IV. Section II. below), 9½d. per hour.

SECTION II.—In the case of all Workers of the classes specified in this Part of this Schedule employed on Piece-Work, each Piece-Rate paid shall be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker, not less than the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate as set out above.

In determining whether any Piece-Rate satisfies the above-mentioned condition, regard must be had only to the earnings of ordinary workers, *i.e.*, workers of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question and not to the earnings of workers of less than ordinary skill and experience, *e.g.*, learners and infirm workers.

PART III.

OVERTIME RATES (AS FIXED AND AS VARIED) FOR FEMALE WORKERS IN ANY BRANCH OF THE TRADE OTHER THAN RETAIL BESPOKE DRESS-MAKING (ALL AGES).

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board hereby declare the normal number of hours of work in the Trade to be as follows:—

In any week	48
On any day other than Saturday (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays	9

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays and hours worked on Saturday or the weekly short day substituted therefor (subject to the provisions set out below) shall be regarded as Overtime, to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker of the classes specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows:—

A.—For Workers employed on Time Work.

(1) On any day other than Saturday (or the weekly short day substituted therefor), Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays:—

(a) For the first two hours of Overtime, One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter.

(b) For Overtime, after the first two hours of Overtime, One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half.

Provided that where it is the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rates specified in paragraphs A (1) (a) and A (1) (b) of this Section shall not be payable on any day (other than Saturday or the weekly short day substituted therefor, Sunday and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays) until the number of hours worked exceeds $9\frac{1}{2}$ and $11\frac{1}{2}$, respectively.

(2) On Saturday (or the weekly short day substituted therefor) in respect of:—

(a) That class of worker who customarily attends on six days a week:—

For all overtime worked after the first five hours, One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half.

NOTE.—During the first five hours worked on Saturday (or the weekly short day substituted therefor) the Minimum Rate applicable for this class of worker is the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate set out in Part I. of the Schedule to this Notice.

Provided that any other day (not being Sunday) may be substituted for Saturday as the weekly short day, and on such substituted short day Overtime Rates shall be applicable, as specified above and the Overtime Rates shall not be payable on Saturday until 9 hours have been worked.

(b) That class of worker who customarily attends on five days a week:—

(i) For the first two hours of Overtime (that is to say, for the first two hours worked on Saturday or the weekly short day substituted therefor), One-and-a-Quarter Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter.

(ii) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime One-and-a-Half Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half.

(3) On Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays:—

For all time worked, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double-Time.

NOTE.—The Overtime Rates set out in Sub-Sections (1) (2) and (3) of this section are payable as provided above, in respect of all hours of Overtime worked on any day, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(4) Where it is, or may become, the established practice of an employer to require attendance on Sunday instead of Saturday, the Minimum Rates for Overtime as set out in this section shall apply to workers in like manner as if the provisions of this Schedule as to Overtime the word "Saturday" were substituted for "Sunday" and the word "Sunday" for "Saturday."

(5) For all Hours worked in any Week in excess of 48: One-and-a-Quarter Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (1) (b), (2) (a), (2) (b) (ii) and (3) of this section.

Provided that where it is the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall not be payable in the week on which attendance on Saturday is required until 50 hours have been worked.

B.—For Workers employed on Piece-Work.

(i) All Female Workers of the classes specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable:—

(a) An amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate;

(b) An amount equal to One-Half of the

appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate ;
or

(c) An amount equal to the full amount of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate,

according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of paragraph (A) of this Section, if the worker had been employed on Time-Work, were—

- (a) Time-and-a-Quarter ;
- (b) Time-and-a-Half ; or
- (c) Double-Time, respectively.

NOTE.—The hours which Female Workers, Young Persons and Children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshops Acts, and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART IV.

For the purposes of this Notice the following definitions shall apply :—

SECTION I.—A Female Learner is a worker who :—

(a) Is employed by an employer who provides her with reasonable facilities for practically and efficiently learning one of the branches of the trade as carried on by the employer, or the various processes involved in the making of any of the articles specified in the definition of the trade set out in Part V. of this Schedule ; and

(b) Has received a certificate or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, or has made application for such certificate or registration, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a Learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a Female Learner on her first employment without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such Learner being continued thereafter at her employment, the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

SECTION II.—A Homemaker is a worker who works in her own home or in any place not under the control or management of the employer.

SECTION III.—The Retail Bespoke Dressmaking Branch of the Trade is that branch of the Dressmaking and Women's Light Clothing trade specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour dated 24th November 1919 (as varied by the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920), as set out below, in which the employer supplies the garment direct to the individual wearer and employs the worker direct.

PART V.

Subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts the respective minimum rates of wages set out in this Schedule apply to all workers in England and Wales of the classes specified in this Schedule in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch other than Retail Bespoke Dressmaking of the Trade specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, dated 24th November 1919 (as varied

by the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920), that is to say :—

Those branches of the Women's Clothing Trade that are engaged in the making of Non-Tailored Garments, namely, the making from textile or knitted fabrics of (a) non-tailored wearing apparel (other than handkerchiefs) worn by women and girls, or by children without distinction of sex. or (b) boys' ready-made washing suits or sailor suits, where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of garments to be worn by women or girls or by children without distinction of sex ;

Including :—

(1) All operations or processes of cutting, making, or finishing by hand or machine of dresses, non-tailored skirts, wraps, blouses, blouse-ropes, jumpers, sports-coats, neckwear, tea-gowns, dressing-gowns, dressing-jackets, pyjamas, underclothing, underskirts, aprons, overalls, nurses' and servants' caps, juvenile clothing, baby-linen, or similar non-tailored articles ;

(2) The making of field bonnets, sun-bonnets, boudoir caps or infants' millinery, where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of any of the articles mentioned in paragraph (1) above ;

(3) (a) The altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of any of the above-mentioned articles ;

(b) The cleaning of any of the above-mentioned articles, where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the altering, repairing, renovating, or re-making of such garments ;

(4) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making, altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of such articles, other than hand embroidery or hand drawn-thread work on articles made of linen or cotton or of mixed linen and cotton ;

(5) The following processes if done by machine ; thread-drawing, thread-clipping, top-sewing, scalloping, nickelling and paring ;

(6) Laundering, smoothing, folding, ornamenting, boxing, packing, warehousing or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the making, altering, repairing, renovating or re-making of any of the above-mentioned articles ;

But excluding :—

(a) The making of knitted articles ; the making of underclothing, socks and stockings, from knitted fabrics ; and the making from knitted fabrics of articles mentioned in paragraphs (1) and (2) above, where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of the knitted fabrics ;

(b) The making of gloves, spats, gaiters, boots, shoes and slippers ;

(c) The making of headgear, other than the articles mentioned in paragraph (2) above ;

(d) The branches of trade covered by the Trade Boards (Corset) Order, 1919 ;

(e) The making of rubberised or oilskin garments ;

(f) The making of women's collars and cuffs and of nurses' stiff washing belts where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making of men's or boys' shirts or collars ;

(g) Warehousing, packing and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made on the premises; *And excluding also :—*

(h) Any processes or operations included in the Appendix to the Trade Boards (Shirt-making) Order, 1920.

PART VI.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages are to be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

The form of this consolidating notice has been approved by the Minister of Labour in accordance with paragraph 8 of the Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October 1918.

Signed by order of the Trade Board and in pursuance of an Order of the Minister of Labour confirming the minimum rates of wages as varied by the Trade Board and set out above and specifying the 14th day of November 1921 as the date from which they should become effective.

**WART DISEASE OF POTATOES
(AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1921.**

(D.I.P. 531.)

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Destructive Insects and Pests Acts, 1877 and 1907, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, orders as follows:—

Modification of Wart Disease of Potatoes Order of 1919.

1. The Wart Disease of Potatoes Order of 1919, hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order," is hereby modified in the manner provided by this Order.

Amendment of Article 3 of Principal Order.

2. For Article 3 of the principal Order the following Article shall be substituted:—

"Restriction on Planting Potatoes on Land Infected with Wart Disease.

" 3.—(1) No person shall plant, or cause or permit to be planted, in any land in his occupation or under his charge on which Wart Disease has been known to occur at any time, any potatoes which are not of an approved immune variety and which were not inspected whilst growing and certified as reasonably free from rogues by the Ministry as regards potatoes grown in England or Wales, or by the Board of Agriculture for Scotland as regards potatoes grown in Scotland, or by the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland as regards potatoes grown in Ireland. Nothing in this Article shall prevent the planting on any land of potatoes which were saved from the crop grown on that land in a previous year.

" (2) No person shall permit any potatoes to remain in land in his occupation or under his charge if the potatoes have been planted in contravention of this Article and the removal of the potatoes is required by notice served on him by an Inspector; Provided that a person shall not be liable to conviction for planting potatoes or causing or permitting potatoes to be planted in contravention of this Article if he proves to the satisfaction of the Court that the potatoes were sold to him as potatoes of an approved immune variety which were certified as aforesaid, and that he did not know that the potatoes were not of an approved immune variety and were not so certified.

" (3) The restrictions imposed by this Article shall not apply to any planting which is licensed by the Minister for the purposes of experiment.

" (4) An approved immune variety is a variety approved for the time being by the

Ministry, as being immune from Wart Disease."

Amendment of Article 4 of Principal Order.

3. Paragraphs (1) and (5) of Article 4 of the Principal Order are hereby revoked.

Restrictions on Planting Imported Potatoes.

4. No person shall plant or cause or permit to be planted any potatoes which have been grown in any place outside the United Kingdom, except under and in accordance with the conditions of a licence granted by the Minister or by an Inspector of the Ministry.

Commencement.

5. This Order shall come into operation on the fourteenth day of November, nineteen hundred and twenty-one.

Short Title and Construction.

6. This Order may be cited as the WART DISEASES OF POTATOES (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1921, and shall be read with the principal Order.

GLASGOW CORPORATION.

(New Tramways and Tramroads; Application of Glasgow Tramways Acts, 1905 to 1920; Section 43 of Tramways Act, 1870, not to apply; Gauge and Motive Power; Working and Equipping Tramways and Tramroads; Breaking up, Use, and Maintenance of Streets; Temporary Tramways; Underpinning; Tolls, Rates, and Charges; Omnibuses; Adaptation of Roads; Application of Glasgow Tramways Acts, 1905 to 1920, to Omnibuses; Working Agreements; Cloak-Rooms; Queues; Lamp Post Signs; Trailer or Coupled Carriages; Street Works; Stopping up of Roads and Footpaths; Municipal Milk Supplies and Dairies; Provisions for Securing Purity, etc., of Milk sold in the City of Glasgow; Compulsory Purchase of Lands; Taking of Parts only of Property; Lands acquired not to be Superfluous Lands; Compensation in respect of Recently Altered Buildings; Temporary Alteration of Roads, etc.; Agreements; Further Penalties for Emission of Smoke; Prohibiting Emission of Smoke from Vehicles; Lights on Vehicles; Amendment of Glasgow Corporation Act, 1909, as regards Accounts; Amendment of Glasgow Building Regulations Act, 1900, Respecting Spiked Railings and Provision of Ashbins; Borrowing Powers; Variation of Deed and Declaration of Trust of Elder Park Library and Amendment of Glasgow Boundaries Act, 1912, as to Provision of District Library and Reading-Room; Amendment and Repeal of Acts and Other Purposes.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to the Secretary for Scotland on or before the 17th day of December next by the Corporation of the City of Glasgow (in this Notice called "the Corporation" and

"the City" respectively) for a Provisional Order (in this Notice called "the Order") to be confirmed by Parliament pursuant to the Private Legislation Procedure (Scotland) Act, 1899, for all or some of the following purposes (that is to say):—

TRAMWAYS, TRAMROADS, AND OMNIBUSES.

1. To authorise the Corporation to make, form, lay down, renew, work, use and maintain the Tramways and Tramroads hereinafter described with all necessary and proper rails, chairs, plates, sleepers, channels, wires, poles, posts, conduits, section boxes, tubes, ropes, engines, engine-houses, subways, manholes, shafts, junctions, sidings, crossovers, passing places, points, turn-tables, turnouts, weighbridges, stables, carriage houses, offices, carriages, sheds, buildings, warehouses, shelters, waiting-rooms, works and conveniences connected therewith or for the purposes thereof (that is to say):—

TRAMWAY No. 1.—2 miles 6 furlongs 7·50 chains or thereabouts in length, commencing in London Road, in the Parish of Glasgow and the City and the County of Lanark, by a junction with the existing tramways of the Corporation in that road at a point 32 yards or thereabouts eastwards from the intersection of that road with Springfield Road, thence passing along London Road and into and terminating in the road from Glasgow to Uddingston, in the Parish of Old Monkland and County of Lanark, by a junction with the existing tramways of the Corporation in the road from Glasgow to Uddingston at a point 20 yards or thereabouts southwards from the intersection of that road with London Road.

TRAMWAY No. 2.—0 furlongs 3·55 chains or thereabouts in length, wholly in the City and the Parish of Renfrew and the County of Lanark, commencing in Dumbarton Road by a junction with the existing tramways of the Corporation in that road at a point 20 yards or thereabouts eastwards from the intersection of that road with Primrose Street, thence turning into and passing along that street and terminating there at a point 65 yards or thereabouts southwards from the intersection of that street with Dumbarton Road.

TRAMWAY No. 3.—0 furlongs 9·27 chains or thereabouts in length, wholly in the City and the Parish of Govan and the County of Lanark, commencing in Govan Road by a junction with the existing tramways of the Corporation in that road at a point 17 yards or thereabouts eastwards from the intersection of that road with Holmfauld Road, thence turning into and passing along Holmfauld Road and terminating therein at a point 195 yards or thereabouts northwards from the intersection of that road with Govan Road.

TRAMWAY No. 4.—0 miles 1 furlong 8·32 chains or thereabouts in length, wholly in the City and the Parish of Govan and the County of Lanark, commencing in Nithsdale Road by a junction with the existing tramways of the Corporation in that road at a point 18 yards or thereabouts eastwards from the intersection of that road with Dumbreck Road, thence turning into and passing along Dumbreck Road and into and terminating in Mossspark Boulevard by a junction with the proposed Tramroad No. 1 hereinafter described at a point 15 yards

or thereabouts westwards from the intersection of that Boulevard with Dumbreck Road.

TRAMWAY No. 5.—0 miles 1 furlong 2·44 chains or thereabouts in length, commencing in Mossspark Boulevard, in the Parish of Govan in the City and the County of Lanark by a junction with the proposed Tramroad No. 1 hereinafter described at a point 17 yards or thereabouts eastwards from the intersection of that Boulevard with Corkerhill Road thence into and passing along Corkerhill Road and turning into and terminating in Paisley Road in the Parish of Paisley and the County of Renfrew, by a junction with the existing tramways of the Corporation in the last-mentioned Road at a point 11 yards or thereabouts westwards from the intersection of that Road with Corkerhill Road.

TRAMWAY No. 6.—0 miles 2 furlongs 7·00 chains or thereabouts in length, wholly in the Parish of New Kilpatrick and the County of Dunbarton, commencing in the new road leading from Canniesburn Road to the Milngavie or Balfron Road (Street Work No. 5, authorised by the Act of 1914) by a junction with the Tramway No. 13, authorised by the Act of 1914, at a point thereon 13 yards or thereabouts southwards from the intersection of that road with the Milngavie or Balfron Road, then crossing the Milngavie or Balfron Road into and passing along Street Work No. 1 by this Order authorised thence turning into, and terminating by a junction with the Tramway No. 14 authorised by the Act of 1914 in the Milngavie or Balfron Road at a point 62 yards or thereabouts northwards from the intersection of that road with Street Work No. 1 by this Order authorised

TRAMWAY No. 7.—0 miles 0 furlongs 7·00 chains or thereabouts in length, wholly in the Parish of Old Monkland and the County of Lanark, commencing in Coatbridge Road by a junction with Tramroad No. 2 hereinafter described at a point 24 yards or thereabouts westwards from the intersection of that road with Cuilhill Road, thence passing along and terminating in Coatbridge Road by a junction with proposed Tramroad No. 3 hereinafter described at a point 10 yards or thereabouts eastwards from the intersection of that Road with Uddingston Road.

TRAMROAD No. 1.—0 miles 7 furlongs 4·40 chains or thereabouts in length on the north side of Mossspark Boulevard, wholly in the City and the County of Lanark, commencing in the Parish of Govan in that Boulevard by a junction with the proposed Tramway No. 4 hereinafter described at a point 15 yards or thereabouts westwards from the intersection of that Boulevard with Dumbreck Road, thence passing along and terminating in that Boulevard in the parish of Govan by a junction with the proposed Tramway No. 5 hereinafter described at a point 17 yards or thereabouts eastwards from the intersection of that Boulevard with Corkerhill Road.

TRAMROAD No. 2.—1 mile 0 furlongs 0 chains or thereabouts in length in substitution for part of Tramway No. 19 authorised by the Act of 1914 on the south side of Coatbridge Road, wholly in the Parish of Old Monkland and County of Lanark, commencing by a junction with the said Tramway No. 19 at a point 15 yards or thereabouts eastwards from

the intersection of that road with the road leading to Bredisholm Road, and terminating in Coatbridge Road by a junction with proposed Tramway No. 7 hereinafter described at a point 24 yards or thereabouts westwards from the intersection of that road with Cuilhill Road.

TRAMROAD No. 3.—1 mile 1 furlong 6·00 chains or thereabouts in length in substitution for part of Tramway No. 19 authorised by the Act of 1914 on the south side of Coatbridge Road, wholly in the Parish of Old Monkland and County of Lanark, commencing by a junction with the proposed Tramway No. 7 hereinafter described at a point 10 yards or thereabouts eastwards from the intersection of Coatbridge Road with Uddingston Road and terminating in Bank Street, in the Burgh of Coatbridge, by a junction with the existing tramways of the Airdrie and Coatbridge Tramways Trustees at a point 36 yards or thereabouts south-westwards from the intersection of that street with Woodside Street in the Burgh of Coatbridge.

The intended tramways and tramroads will be situated in or pass from through or into the Parishes of Glasgow, Old Monkland, Govan, Eastwood, Paisley, Renfrew, and New Kilpatrick, the City, the Burgh of Coatbridge and the Counties of Lanark, Renfrew, and Dunbarton.

The intended tramways and tramroads shall be laid as double lines.

2. The intended Tramways Nos. 1, 2, 4, 5, and 6 and Tramroad No. 3 will be so laid that for a distance of 30 feet or upwards a less space than 9 feet 6 inches will intervene between the outside of the footpath and the nearest rail of such intended tramways and tramroad at the points or places indicated by a thick dotted line on the plans to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned in the following streets, roads or other places or some of them or some part or parts thereof (that is to say):—

Tramway No. 1.—London Road and Glasgow and Uddingston Road.

Tramway No. 2.—Dunbarton Road and Primrose Street.

Tramway No. 4.—Nithsdale Road and Dumbreck Road and Mossspark Boulevard.

Tramway No. 5.—Mossspark Boulevard, Corkerhill Road, and Paisley Road.

Tramway No. 6.—Milngavie or Balfron Road.

Tramroad No. 3.—Coatbridge Road and Bank Street, Coatbridge.

3. To provide that the intended tramways and tramroads shall be and be deemed to be part of the tramway undertaking of the Corporation, and that the provisions of the Glasgow Tramways Acts 1905 to 1920 and of the Order shall for all purposes and with or without modification, amendment, alteration or addition extend and apply to the intended tramways and tramroads.

4. To provide that Section 43 of the Tramways Act 1870 shall not apply to the intended tramways or tramroads.

5. The intended tramways and tramroads will be constructed on a gauge of 4 feet 7½ inches, and it is not intended to run thereon carriages or trucks adapted for use on railways.

6. To authorise the Corporation and all other persons or companies for the time being using the intended tramways and tramroads to work the

intended tramways and tramroads or any of them or any part thereof by electricity applied by the overhead, underground, or any other system or by steam, electric, gas, atmospheric, or oil locomotive engines, cables, or other mechanical power, in addition to or in substitution for animal power or by all or any of those means.

7. To authorise the Corporation, either temporarily or permanently, to make, maintain, alter and remove such tramways and tramroads as may be necessary to form connections between the existing and intended tramways and tramroads and also such crossings, cross-overs, passing places, sidings, junctions, turnouts and other works, as may be necessary or convenient for the efficient working of the intended tramways and tramroads or any of them or for facilitating the passage of traffic along streets or for providing access to any works or buildings of the Corporation.

8. To authorise the Corporation when, by reason of the execution of any work affecting the surface or soil of any street, road, or thoroughfare, or otherwise, it is necessary or expedient to remove or discontinue the use of any tramway or any part thereof, to make in the same or any adjacent street, road, or thoroughfare, and to maintain so long as occasion may require temporary tramways in lieu of such tramway or any part thereof.

9. To reserve to the Corporation the exclusive right of using on the intended tramways and tramroads carriages adapted or suitable for running thereon.

10. To authorise the Corporation to underpin or otherwise strengthen any house, building, or other construction which may be rendered insecure or be affected by the exercise of the powers of the Order.

11. To authorise the Corporation to fix, alter, and levy tolls, rates, and charges, for the use of the intended tramways and tramroads and tramways run over or worked by the Corporation by carriages passing along the same, and for the conveyance of passengers or traffic upon the same.

12. To confer further powers on the Corporation with respect to the running of omnibuses, and to authorise the Corporation to provide, maintain, work, and run omnibuses within the city and beyond the city along all or any of the routes hereinafter mentioned, and along any other route or routes with such consent or approval and on such terms and conditions as the Order may provide or Parliament may sanction.

The routes beyond the city hereinafter referred to are:—

Route No. 1.—Rutherglen to Eastwood Toll—

In the parishes of Rutherglen, Cambuslang, Carmunnock, and East Kilbride and the county of Lanark, and the parishes of Mearns, Cathcart, and Eastwood, and the county of Renfrew, commencing in Stonelaw Road at the termination of the existing tramways of the Corporation in that road, thence passing in a southerly direction along East Kilbride Road and Busby Road, and terminating at the junction of the last-named road with Kilmarnock Road at Eastwood Toll.

Route No. 2.—Burnside to Mount Florida—

In the parishes of Rutherglen, Cambuslang, Carmunnock, and Cathcart, and the county of Lanark, commencing in Stonelaw Road at the termination of the existing tramways of the Corporation in that road, thence passing in a

southerly direction along East Kilbride Road, and Carmunnock Road, and terminating at the junction of that road with Cathcart Road.

Route No. 3.—Mount Florida to Clarkston—

In the parishes of Cathcart, Carmunnock, and East Kilbride, and the county of Lanark and the parish of Mearns and the county of Renfrew, commencing in Carmunnock Road at the junction of that road with Cathcart Road, thence passing along Carmunnock Road and Busby Road, and terminating at the termination of the existing tramways of the Corporation in Mearns Road, Clarkston, at the junction of that road with Busby Road.

Route No. 4.—Clarkston to Eaglesham—

In the parishes of Cathcart, Mearns, and Eaglesham, and the county of Renfrew, commencing in Mearns Road, Clarkston, at the termination of the existing tramways of the Corporation in that road, thence passing in a southerly direction along Busby Road, Eaglesham Road, and Gilmour Street, Eaglesham, and terminating in Gilmour Street at the junction of that street with Cheapside Street, Eaglesham.

Route No. 5.—Eastwood Toll to Newton Mearns.

In the parishes of Eastwood and Mearns and the county of Renfrew, commencing at Eastwood Toll at the junction of Eastwoodmains Road and Kilmarnock Road, thence passing in a southerly direction along Kilmarnock Road, and terminating in that road at the junction of Kilmarnock Road with Barrhead Road.

Route No. 6.—Pollokshaws (West) to Paisley—

In the parishes of Eastwood and Paisley and the county of Renfrew, commencing at the junction of High Cartraigs Street, and Barrhead Road, thence passing in a westerly direction along Cowglen Road, Lavern Road, Hurler Road, Barrhead Road, Blackhall Street, Lonend Street, Saucel Street, and Orchard Street, and terminating in Orchard Street at the junction of that street with Causeyside Street, Paisley.

Route No. 7.—Renfrew to Bishopton and Erskine Ferry—

In the parishes of Renfrew, Inchinnan, and Erskine and the county of Renfrew, commencing in Hairst Street at Renfrew Cross and at the termination of the existing tramways of the Corporation, thence passing along Hairst Street, Inchinnan Road, Greenock Road, Bishopton Road, and Paisley Road, thence turning into the aforementioned Greenock Road and terminating at the junction of that road with Paisley Road.

Route No. 8.—Dalmuir to Balloch Park—

In the parishes of Old Kilpatrick, Dumbarton, and Bonhill, and the county of Dumbarton, commencing in the Glasgow and Dumbarton Road at the termination of the existing tramways of the Corporation in that road, thence passing in a westerly direction along the Glasgow and Dumbarton Road, Bonhill Road, Main Street, Bonhill, Main Street, Jamestown, and Drymen Road, and terminating in the last-mentioned road opposite the entrance to Balloch Park.

Route No. 9.—Kilbowie to Canuiesburn—

In the parishes of Old Kilpatrick and New Kilpatrick, and the county of Dumbarton, commencing in Kilbowie Road at the junction of that road with the Glasgow and Dumbarton Road, thence passing in a northerly direction along Kilbowie Road, Duutocher Road and

Drymen Road, and terminating at the junction of the last-mentioned road with Milngavie Road at Canniesburn Toll.

Route No. 10.—Canniesburn to Strathblane—

In the parish of New Kilpatrick and the county of Dunbarton, and the parishes of Baldernock and Strathblane and the county of Stirling, commencing at Canniesburn Toll at the junction of Canniesburn Road and Milngavie Road, thence passing in a northerly direction along Milngavie Road, Main Street, Douglas Street, Station Road, Milngavie, and Balfron Road, and terminating at the last-mentioned road at the intersection of Balfron Road with Campsie Glen Road, Strathblane.

Route No. 11.—Canniesburn to Bishopbriggs.

In the parish of New Kilpatrick and the county of Dunbarton and the parish of Baldernock and the county of Stirling, and the parish of Cadder and the county of Lanark, commencing at Canniesburn Toll at the junction of Canniesburn Road and Milngavie Road, thence passing in a northerly direction along Milngavie Road, Balfron Road, Auchenhowie Road, Balmore Road, Torrance Road and Kirkintilloch Road, and terminating in the last-mentioned road at the termination of the existing tramways of the Corporation at Bishopbriggs.

Route No. 12.—Bishopbriggs to Milton—

In the parish of Cadder and the county of Lanark, and the parish of Kirkintilloch, and the county of Dunbarton and the parishes of Campsie, and Baldernock, and the county of Stirling, commencing in Kirkintilloch Road at the termination of the existing tramways of the Corporation at Bishopbriggs in that road, thence passing in a north-easterly direction along Kirkintilloch Road, Kilsyth Road, Milton Road, Campsie Road, and Torrance Road, thence turning into the aforementioned Kirkintilloch Road and terminating at the junction of that road with Torrance Road.

Route No. 13.—Millerston to Mollinsburn—

In the parishes of Barony and Cadder and the county of Lanark, commencing in Cumbernauld Road at the termination of the authorised tramway of the Corporation in that road, thence passing in a north-easterly direction along Cumbernauld Road and terminating in that road at Mollinsburn at the junction of Cumbernauld Road with Airdrie Road.

13. To make provision for the adaptation of roads beyond the City to the running of omnibuses, the cesser of the powers of the Corporation to run omnibuses and the procedure to be followed in the event of the failure of the Corporation to exercise the powers of running omnibuses and such other matters relating thereto as the Order may prescribe.

14. To extend and apply to the omnibuses provided, maintained and run under the powers of the Order all or some of the provisions of the Glasgow Tramways Acts, 1905 to 1920, and the powers with respect to tramways proposed to be conferred on the Corporation by the Order including in particular the provisions relating to penalties on passengers practising frauds, and the imposition and recovery of tolls rates and charges.

15. To make further provision with respect to the tramways tramroads and omnibuses of the Corporation including working and other agreements in connection with omnibuses, the provision of cloak rooms, power to require passengers to

wait in lines or queues, attachment of signs to lamp posts, etc., the user of trailer and coupled carriages, and the taking of fares, tolls and charges for the use thereof.

STREET WORKS.

16. To authorise the Corporation to make and maintain the new road, the widenings of Coatbridge Road and the widening, straightening and diversion of Coatbridge Road and Bank Street hereinafter described with all necessary roads, approaches, embankments, walls, junctions, works and conveniences connected therewith (that is to say):—

STREET WORK No. 1.—A new road wholly in the parish of New Kilpatrick and the county of Dunbarton, commencing by a junction with the Milngavie or Balfron Road at a point opposite the north end of the new road leading from Canniesburn Road to Milngavie or Balfron Road (Street Work No. 5 authorised by the Act of 1914) and terminating by a junction with the Milngavie or Balfron Road at a point 141 yards or thereabouts northwards from the intersection of the last-mentioned road with Kessington Farm Road.

STREET WORK No. 2.—A widening of Coatbridge Road wholly in the parish of Old Monkland and the County of Lanark commencing at the east side of the gateway of the property abutting on that road known as Rhinds Lodge and terminating at the east side of the bridge carrying the disused mineral railway over that road at a point on that road 282 yards or thereabouts east of the intersection of that road with Swinton Road.

STREET WORK No. 3.—A widening of Coatbridge Road wholly in the parish of Old Monkland and the County of Lanark commencing at the east boundary of the property abutting on that road known as Hardington Mains and terminating at the west boundary of the property abutting on that road known as Burnside Cottage.

STREET WORK No. 4.—A widening, straightening and diversion of Coatbridge Road and Bank Street wholly in the parish of Old Monkland commencing in Coatbridge Road in the County of Lanark at the east side of the gateway of the west lodge of the property abutting on that road known as Drumpellier and terminating in the burgh of Coatbridge at a point in Bank Street 30 yards or thereabouts eastwards from the intersection of Bank Street with Woodside Street.

The said Street Works will be situate in or pass from through or into the parishes of New Kilpatrick and Old Monkland, the burgh of Coatbridge and the Counties of Lanark and Dunbarton.

17. To authorise the Corporation to stop up permanently or temporarily so much of Coatbridge Road as may be rendered unnecessary by the construction of Street Works Nos. 2, 3, and 4 before described.

18. To provide that the said Street Works may form part of such undertaking of the Corporation, and that the costs thereof shall be defrayed out of such funds as the Corporation may determine or the Order may prescribe, or that such Works shall belong to and be maintained by the local or road authority for the area in which they are situated.

MILK SUPPLY.

19. To authorise the Corporation to provide, purchase, and supply milk and to distribute and to control and direct the delivery of milk within the

City and elsewhere and for such purposes to establish and carry on depôts and to appropriate and use lands necessary therefor and to buy and sell milk, to clean, cool, pasteurise, and bottle milk, to make and sell butter and cheese and other milk and dairy products, and to establish and maintain milk shops and dairies and to purchase and sell dairy produce and products and carry on the business of dairy farmers, and generally to do all such acts and things as may be necessary or expedient in connection with the establishment and conduct of a municipal undertaking for supplying milk and milk products, and for securing the purity, cleanliness, and wholesomeness of such supply, to make provision with respect to the borrowing of money for, and the application of the revenue from, any municipal milk undertaking established by the Corporation.

20. To authorise the Corporation to make provision for the purity, cleanliness, and wholesomeness of milk supplied or sold by any person in the City, and to require that all milk sold, delivered, or distributed in the City shall be sold, delivered, or distributed in sealed vessels, and to provide penalties for failure to comply with such provisions and requirements.

LANDS.

21. To authorise the Corporation to purchase or take on lease feu or otherwise acquire by compulsion or agreement and to hold lands and property, way-leaves or servitudes for the purposes of the tramways tramroads and street works proposed to be authorised by the Order and for other purposes of the Order, or any other purposes of the Corporation, as shown on the Plans to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned and also other lands and property.

22. To authorise the Corporation, notwithstanding anything contained in the Lands Clauses Consolidation (Scotland) Act 1845 to acquire portions only of lands, houses, buildings and manufactories.

23. To authorise the Corporation to hold any lands acquired by them under the powers of the Order, and to provide that such lands shall not be deemed superfluous lands within the meaning of the Lands Clauses Acts.

24. To make provision with respect to the compensation to be paid in respect of recently altered buildings and other property, acquired by the Corporation under the powers of the Order.

25. To authorise the Corporation to enter upon and break up the surface of, and to alter, raise, lower, cross, divert, widen, improve, enlarge, stop up, remove and otherwise interfere with, either temporarily, or permanently, all streets, roads, highways, footpaths, ways, rights of way, or other places, water courses, bridges, railways, tramways, canals, towing paths, streams, aqueducts, quays, rivers, navigations, culverts, tram-plates, sewers, drains, pavements, thoroughfares, water, gas, pneumatic, electric, telegraphic, telephonic and other pipes, tubes, wires, apparatus and other things within or adjoining the parishes and places in which the works proposed to be authorised by the Order will be made or carried out.

MISCELLANEOUS.

26. To authorise the Corporation on the one hand, and any person or persons, company, corporation, trustees, authority or body, interested in or affected by any of the objects and purposes of

the Order on the other hand, to enter into and carry into effect agreements for or in relation to such objects and purposes, and to confirm with or without modification, amendment, alteration or addition, all or any agreements which may have been or during the progress of the Order may be entered into with reference to the objects and purposes of the Order.

27. To amend and extend the provisions of the Glasgow Police (Further Powers) Act 1892 with respect to penalties for the emission of smoke from any furnace or fire within the City.

28. To prohibit the use within the City of any vehicle for or in which fuel is used unless the fuel used for or in such vehicle is smokeless or is used so as to prevent the emission of smoke from such vehicle, and to authorise the imposition and recovery of penalties in respect of any failure to comply with such prohibition.

29. To amend and extend the provisions of the Glasgow Police (Further Powers) Act 1892 and the provisions of any other Act respecting the carrying of lights by vehicles.

30. To amend Section 14 of the Glasgow Corporation Act 1909 with respect to appeals to the Sheriff in connection with the accounts of the Corporation and items therein objected to by any elector.
