THIS day the Right Honourable Reginald G.C.B., Baliol, Viscount Esher, G.C.V.O., James Fitzalan Hope, Esquire, M.P., and Sir Ernest Murray Pollock, K.B.E., K.C., M.P., were, by His Majesty's command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took their places at the Board accordingly.

PRESENT.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 20th day of December 1921 (No. 17, N.P. (4) 1649/21), in the words following, viz.:-

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that all pay, pensions or other allowances in the nature thereof payable

been, an officer, seaman or marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are, from time to time, directed by Order in

And whereas by Section 2, Sub-section (1), of the Ministry of Pensions Act, 1916, it was enacted, inter alia, that the powers and duties of the Admiralty with respect to pensions and grants to persons who have served as men, other than service pensions, so far as such pensions and grants are payable out of moneys provided by Parliament, and not provided exclusively for the purpose of Greenwich Hospital, should be transferred to the Minister of Pensions:

'And whereas under Section 1 of the War Pensions Act, 1920, it is enacted that the powers and duties transferred from the Admiralty to the Minister of Pensions by the Ministry of Pensions Act, 1916, snall, except in so far as those powers and duties relate to pensions or grants to which the War Pensions Acts, as amended by the War Pensions Act, 1920, apply, or to pensions or grants awarded in respect of wounds, disabilities or other matters suffered, incurred, or happening in any war which occurred before the fourth day of August 1914, be re-transferred to the Admiralty as from the thirtieth day after the date fixed under the Termination of the Present War (Definition) Act, 1918, as the date of the termination of the present war:

And whereas Your Majesty by Your Order in Council, dated the tenth day of August 1921, in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval | has fixed the 31st day of August 1921, at midnight, as the date of the termination of the present war:

"And whereas we have had under our consideration the scales of pensions and gratuities allowable, under Articles 1206, 1208, 1931 and 1932 of the King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, to petty and non-commissioned officers, seamen, marines and boys who, consequent on wounds, hurts, or disability, are invalided from Your Majesty's Naval Service, and are of opinion that, owing to the altered economic conditions arising from the war, and for other reasons, the scales should be substantially increased:

"And whereas we are further of opinion that invalided petty officers, non-commissioned officers and men of Your Majesty's Royal Navy and Royal Marines should be pensioned on the same scales, and that a minimum period of fourteen years' pensionable service should be required of all future entrants as a qualification for the award of a life pension when the invaliding is due to causes which cannot be attributed

to the conditions of service:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to authorise us to award, at our discretion, to such men as may be invalided out of the Service on or after the first day of October 1921, for causes which do not bring them within the scope of the War Pensions Acts, or as may be discharged after that date with a wound or injury, pensions and gratuities at the rates and subject to the conditions specified in the Schedules annexed hereto.

"We further beg leave to recommend that we may be empowered to apply the improved scales of pensions, at our discretion, to those pre-war disability pensioners who have served during the war, and have not again been invalided, or who, being under the age of 55 on the outbreak of hostilities and, therefore, liable for service, were exempted from mobilisation for the purpose of continuing in their civilian employment under the Government. Their present pensions to be re-assessed accordingly as from 1st April 1919, on the basis of their total naval service, subject to the provisos that mobilised service shall not confer eligibility for a life pension on men otherwise ineligible, and that men who were originally invalided for wounds or injuries attributable to the Service, but not due to, or arising out of former wars, shall be required to undergo medical examination for the purpose of determining the present degree of disablement.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

"SCHEDULE I.

- " Scales of Pensions and Gratuities Allow-ABLE WHEN THE CAUSE OF INVALIDING IS ATTRIBUTABLE TO THE SERVICE.
- "Compensation to be based on length of service and degree of disablement, and, when a pension is admissible, to include the usual additions for rank, good conduct badges and medal.
 - "SERVICE ELEMENT.
 - " (a) Pensions-Over 10 years' service, 1s. a day for life.

Over 14 years' service, 1s. 6d. a day for life.

Over 16 years' service, 1s. 9d. a day for life.

Over 18 years' service, 2s. a day for life. Over 20 years' service, 2s. 6d. a day for life.

"If qualified for the award of a long service pension, 11d. a day for each complete year of

pensionable service.

'The 'over 10 years' rate to be restricted to continuous service ratings who entered under regulations which conferred a claim to a life pension, if invalided, after that period of service on the continuous service system. All men and boys entering the Naval Service on or after the first day of October 1921, whether entered for continuous service or otherwise, to be required to show a minimum period of 14 years' pensionable service in order to qualify for a life pension in respect of services.

" (b) Gratuities.—Men discharged with less than the qualifying period of service required for the award of a life pension to be eligible for the grant of a gratuity not exceeding £2 for each completed year of pensionable service.

" DISABLEMENT ELEMENT.

" (a) Pensions.—Where the degree of disablement is assessed at 20 per cent, and upwards, pensions may be awarded either temporarily or permanently according to the circumstances of the case, on the basis of a maximum scale of 32s. 6d. a week for total disablement (100 per cent.), lower degrees of disablement carrying

proportionately reduced rates.

(b) Gratuities.—If the degree of disablement be assessed at less than 20 per cent., a gratuity appropriate to the degree of disability, but not exceeding a maximum of £100, may be awarded at our discretion. Gratuities may also be granted at our discretion in respect of slight permanent injury due to the Service, for which a Hurt Certificate was granted, when discharge is totally unconnected with the injury, and the pension or gratuity awarded is based on length of service only. The cases of men who have been awarded pensions as from a date subsequent to 31st March 1919, to be reviewed as necessary, subject to medical survey to determine the present degree of disablement.

" RANK ELEMENT.

"This element to comprise the allowance for petty time as laid down in Articles 1938, Clause 1, and 1931, Crause 1, of the King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, and the usual additions for good conduct badges and medal as allowed under the Long Service Scale.

METHOD OF COMBINING THE SERVICE, DISABLEMENT AND RANK ELEMENTS.

"Men eligible for pensions in respect of both the Service and Disablement elements to be granted the larger amount in full, and one-half of the other; the total so arrived at to be increased by the addition of the Rank Element.

"Men eligible for a pension in respect of the Service Element and for a gratuity on the ground of Disablement, or vice versa, to have their pensions assessed on the appropriate Service or Disablement scales, plus the Rank Element, and to receive payment in full, in

addition to the Disablement or Service gratuity

appropriate to their case.

Men eligible for gratuities only in respect of both the Service and the Disablement Elements to receive payment in full.

"SCHEDULE II.

"Scale of Pensions and Gratuities allow-ABLE WHEN THE CAUSE OF INVALIDING IS NOT ATTRIBUTABLE TO THE SERVICE.

Compensation to be based on length of service and, when a pension is admissible, to include the usual allowances for rank, good conduct badges and medal.

" (a) Pensions-

Over 10 years' service, 1s. a day for life. Over 14 years' service, 1s. 6d. a day for

Over 16 years' service, 1s. 9d. a day for

Over 18 years' service, 2s. a day for life. Over 20 years' service, 2s. 6d. a day for life.

"If qualified for the award of a Long Service Pension, 12d a day for each complete year

of pensionable service.

The usual additions to be made for good conduct badges and medals as allowed under the Long Service Scale and for petty time as laid down in Articles 1938, Clause 1, and 1932, Clause 4, of the King's Regulations and Admir-

alty Instructions.

"The 'over 10 years' rate to be restricted to Continuous Service ratings who entered the Royal Navy under Regulations which conferred a claim to a life pension, if invalided, after that period of service on the Continuous Service system. All men and boys entering the Naval Service on or after the first day of October 1921 to be required to render a minimum period of 14 years' pensionable service in order to qualify for a life pension

"(b) Gratuities.—Men discharged with less than the qualifying period of service required for the award of a life pension to be eligible for the grant of a gratuity of £2, plus an additional 10s. for each ten degrees of disability in excess of 20 per cent. in respect of each completed year

of service.

. "SCHEDULE III.

" MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

" (1) The foregoing scales to be applicable to the persons referred to in Articles 1196 and 1931, Clause 1, of the King's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, with the exception of those excluded, as regards non-attributable disabilities, by Article 356; always provided that the wound or injury or disability is not due to negligence or misconduct on the part of the man, or to his want of proper care. In the -latter cases, pension or gratuity may be withheld at Admiralty discretion, or awarded at such reduced rate as may be thought fit.

(2) These scales to be subject to reduction at the discretion of the Admiralty in the event of the cost of living falling considerably below its present level... Such reduction, if made, will apply to all pensions which are being drawn at the date of reduction, as well as to future grants.

(3) If any person, on being invalided from the Service, is suffering from two separate and distinct disabilities, and is eligible in respect of Majesty from time to time, by Order in Council,

one of them for a grant under Ministry of Pensions Regulations, and in respect of the other for a grant under these Regulations, only one grant will be made in respect of both.

This grant will be assessed partly under

Ministry of Pensions Regulations and partly under these Regulations, according to the proportion which the percentage of each disability, respectively, bears to the sum of the two percentages added together; the assessment under these Regulations being so regulated, however, as to ensure that the total grant made shall not be more than the person would receive if the two disabilities were dealt with as one combined disability under Ministry of Pensions Regulations, nor less than he would receive if they were so dealt with under these Regulations.

" (4) No compensation in respect of disability shall be payable under these Regulations to any person discharged after the 30th September 1921, except in respect of the sickness, wound or injury for which he is invalided, unless suffering from a wound or injury due to the Service, which is recorded on any Hurt Certificate that may have been granted. In the latter case, and provided that discharge was not due to the man's own request, and that the wound or injury was not occasioned by the late war or former wars, compensation may on discharge, but not later, be granted at the disablement element rate that would have been appropriate had he been invalided for such disability on date of discharge, but only in respect of the degree of disability persisting at that date.

(5) Where a seaman or marine is injured in such circumstances that a pension, allowance, or grant is payable to or in respect of him under these Regulations, and where he receives compensation from or on behalf of the person alleged to be responsible for the act or omission which caused the injury, any such compensation may be taken into consideration in assessing any pension, allowance, or grant which might be awarded to or in respect of the man; and where the compensation is received after assessment, it may be taken into consideration and the assessment may be amended or cancelled accord-

(6) The applicability of the foregoing scales to members of the Royal Fleet Reserve (Class B), the Royal Naval Reserve, and the Royal Naval Auxiliary Sick Berth Reserve to be reserved pending further consideration, notwithstanding any provision in existing Regulations to the contrary:

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what

is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THEREAS by Section 43 of the Explosives Act, 1875, it is provided that His may prohibit, either absolutely or except in pursuance of a licence of the Secretary of State under the Act, or may subject to conditions and restrictions the manufacture, keeping, importation, conveyance, and sale, or any of them, of any explosive which is of so dangerous a character that in the judgment of His Majesty it is expedient for the public safety to make such Order:

And whereas the explosives to which this Order applies are of so dangerous a character that in the judgment of His Majesty it is expedient for the public safety to make this Order.

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order and prescribe as follows:—

- 1. This Order applies to all explosives other than gunpowder, small-arm nitro-compound, safety cartridges made with gunpowder, or with small-arm nitro-compound, cartridges or charges for cannon or blasting made with gunpowder and not containing within themselves their own means of ignition, percussion caps, safety fuze, or fireworks.
- 2. No person shall sell any explosive to which this Order applies unless he complies with the following conditions:—
 - (i) He shall satisfy himself that the person desiring to purchase the explosive is in possession of a police certificate as provided by Orders in Council, the two Orders in Council of the date of 20th April 1883, or by the Order in Council of the date of the 26th October 1896.

Provided that this shall not apply to the owner agent or manager of a mine or quarry in respect of the sale by him of explosives to his employees for immediate use in the said mine or quarry.

- (ii) He shall keep a record of the nature and quantity of explosives sold, the date of each transaction, and the name and address of the purchaser, and shall show such record to any Government Inspector, police officer, or duly appointed officer of the Local Authority when called upon to do so.
- 3. This Order shall come into force from the date hereof.

WHEREAS by Section 8 Sub-section 1 of the Finance Act, 1919, it is provided that with a view to conferring a preference in the case of Empire products the duties of Customs on the goods specified in the Second Schedule to that Act shall on and after the date therein provided for be charged at preferential rates where the goods are shown to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Customs and Excise to have been consigned from and grown produced or

manufactured in the British Empire, and that where any territory becomes a territory under His Majesty's protection or is a territory in respect of which a Mandate of the League of Nations is exercised by the Government of any part of His Majesty's Dominions His Majesty may by Order in Council direct that that territory shall be included within the definition of the British Empire for the purposes of the said Section:

And whereas in accordance with the provisions of the Treaty of Versailles Mandates of the League of Nations have been conferred upon His Majesty for and on behalf of and are being exercised by the Governments of those parts of His Majesty's Dominions hereinafter appearing in respect of the under-mentioned territories that is to say:—

(a) The South - West Africa Territory (formerly German South-West Africa) exercised by the Government of the Union of South Africa;

(b) the territory of New Guinea (i.e., the former German possessions in the Pacific Ocean situated south of the Equator other than German Samoa and Nauru) exercised by the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia, and

(c) the territory of Western Samua (formerly German Samoa) exercised by the Government of the Dominion of New Zealand:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to direct, and it is hereby directed, as follows:—

- (1) The above-mentioned territories shall, as from the 1st of February 1922, be included within the definition of the British Empire for the purposes of Section 8 of the Finance Act, 1919.
- (2) This Order may be cited as the Imperial Preference Order (No. 1), 1922.

OVERTIME RATES (AS VARIED) FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS EMPLOYED ON TIME-WORK.

Section I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade to be as follows:—

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

Section II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of Hours worked by Male or Female workers employed on Time-Work in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the Trade shall be as follows:—

- (a) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable as specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule, i.e., Double-Time.
- (b) For Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Satutory Hollidays, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time Rate otherwise applicable as specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule, i.e., Time-and-a-Half
- (c) For all time worked in any week, in excess of 48 hours, One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable as specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule, i.e., Time-and-a-Half, except where a higher amount is payable under Sub-Section (a) of this Section.
- (d) The Overtime Rates shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) the number of hours worked exceed 82, or in the case of

Saturday exceeds $4\frac{1}{4}$, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

Provided that in the case of those classes of workers in the Municipal Burgh of Brechin, the Parish of Brechin, the Municipal Burgh of Forfar, the Parish of Forfar, the Burgh of Kirriemuir, the Parish of Kirriemuir, the Parishes of Blairgownie and Rattray, the Burgh of Carnoustie or the Parish of Logie Pert, who in accordance with the established practice of the establishment attend for nine hours per day on five days of the week and for three hours on Saturday, the Overtime Rate specified in Sub-Section (b) of this Section shall not be payable in respect of the first quarter of an hour in excess of $8\frac{3}{4}$ hours on any day except Saturdays, Sundays, and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, but shall be payable in respect of all hours worked on any such day in excess of nine hours.

Provided also that in the case of those classes of workers in the areas specified in the first proviso to this Section who, in accordance with the established practice of the establishment attend only on five days a week, the Overtime Rate specified in Sub-Section (b) of this Section shall not be payable in respect of the first three-quarters of an hour in excess of $8\frac{3}{4}$ hours on any day except Saturdays, Sundays, and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, but shall be payable on any such day in respect of all hours worked in excess of $9\frac{1}{4}$ hours.

Note.—The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART IV.

The General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule are weekly rates based on a week of 48 hours, and are subject to a proportionate adjustment according as the number of hours of employment in any week is less than 48.

PART V.

For the purpose of this Notice a Female Weaving Learner means a Female Worker who is:-

- (a) Definitely and effectively learning weaving under the immediate instruction of a Weaving Mistress; and
- (b) Employed under conditions such that she shall cease to be employed on time-work and shall be employed on piece-work at the earliest date practicable.

PART VI.

The respective Minimum Rates set out in this Schedule shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Male and Female workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, that is to say:—The preparing, spinning or weaving (a) of jute or (b) of jute and any other fibre, except flax or hemp;

Including:

- (1) The preparing and spinning of waste reclaimed at any stage; and
- (2) All packing, despatching, warehousing, storing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the above-mentioned work; but

Excluding:

- (1) The calendering, bleaching, dyeing or finishing of any of the above-mentioned materials; and
- (2) The preparing or spinning of materials required for the making or re-making of (a) rope (including driving rope and banding); (b) cord (including blind and window cord, but excluding silk, worsted and other fancy cords); (c) core for wire ropes; (d) lines; (e) twine (including binder and trawl twine); (f) lanyards; (g) net and similar articles, when such preparing or spinning is carried on in the same factory or workshop as the said making or re-making; and
- (3) The making or repair of sacks or bags; and also
- (4) The weaving of carpets, rugs or mats.

PART VII.

Section I.—The above minimum rates of wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from Wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

Section II.—The above minimum rates of wages shall be without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 3RD FEBRUARY 1922.)

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

(1) Where a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority suspects the existence of Foot-and-Mouth Disease in any place in his district he may prohibit the movement of animals into or out of such area, comprising the place where the disease is suspected to exist, as he thinks desirable, and also the movement of any animal along any highway or thoroughfare within such area, and where any such prohibition is issued any person who shall move any animal in contravention of the prohibition shall be guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894, unless he shows to the satisfaction of the Court that he had no knowledge of the prohibition being in operation.

(2) Any such prohibition shall be signed by the Veterinary Inspector, who shall forthwith cause the same to be published in such manner as he shall think desirable for the purpose of notification thereof to the persons affected, and twenty-two.

send copies of the prohibition to the Chief Constable or a Superintendent or Inspector of the police of the district, and to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

(3) A prohibition under this Article shall continue in operation until it is withdrawn by the Veterinary Inspector or by the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, or where it is not so withdrawn until the expiration of three days after the date on which it is made.

(4) A prohibition under this Article shall not affect the movement of animals where they are moved through the area by railway with-

out being untrucked within the area.

(5) A prohibition under this Article may apply to an area in the districts of more than one Local Authority if the prohibition is signed by Veterinary Inspectors of each Local Authority.

Prohibition of Holding of Markets or Sales of Animals.

1. The holding of a market, fair, or sale of cattle, sheep, or swine within the District of any Local Authority described in the Schedule hereto is hereby prohibited.

Offences.

2. If a market, fair or sale is held in contravention of this Order, the person holding the same and the owner or consignee of each head of cattle, and of each sheep or pig exposed thereat, and the person exposing the same thereat and the purchaser thereat of any cattle, sheep or swine, such last mentioned person or such purchaser knowing the market or fair to be held in contravention as aforesaid shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the sixth day of February nineteen hundred and twenty-two. In witness whereof the Official Seal of the | Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries is hereunto affixed this fifth day of February, nineteen hundred and twenty-two.

FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (GREAT BRITAIN) ORDER OF 1922.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows :-

Application of Order to Scheduled Districts.

1. Parts I., III, and IV, of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order of 1920, hereinafter referred to as "the princiapl Order," are hereby applied, subject to the modifications hereinafter appearing, to the several districts described in the First Schedule hereto, each of which shall be a Scheduled District for the purposes of that Order.

Prohibited Areas.

2. The several Areas described in the Second Schedule hereto are hereby declared to be Prohibited Areas for the purposes of the Principal Order.

Movement within Prohibited Areas.

3. Where an Inspector of the Ministry or of the Local Authority after inquiry considers it necessary owing to exceptional circumstances that an animal in a Prohibited Area should be permitted to be moved within the same Prohibited Area as often as occasion may require between different parts of the same farm, he may, notwithstanding any prohibi-tion of movement contained in the Principal Order, authorise such movement by an Occupation Licence, and the Inspector shall insert in the Licence such conditions as he may consider necessary or desirable for the purpose of | Schedule hereto are hereby revoked.

preventing the animals referred to in the licence from coming into contact with any other animals.

Slaughter within 48 hours of Animals moved with a Licence to a Bacon Factory or Slaughter-

4. Where animals are moved into or within any Scheduled District with a licence under the Principal Order or this Order authorising their movement to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse, the animals on arrival at the bacon factory or salughterhouse shall be detained therein until slaughtered, and shall be slaughtered therein within forty-eight hours of their arrival thereat.

Prohibition of Movement out of certain Areas Specified in Third Schedule.

5. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control od Movement) Order of 1920, or this Order, no cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be moved out of any of the areas described in the Third Schedule hereto.

Modification of Principal Order as regards granting of Movement Licences.

6. Where a licence is granted under Article 8 of the principal Order for the movement of animals from premises in any Scheduled District described in the First Schedule to this Order, to premises in the same Scheduled District, but situate in the district of another Local Authority such licence may be granted only by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises to which the animals are to be moved are situate. No Licence shall be granted by an Inspector of any Local Authority if in his opinion it is undesirable to grant it.

Movement out of any Scheduled District for Immediate Slaughter.

7. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order of 1920, an animal may be moved from any premises situate within a Scheduled District, but not within any Prohibited Area or any area described in the Third Schedule hereto, to any slaughterhouse in another Scheduled District, if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the slaughterhouse is situate; provided that no such licence shall be granted for movement to a sluaghterhouse situate in a Prohibited Area.

Offences.

8. If in respect of any animal the conditions of any Licence granted under this Order are not complied with, or if any animal is not slaughtered as required by this Order, the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof shall each, according to and in respect of his own defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Revocation.

9. The Orders described in the Fourth
