WHEREAS in pursuance of the powers conferred on Him by the Treaty of Peace Act, 1919, and the Treaties of Peace (Austria and Bulgaria) Act, 1920, and the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Act, 1921, His Majesty in Council was pleased to make the Treaty of Peace Order, 1919, the Treaty of Peace (Austria) Order, 1920, the Treaty of Peace (Bulgaria) Order, 1920, and the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Order, 1921, and various Orders amending the aforesaid Orders:

And whereas it is expedient that the aforesaid Orders as amended should be further amended in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

- 1. The Orders made under the said Acts shall have effect and shall be deemed always to have had effect as if the words "shall be the period ending the ninth day of February nineteen hundred and twenty-three" were substituted:
  - (a) In Article 1 (xvii) of the Treaty of Peace Order, 1919 (as amended), for the

- words "shall be nineteen months from the coming into force of the Treaty";
- (b) In Article 1 (xxiv) of the Treaty of Peace (Austria) Order, 1920 (as amended), for the words "shall be eighteen months from the coming into force of the Treaty";
- (c) In Article 1 (xvii) of the Treaty of Peace (Bulgaria) Order, 1920 (as amended), for the words "shall be eighteen months from the coming into force of the Treaty"; and
- (d) In Article 1 (xxiv) of the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Order, 1921, for the words "shall be ten months from the coming into force of the Treaty."
- 2. This Order may be cited as the Treaties of Peace Orders (Amendment) Order, 1922, and the Treaty of Peace Orders, 1919 to 1921 and this Order, the Treaty of Peace (Austria) Orders, 1920 to 1921 and this Order, the Treaty of Peace (Bulgaria) Orders, 1920 to 1921 and this Order, and the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Order, 1921 and this Order, may respectively be together the Treaty Orders, 19191922, to Treaty the Peace (Austria) Orders, 1920 to 1922, the Treaty of Peace (Bulgaria) Orders, 1920 to 1922, and the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Orders, 1921 to 1922.

#### INTOXICATING LIQUOR, SCOTLAND.

ORDER, DATED 7TH MARCH 1922, MADE BY THE SECRETARY FOR SCOTLAND UNDER SECTION 16 (1) OF THE LICENSING ACT, 1921 (11 & 12 Geo. 5, c. 42).

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by Section sixteen, sub-section one, of the Licensing Act, 1921, I hereby make the following Order:—

Except as hereinafter provided, no person shall sell by retail or supply, either by himself or by any servant or agent, any exciseable liquor in any licensed premises or in any club in the Cromarty Firth or the Gretna State Management District as defined in the Second Schedule to the Licensing Act, 1921.

Provided that the above Order shall not extend to—

- (1) the sale by retail or the supply of exciseable liquor in any licensed premises in respect of which a certificate for the sale by retail of exciseable liquors was in force on the twelfth day of February 1920, or in any club which was at that date registered in manner provided by the Licensing (Scotland) Acts, 1903 to 1913;
- (2) the sale by retail or supply of exciseable liquor in any licensed premises or club in which such sale or supply is or may be hereafter carried on under written authority of the Secretary for Scotland and in accordance with such terms and conditions as may be specified in such authority.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES (AS VARIED) FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS, EFFECTIVE AS FROM 8th March 1922.\*

Male Workers of 21 years of age and over—General Minimum Time-Rates, 1s. 1d. per hour.

Male Workers under 21 years of age (General Minimum Time-Rates, according to age: see Part I. of the Schedule below).

Female Workers of 18 years of age and over—General Minimum Time-Rates, 7½d. per hour.

Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, 81d. per hour.

Female Workers under 18 years of age (General Minimum Time-Rates, according to age and experience; see Part II. of the Schedule below). (Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, according to age; see Part II. of the Schedule below).

#### GUARANTEED TIME-RATES FOR FEMALE PIECE-WORKERS:

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 6d, per hour.

Workers under 17 years of age (according to age and experience; see Part II. of the Schedule below.)

#### Provided that :-

(a) In the case of workers entering the trade for the first time between the ages of 16 and 18 years, the General Minimum Time-Rates and Guaranteed Time-Rates for Piece-Workers

<sup>\*</sup> Note:—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in no case later than 14th March 1922.

payable during the first six months' period of employment shall be ½d. per hour less than the Minimum Rates otherwise applicable as set out above. Such workers, on completing six months' employment in the trade, shall be entitled to the Minimum Rates appropriate to their age as set out in the foregoing table.

(b) In the case of workers entering the trade for the first time at or over the age of 18 years, the General Minimum Time-Rates payable during the first twelve months' period of employment shall be as follows:—

The General Minimum Time-Rate applicable to such workers on completing twelve months' employment in the trade, shall be  $7\frac{1}{2}$ d. per hour.

Note.—(A) Where a worker is employed on Piece-Work, each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker, not less than the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate.

(B) A worker employed upon Piece-Work is entitled to receive not less than the Guaranteed Time-Rate appropriate to her age (as set out in Column III. above) in any case where her earnings on Piece-Work are less than such sum.

#### PART III.

#### OVERTIME RATES (AS VARIED) FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS (ALL AGES).

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays shall be regarded as Overtime, to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime for all Workers in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows:—

- (a) For the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sunday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter.
- (b) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sunday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a Half times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Half.
- (c) For all time worked on Sunday, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Double-Time.
- (d) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (b) and (c) of this Section

The Overtime Rates shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday) the number of hours worked exceeds 9, or in the case of Saturday, exceeds  $4\frac{1}{2}$ , notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

Section III.—The provisions of this Part of this Notice are without prejudice to the payment of Overtime Rates after a lesser number of hours than those declared by the Trade Board to be the normal number in the trade, in cases where such lesser number of hours constitutes the number customarily worked in the establishment.

Note.—The hours which Female Workers, Young Persons and Children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and to the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

#### PART IV.

Section I.—The above Minimum Rates apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920.

SECTION II. - The Trade as specified in the above-mentioned Order is as follows :--

1. The making of such articles as are specified in (a) and (b) below, from linen or cotton or mixed linen and cotton fabrics (excepting knitted fabrics), or from other textile fabrics

when the work is carried on in establishments mainly engaged in the making of such articles from the before-mentioned fabrics, viz.:—

- (a) Handkerchiefs (including Mufflers or Flags when made in association or in conjunction with handkerchiefs);
- (b) Bed-Linen, Towels, Dusters, Table-napery, Bedspreads, Tea-cloths, Table-centres, Sideboard-covers, Cushion-covers or similar household articles;

including all or any of the following operations:—

- (i) Hooking, cutting or tearing the material;
- (ii) Vice-folding;
- (iii) Machine hemming, hem-stitching, spoking, over-locking, tambouring, button-holing, and other plain or fancy machine stitching;
- (iv) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework done by machine, whether before or after the making of the articles of the description specified above;
- (v) The following processes, if done by machine:—Thread-drawing, thread-clipping, top-sewing, scalloping, nickelling and paring;
- (vi) All processes of laundering, smoothing, folding, ornamenting, boxing, finishing, warehousing, packing, and other similar operations incidental to or appertaining to the making of the articles of the description specified above.
- 2. The making-up in linen warehouses or in establishments mainly engaged in linen lapping, of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile fabrics in the piece, or of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile articles cut from the piece, including:—

Measuring, cutting, lapping, ornamenting, boxing, warehousing, packing and similar operations.

#### PART V.

Section I.—The above Minimum Rates must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

Section II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

FLAX AND HEMP TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

Proposal to vary Minimum Rates of Wages for Certain Classes of Male and Female Workers.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Flax and Hemp Trade in Great Britain as specified in the Trade Boards (Flax and Hemp) Order, 1919, hereby give notice that they propose to vary the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, General Minimum Piece-Rates, and Overtime Rates at present fixed and set out in their Notice F.H. (6), dated 21st October 1921, in their application to certain classes of Male and Female Workers, the proposed variations being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

The Minister of Labour has given his consent to the issue of this Notice.

Provided that the above General Minimum Time-Rates for Learners employed in weaving, warping, winding or spinning shall be payable only in respect of one period of learnership not exceeding six months.

#### PART I.—continued.

... Provided also that the above General Minimum Time-Rates for Learners employed in cardcutting shall be payable only in respect of one period of learnership not exceeding twelve months.

Provided also that a Learner who has completed any one of the periods of learnership specified in the first or second Provisos to this Section shall cease to be regarded as a Learner and shall receive not less than the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate for workers other than Learners.

(iii) For the purpose of this Schedule, a Female Learner shall be deemed to mean a female worker who is employed during the whole or a substantial part of her time in learning weaving, warping, winding, spinning or card-cutting by an employer who ensures that she shall receive reasonable and proper facilities for such learning.

#### PART IV.

### DEFINITION OF "WEEK."

Section I.—(a) In the case of classes of whole-time workers employed by the week or longer period whose customary working week consists of a number of hours less than 48 but not less than 44, "a week" means a week of the number of hours customarily worked by the class in question:

(b) In all other cases "a week" means a week of 48 hours.

Section II.—For the purpose of calculating the hourly rate applicable in respect of each hour of employment the rates set out in Parts I. and III. of this Schedule must be divided:—

- (a) In the case of the workers referred to in Section I. (a) of this Part by the number of hours per week customarily worked by the class in question:
- (b) In all other cases by 48.

Section III.—Payment at not less than the hourly rate calculated as described in Section II. of this Part must be made for all hours of employment whether in excess of the customary working week or not, except for those hours in respect of which a higher rate is payable under the overtime provisions specified in Part VI. below.

#### PART V.

#### PART VI.

### PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

Overtime Rates calculated on the proposed minimum rates set out in Parts I., II., III., and V., of this Schedule in the manner specified in Part VII. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice F.H. (6), dated 21st October 1921, shall apply in substitution for the proposed minimum rates set out in Parts I., II., III., and V., of this Schedule in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the Schedule to the above-mentioned Notice F.H. (6) to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

#### PART VII.

The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all male and female workers of the classes specified in this Schedule in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Flax and Hemp) Order, 1919, and set out in Part VIII. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice F.H. (6), dated 21st October 1921.

\* Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full-pay period, but in any case not later than 17th March 1922.

#### SCHEDULE.

#### PART I.

OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS EMPLOYED ON PIECE-WORK.

Section I.—In accordance with Section 3 (i) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In any week	 48
On any day (other than Saturday)	 $8\frac{3}{4}$
On Saturday	 41

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

Section II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by Male and Female Workers employed on Piece-Work in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be :—

- (a) For all time worked on Sundays or Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, Piece-Rates which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker not less than the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate as fixed by the Trade Board with the addition of the full amount of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate which would have been payable if the worker had been employed on time-work.
- (b) For Overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, Piece-Rates which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker not less than the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate as fixed by the Trade Board with the addition of one-half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate which would have been payable if the worker had been employed on time-work.
- (c) For all time worked, in any week, in excess of 48 hours, Piece-Rates which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker not less than the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate as fixed by the Trade Board with the addition of one-half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate which would have been payable if the worker had been employed on time-work, except where a higher amount is payable under Subsection (a) of this Section.
  - (d) The Overtime Rates shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday or Customary Public or Statutory Holiday) the number of hours worked exceed 8\frac{3}{4}, or in the case of Saturday exceeds 4\frac{1}{4}, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

Provided that in the case of those classes of workers in the Municipal Burgh of Brechin, the Parish of Brechin, the Municipal Burgh of Forfar, the Parish of Forfar, the Burgh of Kirriemuir, the Parish of Kirriemuir, the Parishes of Blairgowrie and Rattray, the Burgh of Carnoustie or the Parish of Logie Pert, who in accordance with the established practice of the establishment attend for nine hours per day on five days of the week and for three hours on Saturday, the Overtime Rate specified in Subsection (b) of this Section shall not be payable in respect of the first quarter of an hour in excess of 83 hours on any day except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, but shall be payable in respect of all hours worked on any such day in excess of nine hours.

Provided also that in the case of those classes of workers in the areas specified in the first proviso to this Section who, in accordance with the established practice of the establishment

attend only on five days a week, the Overtime Rate specified in Sub-section (b) of this Section shall not be payable in respect of the first three-quarters of an hour in excess of  $8\frac{3}{4}$  hours on any day except Saturdays, Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, but shall be payable on any such day in respect of all hours worked in excess of  $9\frac{1}{4}$  hours.

Note.—The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

#### PART II.

#### GENERAL.

SECTION I.—The above Overtime Rates shall apply, subject to the provisions of this Schedule and of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Male and Female Workers employed on Piece-Work in respect of all time worked in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in any branch of the Jute Trade as specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, that is to say:—The preparing, spinning or weaving (a) of jute or (b) of jute and any other fibre; except flax or hemp;

#### Includina:

- (1) The preparing and spinning of waste reclaimed at any stage; and
- (2) All packing, despatching, warehousing, storing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the abovementioned work; but

#### Excluding :-

- (1) The calendering, bleaching, dyeing or finishing of any of the above-mentioned materials; and
- (2) The preparing or spinning of materials required for the making or re-making of (a) rope (including driving rope and banding), (b) cord (including blind and window cord, but excluding silk, worsted and other fancy cords), (c) core for wire ropes, (d) lines, (e) twine (including binder and twine trawl), (f) lanyards, (g) net and similar articles, when such preparing or spinning is carried on in the same factory or workshop as the said making or re-making; and
- (3) The making or repair of sacks or bags; and also
- (4) The weaving of carpets, rugs or mats.

Section II.—The above minimum rates of wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION III.—The above minimum rates of wages shall be without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.
