WHEREAS in pursuance of the powers conferred on Him by the Treaty of Peace Act, 1919, and the Treaties of Peace (Austria and Bulgaria) Act, 1920, and the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Act, 1921; His

Majesty in Council was pleased to make the Treaty of Peace Order, 1919, the Treaty of Peace (Austria) Order, 1920, the Treaty of Peace (Bulgaria) Order, 1920, and the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Order, 1921, and various Orders amending the aforesaid Orders :

And whereas it is expedient that the aforesaid Orders as amended should be further amended in manner hereinafter appearing :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows :—

1. The Orders made under the said Acts shall have effect and shall be deemed always to have had effect as if the words "shall be the period ending the ninth day of February nineteen hundred and twenty-three" were substituted :

(a) In Article 1 (xviii) of the Treaty of Peace Order, 1919 (as amended), for the words "shall be nineteen months from the coming into force of the Treaty" ;

(b) In Article 1 (xxiv) of the Treaty of Peace (Austria) Order, 1920 (as amended), for the words "shall be eighteen months from the coming into force of the Treaty" ;

(c) In Article 1 (xvii) of the Treaty of Peace (Bulgaria) Order, 1920 (as amended), for the words "shall be eighteen months from the coming into force of the Treaty" ; and

(d) In Article 1 (xxiv) of the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Order, 1921, for the words "shall be ten months from the coming into force of the Treaty." ;

2. This Order may be cited as the Treaties of Peace Orders (Amendment) Order, 1922, and the Treaty of Peace Orders, 1919 to 1921 and this Order, the Treaty of Peace (Austria) Orders, 1920 to 1921 and this Order, the Treaty of Peace (Bulgaria) Orders, 1920 to 1921 and this Order, and the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Order, 1921 and this Order, may respectively be cited together as the Treaty of Peace Orders, 1919 to 1922, the Treaty of Peace (Austria) Orders, 1920 to 1922, the Treaty of Peace (Bulgaria) Orders, 1920 to 1922, and the Treaty of Peace (Hungary) Orders, 1921 to 1922.

TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS AND TREASURY BONDS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice, that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Friday, the 17th March 1922, at 1 o'clock, for

(a) Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877; the National Debt Act, 1889; and the War Loan Acts, 1914-1919; and

(b) £5 per cent. Treasury Bonds, repayable at par on the 1st February 1927.

2. The maximum amount of Treasury Bills and Treasury Bonds to be issued will be £45,000,000. The amount of Treasury Bonds issued will not exceed £5,000,000, but subject to that limit the total amount issued will be divided between Bills and Bonds in such proportions as Their Lordships may determine.

TREASURY BILLS.

3. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the

Tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 20th March 1922, to Saturday, the 25th March 1922, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

£5 PER CENT. TREASURY BONDS, 1927.

6. The Bonds will be in denominations of £50, £100, £200, £500, £1000, and £5000. They will be exempt from Corporation Profits Tax, and will in all respects rank *pari passu* with those issued under the Prospectus of the 21st January 1922. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 20th March 1922, to Saturday, the 25th March 1922, inclusive; the first dividend, payable on the 1st August 1922, will represent in the case of each Bond interest to that date from the date of the Bond.

7. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bonds required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one shilling) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bonds of different dates.

8. Tenders must be made through a London banker, discount house or broker.

9. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of cash or a banker's draft on the Bank of England not later than 2 o'clock (Saturday 12 o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills or Bonds are to be dated.

10. In virtue of the provisions of Section 1 (4) of the War Loan Act, 1919, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills and Bonds.

11. Tenders must be made on the printed forms, which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

12. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

PROPOSAL TO VARY THE MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade

Boards Act, 1909 and 1918, for the branches of trade specified in the Trade Boards (Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares) Order, 1919, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to Vary the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Female Workers in the trade at present effective and set out in the Schedule to the Notice Q (11) issued by the Trade Board and dated 12th January 1922, as set out in the Schedule below.

This Notice is issued with the consent of the Minister of Labour.

NOTE.—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in any case not later than 2nd April 1922.

(c) In determining length of experience for the purpose of this Section regard shall be had to all experience in the laundering of articles of any description or the processes and operations incidental thereto in any laundry which is carried on by way of trade or for the purpose of gain, or which is carried on as ancillary to another business.

PART II.

OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE WASH-HOUSE AND GENERAL INSIDE WORKERS EMPLOYED ON TIME-WORK.

SECTION I.

The Trade Board have declared in accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows :—

In any week	48
On Saturday	5

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.

The Minimum Rates for Overtime to apply in respect of all hours worked by Time-Workers in excess of the normal number of hours of work in the trade as declared, and set out in Section I. of this Part shall be as follows :—

- (a) For all hours worked in excess of 5 on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter, for the first four hours, and One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half thereafter, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.
- (b) For all time worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double Time, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.
- (c) For all hours worked in excess of 48 in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be Time-and-a-Quarter for the first six hours and Time-and-a-Half thereafter except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of Sub-Sections (a) and (b) of this Section.
- (d) The Overtime Rates shall not apply to Piece-Workers.

Provided that, where, in the case of Workers to whom the Shops Act applies, the day which under that Act constitutes the weekly short day (half holiday) is a day other than Saturday, and in the case of other Workers another day is substituted for Saturday, under the provisions of Section 43 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, as respects Female Workers and Young Persons, the above provisions shall apply as though such half holiday or short day were substituted for Saturday and Saturday were substituted for such half holiday or short day.

Provided also that in cases in which another day is substituted for a Statutory Holiday under the provisions of Section 35 of the Factory Act, 1901, the above provisions shall apply as though such other day were the Statutory Holiday and the Statutory Holiday were an ordinary working day.

PART III.

APPLICABILITY OF RATES.

SECTION I.

The Minimum Rates set out in this Notice apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Male Wash-House and General Inside Workers in Great Britain in respect of all time

during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919 (that is to say, the laundering of articles of every description and all processes and operations incidental thereto performed by the way of trade or for the purpose of gain), as varied by the Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919, the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920, and the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, by virtue of which all processes of laundering and other similar operations incidental to or appertaining to the making of the articles specified in the Appendices to the three last-mentioned Orders are excluded from the scope of the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919.

The Minimum Rates set out in this Notice do not apply to Male Workers wholly or mainly employed as Transport Workers, Enginemen or Stokers.

SECTION II.

The Minimum Rates set out in this Notice must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any super-annuation or other provident fund.

SECTION III.

The Minimum Rates set out in this Notice are without prejudice to Workers earning higher rates of wages.

The Minister of Labour hereby gives notice, pursuant to Section 36 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, that he proposes to make a Special Order under Section 39 of the Act providing that contributions paid by employers under the Unemployment Insurance (Mercantile Marine) Special Order, 1921, in respect of masters, seamen and apprentices who are neither domiciled nor have a place of residence in the United Kingdom shall be credited to the Special Fund for seamen constituted under paragraph (c) of Sub-Section (1) of Section 27 of the National Health Insurance Act, 1918, and shall be applied by the Governing Body of the said Special Fund for the provision of such benefits specified in the scheme prepared by the said Governing Body as may be approved by the Minister and the Board of Trade.

FOREIGN ANIMALS (AMENDMENT)
ORDER OF 1922.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Animals from the Channel Islands Prohibited.

1. Unless and until the Minister otherwise orders, it shall not be lawful to land any animal brought from the Channel Islands, and the First Schedule (Prohibited Countries and Parts of Countries) to the Foreign Animals Order of 1910 shall be read and have effect as if those Islands were included in the list of Prohibited Countries and Parts of Countries mentioned in that Schedule.

Interpretation.

2. In this Order terms have the same meaning as in the Foreign Animals Order of 1910.

Commencement.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the twelfth day of March nineteen hundred and twenty-two.

Short Title.

4. This Order may be cited as the FOREIGN ANIMALS (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1922.

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF
AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 13TH MARCH 1922.)

FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (CHANGE
OF OCCUPATION) ORDER OF 1922.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

1.—(1) Where by reason of the termination of his right of occupation of any land the owner of any live stock on such land is unable to remove the same therefrom by reason of any restriction of movement imposed by an Order under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, relating to foot-and-mouth disease, the person entitled to the occupation of the land on such termination aforesaid—

(a) shall afford the owner of the live stock and any person authorised by him all such facilities for feeding, tending or otherwise using the stock or for the sale of the stock as the owner thereof may reasonably require; or

(b) where the owner thereof is unable or unwilling to avail himself of such facilities, shall take all such steps as are reasonably necessary for the proper feeding, tending or otherwise using the stock.

(2) These provisions shall continue to apply so long as the restriction on movement prevents the removal of the stock, and for seven days after such restriction ceases to operate, and the owner of the stock shall be liable to pay to the person who affords any such facilities, or renders any such services, as aforesaid, in compliance with this Order, such sums by way of remuneration or recoupment of expenses as may be just and reasonable, the amount in default of agreement to be determined by arbitration under and in accordance with the provisions of the Second Schedule to the Agricultural Holdings Act, 1908.

2. This Order may be cited as the FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (CHANGE OF OCCUPATION) ORDER OF 1922.
