RETIREMENT OF SURPLUS OFFICERS OF THE
 INDIAN ARMY.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS a necessity exists for reducing the number of officers in Our Indian Army.

Our will and pleasure is that any of such officers whom Our Secretary of State for India in Council may, within a period of twelve months from the date of this Our Warrant, decide to be surplus to the requirements of Our Indian Army, shall, unless appointed to other branches of Our Army or to Our Air Force, be retired from Our Army with such retiring gratuity and under such conditions as Our Secretary of State for India in Council may prescribe.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, this 25th day of April 1922, in the 12th year of Our Reign.

STAMPED OR PRESSED METAL WARES TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES (AS VARIED) FOR MALE WORKERS).

*Effective as from 20th May 1922.**

* NOTE.—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in no case later than 26th May 1922.

GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES :

Special Classes of Skilled Male Workers of 21 years of age and over, 1s. 4d., 1s. 6d., 1s. 6½d., 1s. 7½d. or 1s. 8d. per hour, according to occupation and length of experience.
 Male Workers of 21 years of age and over other than these special classes, 1s. 1½d. per hour.
 Male Workers under 21 years of age, according to age and occupation. (See Sections II. and III. of Part I. A of the Schedule below.)

PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES :

Male Workers (all classes), 15 per cent. above the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rates.

OVERTIME RATES : See Part III. of the Schedule below.

SECTION IV.—For the purpose of the above Rates the following definitions apply :—

Braziers :

A Brazier of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on brazing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. as hereinafter defined.

A Brazier of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Brazier and who is an expert in brazing in all classes of metal except aluminium.

A Brazier of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II., as above defined, is also an expert in brazing aluminium or is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Burnishers :

A Burnisher of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on burnishing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. as hereinafter defined.

A Burnisher of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Burnisher and who is an expert hook and straight Burnisher at the vice and satisfactorily burnishes deep thin shell work at the lathe.

A Burnisher of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II., as above defined, is an expert in speed and quality in all classes of work or is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Drop-Stampers :

A Drop-Stamper of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on drop-stamping and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. as hereinafter defined.

A Drop Stamper of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Drop-Stamper and who undertakes all classes of deep or shallow work in all strengths of the metal used.

A Drop-Stamper of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II., as above defined, is an expert in all classes of work or is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Dippers who are also Bronzers :

A Worker of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on dipping and bronzing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. as hereinafter defined.

A Worker of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Dipper and Bronzer and who is an all-round Dipper and Bronzer and also does art bronzing and colouring, or electro-plating or has a knowledge of electro-plating.

A Worker of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. as above defined, also has an expert knowledge of art bronzing or metal colouring or electro-depositing and solutions or is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

Polishers :

A Polisher of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on polishing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. as hereinafter defined.

A Polisher of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Polisher and is an expert in all processes of any class of common work and can emery-bob and mop best work.

A Polisher of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II., as above defined, is also an expert in all processes of both common and best work or is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

PART II.

PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES (AS VARIED) FOR ALL MALE WORKERS
(ALL AGES).

The Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate for any class of Male Workers shall be 15 per cent. above the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate for such class, as set out in Part I. of this Schedule.

NOTE.—In the case of all Male Workers employed on Piece-Work, each Piece-Rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate to an Ordinary worker, *i.e.*, a worker of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question.

PART III.

OVERTIME RATES (AS VARIED) FOR MALE WORKERS (ALL AGES).

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (i) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows :—

In any week	47
On Saturday	4½

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker, whether employed on time-work or on piece-work in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows :—

- (a) For all hours worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be twice the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double-Time.
- (b) For all hours worked in excess of four-and-a-half on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week, does not exceed 47.
- (c) For all hours worked in excess of 47 in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to Time-and-a-Quarter for the first two hours and Time-and-a-Half thereafter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of Sub-Sections (a) and (b) of this Section.

NOTE.—The hours which young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all male workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares) Order, 1919.

SECTION II.—The Trade as specified in the above-mentioned Order is as follows :—

The manufacture from metals (other than precious metals) by the processes of cold stamping or cold pressing (including cutting or piercing) of cabinet fittings, window fittings, curtain accessories, stationers' sundries, drapers' sundries, fittings for gas or electric light, fittings for suit-cases or handbags or purses, buckles, eyelets, ferrules, labels, collar studs, tie-clips, thimbles, photograph frames, stamped chains, bells, fancy nails (excluding the shanks), parts of safety razors (excluding the blades), parts of braces or suspenders, corset steels or busks, whistles, tin-openers, medals or any similar articles or metal parts of such articles ;

Including :—

- (a) The operations of annealing, hardening, barrelling, polishing, bronzing, nickelling, lacquering, japanning, non-vitreous enamelling, tinning or assembling, where these operations are carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of such stamped or pressed metal articles ;
- (b) The operations of carding, boxing, packeting, labelling, weighing, packing, warehousing or despatching, where these operations are incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of such stamped or pressed metal articles ;

But Excluding :—

- (a) The operations specified in the Trade Boards (Hollow-ware) Order, 1913 ;
- (b) The making of buttons or any operations incidental thereto ;
- (c) The making of coffin furniture or any operations incidental thereto ;
- (d) The making of pins, hairpins, hooks and eyes, hair-curlers, snap fasteners or safety pins or any operations incidental thereto ;
- (e) The making of steel pens and the making of stationers' metal sundries or other similar metal articles when carried on as a subsidiary branch of work in association with or in conjunction with the making of steel pens, so as to provide a common or interchangeable form of employment for the workers ;

- (f) The minting of coinage of the realm ;
 (g) The process of hand-embossing.

PART V.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these minimum rates of wages.

Signed by Order of the Trade Board and in pursuance of an Order of the Minister of Labour confirming the Minimum Rates as varied by the Trade Board and set out above and specifying the 20th day of May 1922, as the date from which they should become effective.

Every occupier of a factory or workshop or of any place used for giving out work to outworkers, shall, on receipt of this Notice, post up and keep posted up a sufficient number of true copies thereof in prominent positions, in every factory, workshop, or place used for giving out work in such a manner as to ensure that in each case the Notice shall be brought to the knowledge of all workers employed by him or on his premises who are affected thereby. Penalty for non-compliance, a fine not exceeding 40s.

The Right Hon. W. C. Bridgeman, M.P., Secretary for Mines, has appointed Mr. Richard Edwards to be a Junior Inspector of Mines under the Coal Mines Acts, 1887 to 1919, and has instructed him to act also as an Inspector for the purposes of the Metalliferous Mines Regulation Acts, 1872 and 1875, and of the Quarries Act, 1894.

Under the provisions of the Mining Industry Act, 1920, Mr. Bridgeman has further appointed Mr. Edwards to be an Inspector of Factories and Workshops for the purposes of the Factories and Workshops Act, 1901, so far as it applies to quarries and pitbanks.

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF
 AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 12TH MAY 1922.)

BERWICKSHIRE AND DISTRICT (FOOT-
 AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF
 1922 (No. 3).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Declaration of Prohibited Area and Modification of Restrictions in Scheduled District.

1.—(1) The area described in the Schedule hereto is hereby declared to be a Prohibited Area for the purposes of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order of 1920, hereinafter referred to as the "principal Order."

(2) Part III. of that Order is hereby applied to the Scheduled District described in the Berwickshire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1922 (No. 2).

(3) The provisions of Article 2 of the Berwickshire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1922 shall continue to apply to the Prohibited Area, and the provisions of Article 6 of the "principal Order" shall be read and have effect subject to this modification.

Commencement.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the fifteenth day of May nineteen hundred and twenty-two.

Short Title.

3. This Order may be cited as the BERWICK-SHIRE AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1922 (No. 3).

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 14TH MAY 1922.)

EDINBURGH AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1922.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

1. Parts I. and IV. of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order of 1920, hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order," are hereby applied without modification, save as hereinafter provided, to the district described in the First Schedule hereto, which shall be a Scheduled District for the purposes of that Order.

Movement within the Scheduled District.

2.—(1) Where an Inspector of the Ministry considers it necessary or expedient, after inquiry, that an animal in the Scheduled District should be permitted to be moved within the Scheduled District as often as occasion may require between different parts of the same farm, he may, notwithstanding any prohibition of movement contained in the principal Order, authorise such movement by an Occupation Licence, and the Inspector may insert in the Licence such condi-

tions as he may consider necessary or desirable for the purpose of preventing the animals referred to in the Licence from coming into contact with any other animals.

(2) If in respect of any animal the conditions of a Licence granted under this Article are not complied with, the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof shall each, according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Movement into certain Boroughs for Immediate Slaughter.

3. Part II. of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order of 1920 is hereby applied to the several burghs described in the Second Schedule hereto.

Application of Other Orders.

4. The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Great Britain) Order of 1922 (No. 22) shall cease to apply to the Scheduled District No. 6 described in the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Great Britain) Order of 1922 (No. 26), which is included in and shall form part of the Scheduled District to which this Order applies.

Short Title.

5. This Order may be cited as the EDINBURGH AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1922.
