TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS AND TREASURY BONDS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice, that Tenders will

(b) £4 10s. per cent. Treasury Bonds, repayable at par on the 15th April, 1932.

2. The maximum amount of Treasury Bills and Treasury Bonds to be issued will be £50,000,000. The amount of Treasury Bonds issued will not exceed £5,000,000, but subject to that limit the total amount issued will be divided between Bills and Bonds in such proportions as Their Lordships may determine.

TREASURY BILLS.

3. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer, on any business day from Monday, the 19th June 1922, to Saturday, the 24th June 1922, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

£4 10s. PER CENT. TREASURY BONDS, 1932.

6. The Bonds will be in denominations of £50, £100, £200, £500, £1000, and £5000. They will be exempt from Corporation Profits Tax, and will in all respects rank *pari passu* with those issued under the Prospectus of the 21st April 1922. They will be dated, at the option of the Tenderer, on any business day from Monday, the 19th June 1922, to Saturday, the 24th June 1922, inclusive; the first dividend, payable on the 15th October 1922, will represent in the case of each Bond interest to that date from the date of the Bond.

7. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bonds required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one shilling) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bonds of different dates.

8. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

9. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 2 o'clock (Saturday 12 o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills or Bonds are to be dated.

10. In virtue of the provisions of Section 1 (4) of the War Loan Act, 1919, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills and Bonds.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

JUTE TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PROPOSAL TO FIX GENERAL MINIMUM PIECE-RATES AND TO VARY OVERTIME RATES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF FEMALE WEAVERS IN THE AREAS OF DUNDEE, CARNOUSTIE AND TAYPORT (AS DEFINED IN PART IV. OF THE SCHEDULE TO THIS NOTICE).

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Jute Trade, as specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, HEREBY GIVE NOTICE, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that THEY PROPOSE TO FIX General Minimum Piece-Rates for Female Workers employed on Hessian Weaving as defined in Section II. of Part I. of the Schedule set out below, AND TO VARY the Overtime Rates at present fixed and set out in the Trade Board's Notice J (19) dated 8th March 1922, in their application to such workers, the proposed Minimum Rates being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

The Minister of Labour has given his consent to the issue of this Notice.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

PROPOSED GENERAL MINIMUM PIECE-RATES FOR FEMALE WORKERS EMPLOYED ON HESSIAN WEAVING (AS HEREINAFTER DEFINED) IN THE AREAS OF DUNDEE, CARNOUSTIE AND TAYPORT (AS DEFINED IN PART IV. OF THIS SCHEDULE).

SECTION I.—

The proposed General Minimum Piece-Rates to apply to Female Workers employed on Hessian Weaving as specified in Section II. of this Part of this Schedule shall be as follows :—

- (a) THE STANDARD GENERAL MINIMUM PIECE-RATE SHALL BE A SINGLE LOOM RATE FOR WEAVING THE STANDARD LENGTH OF THE STANDARD FABRIC OF THE STANDARD WIDTH AND SHALL BE 40 $\frac{3}{4}$ d.
- (b) THE DOUBLE LOOM RATE SHALL BE TWENTY PER CENT. (20 PER CENT.) LESS THAN THE SINGLE LOOM RATE.

Provided that a worker shall not be required to work at a single loom at the double loom rate for a continuous period of more than 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ hours, or for a total of more than 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ hours in any one week.

2. FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE PROPOSED GENERAL MINIMUM PIECE-RATES SET OUT IN THIS NOTICE :—

- (a) The STANDARD Fabric shall be 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. 40 in. 11 porter 13 shots per inch when chested finished : Dundee Hessian.
- (b) The STANDARD Length shall be 100 yards (36 inch measure) of yarn laid.
- (c) The STANDARD Width shall be 40 inch of finished cloth.

3. THE STANDARD GENERAL MINIMUM PIECE RATES SET OUT IN PARAGRAPH 1 OF THIS SECTION SHALL BE INCREASED OR DIMINISHED :—

- (a) *For variation of build* in accordance with the percentages given on Table A in Part II. of this Schedule.

Provided that in cases where variation on the Standard Rate has to be made in respect of both Porter and Shots, the variations for Porter and Shots shall not be made separately but as follows, that is to say, the sum or difference, as the case may be, of the appropriate percentage figures set out in the Table for Porter and Shots respectively shall first be calculated, and the Standard Rate shall then be varied by the application thereto of the percentage figure so arrived at.

- (b) *For variation of width* in accordance with the percentages given on Table B in Part II. of this Schedule.

4. There shall be no difference for quality.

5. In all calculations in this scheme the SHOTS are counted BY THE INCH.

6. Fractions shall be dealt with as follows :—

Fractions of One Shot—

- Under $\frac{1}{4}$ shall NOT count.
 $\frac{1}{4}$ and under $\frac{3}{4}$ shall count as a $\frac{1}{2}$.
 $\frac{3}{4}$ and over shall count as 1.

Fractions of One Inch—

- Under a $\frac{1}{2}$ inch shall NOT count.
 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch and over shall count as
 1 inch.

7. THE ABOVE GENERAL MINIMUM PIECE-RATES SHALL BE SUBJECT TO PAYMENT OF THE FOLLOWING EXTRAS:—

(a) Narrow Cloth in Wide Looms.

No allowance shall be made for cloth the yarn width of which (including selvages) in the reed is within 10 inches or 10 per cent. of the reed space, whichever is the greater. If the yarn as measured within the reed (including selvages) is narrower than this, one-sixth of the total difference in inches shall be added to the cloth width.

(b) Where the weaver strips the cloth off the cloth pin, two per cent. (2 per cent).

(c) Where the weaver ties on, Two pence (2d.) per 100 threads.

(d) Where the weaver does any fleying an extra shall be paid to be mutually arranged between master and worker, provided that such extra shall be at not less than the appropriate minimum rate fixed by the Trade Board.

(e) For centre Selvages:—

If unsplit in the loom—

5 per cent. for the first centre selvage; and
3 per cent. for each centre selvage thereafter.

If split in the loom by the weaver—

A further 2 per cent. for each centre selvage so split.

(f) For Coloured Stripes in the Warp:—

Up to 10 per cent. of coloured single jute threads, no extra.

For each additional 2 per cent. of coloured single jute threads or part thereof, 1 per cent. extra.

(g) For Heavy Wefts, to be paid under the following scale on the calculated weight of weft to give the required weight of cloth:—

(h) Where cloth is woven one thread in a split:—

8 porter in 16 reed, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. extra;

and thereafter for every $\frac{1}{2}$ porter in excess of 8 porter, an additional 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

8. Long Lengths.—In linoleum goods no extra will be paid for these.

9. Where the number of threads in the warp is increased above the normal build for which payment is made, the width of cloth to be paid for shall be that which the threads would give if not crowded.

SECTION II.

The above proposed General Minimum Piece-Rates shall apply to the weaving of all Hessian, floor-cloth and linoleum goods.

The General Minimum Piece-Rates proposed in this Notice are on the basis that the cloth produced is to be free from all weaving faults, which shall be made good by the weaver in accordance with the hitherto accepted practice of the trade, and that the weaver is to perform her other usual duties, such as keeping the loom clean and removing the waste from it.

The General Minimum Piece-Rates shall not apply to cloth woven in looms the reed space of which is 32 inches or narrower.

NOTE.—In the case of fabrics to which the General Minimum Piece-Rates are not applicable, it is required by the Trade Boards Acts that each Piece-Rate paid shall be sufficient to yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker, not less than the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate fixed by the Trade Board.

with the needful observance of all requirements for the prevention of danger arising to public health from the meat as an article of food;

And further, with respect to the manner, to the extent, and to the rules and conditions in, to, and subject to which every Official Certificate is admissible as evidence for any such purpose as is hereinbefore described, we hereby prescribe as follows, that is to say:—

(i) An Official Certificate used in relation to foreign meat, or in relation to a box, case, receptacle or package containing foreign meat, shall be admissible as aforesaid only where the meat is derived from a pig.

(ii) The mark or stamp of the Argentine Government shall be admissible if impressed

on each box, case, receptacle or package, or if impressed on a label.

(iii) An Official Certificate in the form of a label shall be admissible as aforesaid only where the label is securely affixed or attached to any foreign meat, or to any box, case, receptacle or package containing foreign meat; and where the label so affixed or attached has not in any other circumstances, or on any other occasion, been used as an Official Certificate.

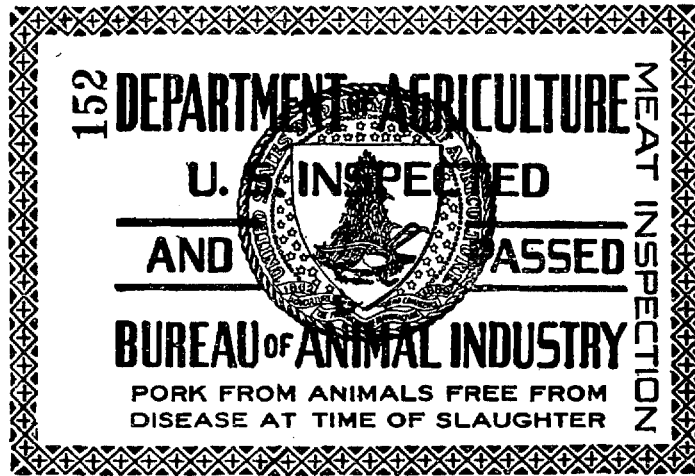
(iv.) In this Notice, any word or expression to which a special meaning is assigned by the Public Health (Foreign Meat) Amending Regulations, 1909, has the same meaning as in those Regulations.

SCHEDULE I.

United States of America.

A certificate in the form of a label having on it the subjoined representation or design, except that the circular device in the centre of the label, the words "Pork from animals free from disease

at the time of slaughter" and the serial number are printed in orange colour, and that in place of the serial number 152, other serial numbers may be substituted.



SCHEDULE II.

Argentine Republic.

A Certificate in the form of a mark or stamp having on it the subjoined representation or design with or without the addition of a number signifying the official number of the

slaughter house and being impressed in blue colour upon the box, case, receptacle or package, or upon a label.
