READY-MADE AND WHOLESALE BESPOKE TAILORING TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PROPOSAL TO VARY MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, for that Section of the Tailoring Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Tailoring) Order, 1919, which is covered by the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour and dated 15th January 1920, with respect to the Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Section of the Tailoring Trade in Great Britain, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918 (the Minister of Labour having given his consent to such Notice being given), that they Propose to Vary the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Male Workers, at present effective and set out in the Schedule to their Notice R.M. (16), dated 13th April 1922, the Proposed Variation being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

Provided that a worker who commences employment in the trade at or over the age of 19 shall receive, until the completion of 12 months' employment, a General Minimum Time-Rate of 25s. per week of 48 hours, i.e., $6\frac{1}{4}$ d. per hour. Provided also that this General Minimum Time-Rate shall be increased by 5s. per week of 48 hours, i.e., $1\frac{1}{4}$ d. per hour in the case of any such worker who is 22 years of age or over. A worker to whom this proviso applies shall for the purpose of determining whether he has completed 12 months' employment be entitled to include all previous employment (a) in the Tailoring Trade, and/or (b) in the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade coming within the scope of the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade Board (Great Britain). On the expiration of 12 months' employment he shall receive such General Minimum Time-Rates as he may be entitled to under the provisions of this Part of this Schedule.

SECTION VII.

For the purpose of determining whether a worker has completed the required period of employment or experience in the processes or occupations specified in the appropriate Sub-Section of Sections I. to IV. above he shall be entitled to include all previous employment or experience in the respective processes or occupations in (a) the Tailoring Trade and/or (b) the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade coming within the scope of the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade Board (Great Britain).

SECTION VIII.

The weekly rates, set out in Section VI. of this Part of this Schedule, are based on a week of 48 hours, and are subject to a proportionate decrease according as the number of hours of employment in any week is less than 48.

SECTION IX.

In cases where a worker is employed on piece-work, each piece-rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker an amount not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable. Provided that in determining as to whether any piece-rate satisfies this condition, regard shall not be had to the earnings of workers under 22 years of age.

PART II.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE WORKERS.

Overtime Rates, calculated on the proposed Minimum Rates of Wages set out in Part I. of this Schedule, in the manner specified in Part II. of the Schedule to the above-mentioned Notice R.M. (16), dated 13th April 1922, shall apply, in substitution for the Rates set out in Part I. of this Schedule, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in Part II. of the Schedule to the said Notice R.M. (16) to be the normal number of hours of work in the Trade.

PART III.

SECTION I.

For the purpose of this Notice the following definitions shall apply:-

- (a) A Measure Cutter is a person who is employed in any process of Measure Cutting, and is capable of taking a complete set of measures, and of cutting any garment for a Male Person from model patterns, and has sufficient technical knowledge to draft men's trousers and alter the balance and distribution of widths, lengths, &c., for any garment for a Male Person (excluding alterations to stock patterns).
- (b) A Cutter (other than a Measure Cutter or Knife Cutter or Knifeman) is a person who is employed in:—
 - (i) Marking-in or marking-up cloth or linings or other materials;
 - (ii) Laying-up, hooking-up or folding cloth or linings or other materials;

(iii) Cutting Cloth or linings or other materials; and

(iv) Dividing; that is, the process ordinarily carried on by Cutters or their assistants of dividing, parting or separating the parts of garments after being cut and of assembling them into suitable bundles for making-up.

(c) A Knife Cutter or Knifeman is a person who is wholly or mainly employed on Band, Election or Hand Knife processes.

(d) A Fitter-up is a person who is employed in Fitting-up; that is, a process between that of cutting and that of sewing, baisting or machining, which consists of preparing or fitting accurately the various parts of the garment before being baisted, sewn or machined, such work of preparing or fitting being always done by shears or knives or other cutting appliances, sewing, baisting or machining, forming no part or process of fitting-up.

(e) A Tailor is a person who is employed in Sewing by hand in the process of making a garment or portion of garment.

(f) A Presser is a person who is employed in Pressing-off by hand or by machine.

- (g) A Machinist is a person who is employed in Machining other than as a plain Machinist as defined in Sub-Section (j) of this Section and is capable of machining any garment throughout.
- (h) A Passer is a person who is employed in examining Garments, either in the processes of being made-up or upon their completion.
- (i) An Under-Presser is a person who is employed in pressing processes other than Pressing-off.
 (j) A Plain Machinist is a person who is employed in the process of making-up Plain Sleeves, Facings, Linings, Inside Pockets, Quilting and Padding.

(k) A Warehouseman is a person employed wholly or mainly upon one or more of the following operations, viz., the assembling, keeping, storing and distributing of stock but excluding such operations included in the definitions of a Packer or Porter.

(l) A Packer is a person employed wholly or mainly upon the operation of packing goods and materials but excluding such operations included in the definitions of a Porter or Warehouseman.

(m) A Porter is a person employed wholly or mainly upon one or more of the following operations, viz., unpacking, moving, loading or unloading of goods or materials, but excluding such operations included in the definitions of a Packer or Warehouseman.

SECTION II.

The expression "London District" means the Metropolitan and City of London Police Districts.

SECTION III.

The expression "Heavy Cotton Clothing" means articles of clothing for Male Persons made wholly or mainly of cords, moles or other fustians, jeans, drills or other similar cotton material, but excluding gaberdine raincoats.

PART IV.

(17) dated 13th April 1922, and to Fix Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for Certain Classes of Female Workers employed as Cutters, Trimmers, and Fitters-up, the proposed Minimum Rates of Wages being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

(a) Is employed during the whole or a substantial part of her time in learning any branch or process of Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring by an employer who provides the Learner with reasonable facilities for such learning; and

(b) Has received a certificate, or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, or has made an application for such certificate or registration, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a Learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of Learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a Female Learner on her first employment in any branch or branches of Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring, specified in Part V. of the Schedule to the Trade Boards Notice R.M. (17) dated 13th April 1922, without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such Learner being continued thereafter at her employment, the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

Provided that in determining as to whether any piece-rate satisfies this condition, regard shall not be had to the earnings of Learners.

PART III.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

Overtime Rates, calculated on the proposed Minimum Rates of Wages set out in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule—

(a) in the case of Female Workers (other than those employed on piece-work as Cutters, Trimmers and Fitters-up as defined in Section I. of Part IV. of this Schedule) in the manner specified in Part III. of the Schedule to the above-mentioned Notice W.M. (16) dated 13th April 1922.

(b) in the case of Female Workers employed on piece-work as Cutters, Trimmers and Fitters-up (as so defined) in the manner specified in Sub-Section B (2) of Section II. of Part III. of the

· said Notice W.M. (16),

shall apply, in substitution for the rates set out in Parts I. and H. of this Schedule, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in Part III. of the Schedule to the said Notice W.M. (16) to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

PART IV.

For the purpose of this Notice the following definitions shall apply:—

Section I.—Cutters, Trimmers and Fitters-up are workers who are substantially occupied in one or more of the following processes, that is to say:—

(a) Marking-in or marking-up cloth or linings or other materials.

(b) Laying-up, hooking-up or folding cloth or linings, or other materials.

(c) Cutting cloth or linings, or other materials.

(d) Trimming, that is, the process as ordinarily carried on of cutting and assembling together the linings and fittings of garments.

(e) Dividing, that is, the process as ordinarily carried on by Cutters or their Assistants of dividing, parting or separating the parts of garments after being cut, and of assembling

them into suitable bundles for making up.

(f) Fitting-up, that is, a process between that of cutting and that of sewing, basting, or machining, which consists of preparing and fitting accurately the various parts of the garment before being basted, sewn or machined, such work of preparing and fitting being always done by shears or knives or other cutting appliances; sewing, basting or machining forming no part or process of fitting-up.

SECTION II.—A Female Learner is a worker who :-

(a) Is employed during the whole or a substantial part of her time in learning any branch or process of the trade by an employer who provides the learner with reasonable facilities for such learning; and

(b) Has received a certificate, or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, or has made an application for such certificate or registration, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certificate or registration of a learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of

learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a female learner on her first employment in the branch or branches of the trade specified in Part V. of the Schedule to the above-mentioned Notice W.M. (16) dated 13th April 1922, without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding four weeks, but in the event of such learner being continued thereafter at her employment the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

Provided that notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this Section a person shall not be deemed to be a learner if she works in a room used for dwelling

purposes and is not in the employment of her parent or guardian.

Section III.—A Homeworker is a worker who works in her own home or in any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

PART V.

The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Female Workers in respect of all time during which they are employed in Great Britain in any branch of the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour dated 20th November 1919, and set out in Part V. of the Schedule to the above-mentioned Notice W.M. (16) dated 13th April 1922.

Note.—The employment of women, young persons and children is subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and to the provisions of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposal to Vary and Fix which may be lodged with them within two months from the 11th day of August 1922. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to The Secretary of the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade Board (Great Britain), 7-11 Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

Provided that a worker who commences employment in the trade at or over the age of 19 shall receive, until the completion of 12 months' employment, a General Minimum Time-Rate of 25s. per week of 48 hours, i.e., 64d. per hour. Provided also that this General Minimum Time-Rate shall be increased by 5s. per week of 48 hours, i.e., 14d. per hour, in the case of any such worker who is 22 years of age or over. A worker to whom this proviso applies shall for the purpose of determining whether he has completed twelve months' employment be entitled to include all previous employment in the Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Section of the Tailoring Trade coming within the scope of the Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain). On the expiration of 12 months' employment he shall receive such General Minimum Time-Rates as he may be entitled to under the provisions of this Part of this Schedule.

Section II.—For the purpose of determining whether a worker has completed the required period of employment or experience in the processes or occupations specified in the appropriate Sub-Section of Section I. above he shall be entitled to include all previous employment or experience in the respective processes or occupations in (a) the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade as defined in Section II. of Part IV. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice W.M. (15), dated 13th April 1922, and/or (b) the Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Section of the Tailoring Trade coming within the scope of the Ready-Made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain).

Section III.—In cases where a worker is employed on piece-work, each piece-rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker an amount not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable as set out in Section I. above. Provided that in determining as to whether any piece-rate satisfies this condition, regard shall not be had to the earnings of workers under 22 years of age.

PART II.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE WORKERS (ALL AGES).

Overtime Rates calculated on the proposed Minimum Rates of Wages set out in Part I. of this Schedule in the manner specified in Part II. of the Schedule to the above-mentioned Notice W.M. (15), dated 13th April 1922, shall apply in substitution for the rates set out in Part I. of this Schedule in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in Part II. of the Schedule to the said Notice W.M. (15) to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

PART III.

For the purpose of this Schedule the following definitions shall apply:-

- (a) A Measure Cutter is a person who is capable of taking a complete set of measures and of cutting any garment for a female person from model patterns and sketches.
- (b) A Cutter (other than a Measure Cutter or Knife Cutter or Knifeman) is a person who is employed in—
 - (i) Marking-in or marking-up cloth or linings or other materials;
 - (ii) Laying-up, hooking-up or folding cloth or linings or other materials:
 - (iii) Cutting cloth or linings or other materials; and
 - (iv) Dividing; that is, the process ordinarily carried on by Cutters or their assistants of dividing, parting or separating the parts of garments after being cut and of assembling them into suitable bundles for making up.
- (c) A Knife Cutter or Knifeman is a person who is wholly or mainly employed on Band, Electric or Hand Knife processes.
- (d) A Fitter-up is a person who is employed in Fitting-up; that is a process between that of cutting and that of sewing, baisting or machining, which consists of preparing or fitting accurately the various parts of the garment before being baisted, sewn or machined, such work of preparing or fitting being always done by shears or knives or other cutting appliances, sewing, baisting, or machining forming no part of process of fitting-up.
- (e) A Tailor is a person who is employed in Sewing by hand in the process of making a garment or portion of garment.
- (f) A Presser is a person who is employed in Pressing-off by hand or by machine.
- (g) A Machinist is a person who is employed in Machining other than as a Plain Machinist as defined in Sub-Section (j) of this Section and is capable of machining any garment throughout.
- (h) A Passer is a person who is employed in examining Garments, either in the processes of being made-up or upon their completion.
- (i) An Under-Presser is a person who is employed in pressing processes other than Pressing-off.
- (j) A Plain Machinist is a person who is employed in the process of making-up Plain Sleeves, Facings, Linings, Inside Pockets, Quilting and Padding.
- (k) A Warehouseman is a person employed wholly or mainly upon one or more of the following operations, viz., the assembling, keeping, storing and distributing of stock, but excluding such operations included in the definitions of a Packer or Porter.
- (1) A Packer is a person employed wholly or mainly upon the operation of packing goods and materials, but excluding such operations included in the definitions of a Porter or Warehouseman.
- (m) A Porter is a person employed wholly or mainly upon one or more of the following operations, viz., unpacking, moving, loading or unloading of goods or materials, but excluding such operations included in the definitions of a Packer or Warehouseman.

PART IV.

The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts to all Male Workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, dated 20th November 1919, and set out in Part IV. of the Schedule to the above-mentioned Notice W.M. (15) dated 13th April 1922.

Note.—The employment of young persons and children is subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and to the provisions of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposal to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from the 11th day of August 1922. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to The Secretary of The Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade Board (Great Britain), 7-11 Old Bailey London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons what is objected to.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated the 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established in England and Wales under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Hat, Cap and Millinery Trade, as specified in the Trade Boards (Hat, Cap and Millinery) Order, 1920, hereby give Notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they Propose to Vary the General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Female Workers, and the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Certain Classes of Male Workers set out in the Schedule to their Notice H.M. (8), dated 17th February 1922, and effective under an Order of the Minister of Labour, dated 11th February 1922, so that in lieu of such Minimum Rates of Wages the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Female Workers and the classes of Male Workers affected shall be as shown in the Schedule set out below.

The Minister of Labour has given consent to the issue of this Notice.

- (b) The proposed Minimum Rates for Learners set out in Sub-section (a) of this Section shall be subject to the following conditions:—
 - (i) The weekly rates set out above are based on a week of 48 hours, and are subject to a proportionate decrease according as the number of hours actually pent by the searner in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.

(ii) The advances to be given to learners shall become due on the completion of each 12 months' employment in the trade after 14 years of age.

(iii) A learner shall cease to be a learner and be entitled to the full General Minimum Time Rate applicable to female workers, other than learners, upon completion of 4 years' employment in the trade.

(b) A Blocker is a Male person employed in pulling-on and blocking hats and caps by hand iron or steam or by hydraulic machine and in making shapes by the French gas block, and who has been so employed for not less than four years after the age of 19 years;

and by making the alterations consequent upon such re-definition, in the classes of workers to whom the minimum rates set out in Section I. C. of Part I. and in Section I. (b) of Part II. of the Schedule to the said Notice H.M. (8) apply.

PART IV.

The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Female Workers and to the classes of Male Workers specified in Part III. of this Schedule in respect of all time during which they are employed in England and Wales in any branch of the Hat, Cap and Millinery trade as specified in Part V. of the Schedule to the Notice H.M. (8), issued by the Trade Board and dated 17th February 1922.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposal to Vary, which may be lodged with them within two months from the 14th August 1922. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to The Secretary of The Hat, Cap and Millinery Trade Board (England and Wales), 7-11 Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and, so far as possible, with reasons, what is objected to.
