TREATY OF VERSAILLES.
RESTITUTION UNDER ARTICLE 238.

Notice is hereby given by the Board of Trade that no claims against Germany for restitution under the provisions of Article 238 of the Treaty of Versailles of cash, securities or other property seized or sequestered in occupied territory will be entertained by their Reparation Claims Department except in cases which have been notified to the Reparation Claims Department, Cornwall House, Stamford Street, London, S.E.1, and full particulars of which have been furnished prior to 28th October 1922.

All claims for restitution which have been

notified to the Reparation Claims Department, but in respect of which all the particulars and information which have been asked for by the Reparation Claims Department have not been furnished prior to 28th October 1922, will be presumed to have been abandoned.

COAL MINES ACT, 1911.

The Secretary for Mines gives notice that on the 21st September 1922 he made an Order, in pursuance of Section 33 of the Coal Mines Act, 1911, approving additional types of flame and electric safety lamps for use in all mines to which the Act applies, and also modifications of types of lamps already approved, subject to the conditions specified in the Schedule to the Order.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

STAMPED OR PRESSED METAL WARES TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PROPOSAL TO VARY MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, and 1st August, 1922, respectively, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, for the branches of Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares) Order, 1919, HEREBY GIVE NOTICE, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they PROPOSE TO VARY the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates (A) for MALE WORKERS *other than* Workers who are employed as Braziers, Burnishers, Drop-Stampers, Dippers, Dippers who are also Bronzers, or as Annealers or Polishers, at present effective and set out in the Schedule to the Notice Q (18), issued by the Trade Board, and dated 18th August, 1922; and also (B) for FEMALE WORKERS who are employed as Polishers or as Drop-Stampers; as Hand-Brush Japanners who are capable of finishing all classes of work, Hand-Brush-Lacquerers who are capable of finishing all classes of work, Blow-Pipe-Braziers, or Solderers using ordinary Hand-Iron or Blow-Pipe with Bar Solder, at present effective and set out in the Schedule to the Notice Q (15), issued by the Trade Board, and dated 7th June, 1922; the proposed Minimum Rates being as set out in the Schedule below.

This Notice is issued with the consent of the Minister of Labour.

In lieu of the Piecework Basis Time-Rates at present fixed, the proposed Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate for each class of Male Workers above specified shall be 15 per cent. above the appropriate proposed General Minimum Time-Rate for such class as set out in Section I. of this part of this Schedule.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

As respects the classes of Male and Female Workers for whom variations of the General Minimum Time-Rates and Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates are proposed in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule, Overtime Rates calculated on the Proposed Minimum Rates specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule in the manner set out in Part III. of the Notice Q (15) issued by the Trade Board, dated 7th June, 1922, and in Section III. of Part I. of the Notice Q (18) issued by the Trade Board, dated 18th August, 1922, shall apply in substitution for the Proposed Minimum Rates otherwise applicable, as set out in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the above-mentioned Notices Q (15) and Q (18) to be the normal number of hours of work in the Trade.

IMPORTATION OF HORSES, ASSES
AND MULES (GREAT BRITAIN)
ORDER OF 1922.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Special Provisions as to Importation, at Leith, Edinburgh, of Horses, Asses and Mules from Iceland and the Faroe Islands.

1.—(1) Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 1 of the Importation of Horses, Asses and Mules (Great Britain) Order of 1921, hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Order," horses, asses or mules brought to Great Britain from Iceland or the Faroe Islands may be landed in the City of Edinburgh, at the Albert Dock or Imperial Dock, Leith, with the permission in writing of an Officer of Customs and Excise, under and in accordance with the following conditions, namely:—

(i) A horse, ass or mule so landed shall be moved forthwith by the owner or person in charge thereof to the premises known as The North of Scotland Cattle Shed at the Imperial Dock at Leith, in the City of Edinburgh, or the premises known as the Black Shed in the occupation of Messrs. Furness, Withy and Company, at Imperial Dock at Leith, in the City of Edinburgh.

(ii) Every animal when moved to the said premises shall be there detained by the owner or person in charge thereof until an Inspector of the Local Authority of the City of Edinburgh is furnished with a certificate by a veterinary surgeon stating that the horse, ass or mule has been examined by him and does not show symptoms of glanders (including farcy), epizootic lymphangitis, ulcerative lymphangitis, dourine, horse-pox, sarcoptic mange, psoroptic mange, influenza, ring-worm, or strangles, and the Inspector

authorises the removal of the animal from the premises.

(iii) During movement to the premises, horses, asses and mules shall be kept separate from all horses, asses or mules not landed under this provision.

(2.) If any horse, ass or mule in the said premises is diseased or suspected within the meaning of any Order of the Minister, the Authority of the District shall proceed in accordance with the provisions of that Order, except that any horse, ass or mule which is not diseased or suspected shall, if so required by a notice served by an Inspector or other officer of the Ministry on the owner or person in charge of the animal, be moved to a vessel for exportation; and also except that no compensation shall be payable in respect of any horse, ass or mule slaughtered by the Local Authority.

(3.) The provisions of Article 4 (*Power for Ministry to require Mallein Test on arrival in Great Britain*) of the Principal Order shall apply without modification to horses, asses or mules landed in accordance with the provisions of this Order.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

2. This Order shall, except where it is otherwise provided, be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

3. If any horse, ass or mule is landed or moved in contravention of this Order the owner and the person in charge of the animal, and any person causing or permitting the landing or movement, and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the place of landing where such animal is landed, and the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which the animal is landed, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

4. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of October, nineteen hundred and twenty-two.

Short Title.

5. This Order may be cited as the IMPORTATION OF HORSES, ASSES AND MULES (GREAT
