FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE: INFECTED PLACES.

RENFREWSHIRE AND DISTRICT (FOOT- AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1924 (No. 3).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1922, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Removal of Fat Stock from Landing Places at Glasgow.

1. The Renfrewshire and District Foot-and-Mouth Disease Order of 1924 (No. 2) is hereby revoked, and the following Article is substituted for Article 2 (f) of the Renfrewshire and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1924:—

(f) The landing of animals at the Imported Animals Wharf at the Port of Glasgow (Merlands) is hereby prohibited, except for the purpose of slaughter within the Wharf within 96 hours of the time of landing.
