Copy of a Letter from the Earl of St Vincent, K. B. Admiral and Commander in Chief of his Majesty's steet employed in the Channel, Soundings, &c. to William Marsden, Esq. dated on board his Majesty's ship the Warrior, in Cawsand Bay, the 8th instant.

By the letter, whereof I inclose a copy, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty will learn the capture of one of those numerous privateers which infest the vicinity of Oporto.

His Majesty's ship Flora, at fea, 26th November 1806. My Lord,

I have the honour to inform you, that this morning, eighteen leagues to the westward of Oporto, we discovered an armed lugger a few miles distant, sweeping very fast from us. It falling calm, there was not probability of the ship getting within gun-shot of her, therefore I sent getting within gun-shot of her, therefore I sent the boats, under the command of Lieutenant Furber, First of the Flora, in chace of her; and I am happy to say, through the exertion of this gallant officer, the Spanish lugger privateer El Espedarte, of Vige, mounting six carriage guns, besides swivels, musketoons, and musketry, with forty-one men, was captured, and only in sight of the ship from the mast head.
