Copy of a Letter from the Earl of St Vincent, K. B. Admiral and Commander in Chief of his Majesty's fleet employed in the Channel, Soundings, &c. to William Marfden, Esq. dated on board his Majesty's ship the Warrior, in Cawland Bay, the 8th instant.

SIR,

By the letter, whereof I inclose a copy, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty will learn the capture of one of those numerous privateers which infest the vicinity of Oporto.

I am, &c. ST VINCENT.

His Majesty's ship Flora, at sea, 26th November 1806.

MY LORD,

I have the honour to inform you, that this morning, eighteen leagues to the westward of Oporto, we discovered an armed lugger a few miles distant, sweeping very fast from us. It falling calm, there was not probability of the ship getting within gun-shot of her, therefore I sent the boats, under the command of Lieutenant Furber, First of the Flora, in chase of her; and I am happy to say, through the exertion of this gallant officer, the Spanish lugger privateer El Espedarte, of Vigo, mounting six carriage guns, six sides swivels, musketoons, and musketry, with forty-one men, was captured, and only in sight of the ship from the mast head.
