BY THE KING.—A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS by Our Order in Council, bearing Date the Twentieth Day of January last, the Time prescribed by Our several Proclamations now in force for the Payment of the Bounties promised by Our said Proclamations, for the Encouragement of Seamen and Landmen to enter into Our Royal Navy; and the Rewards for discovering Seamen who may conceal themselves, so that such Seamen should be taken for Our Service; and also the Rewards to persons who should procure the voluntary Service of able and Ordinary Seamen and Landmen, fit for Our Naval Service, and should convey such Seamen and Landmen on board of any of our Ships and Vessels, or to any of our Sea Officers employed in raising Men, has been continued until the Thirty-first Day of this instant December; which Bounties and Rewards are as follows; that is to say, —To every able Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of twenty Years, who should enter himself to serve in Our Royal Navy, a bounty of Five Pounds; and to every Ordinary Seaman, so entering himself, and not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, a bounty of Three Pounds; —to every able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, so entering himself, a Bounty of Thirty Shillings; —to any Person or Persons who shall discover any Able or Ordinary Seaman or Seamen who may have concealed themselves, so that such Seaman may be taken for Our Service, by any of our Officers employed to raise Men, a Reward of Three Pounds for every such able Seaman, and Fifty Shillings for every such Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on

board Our Ships; —to any Person or Persons who shall procure the voluntary Service of Able or Ordinary Seamen or Landmen fit for Our Service, and shall convey them on board any of Our Ships or Vessels, or to any of Our Sea Officers employed in raising Men, a Reward of Four Guineas for every such Able Seaman, Three Guineas for every such Ordinary Seaman, and Two Guineas and a Half for every such Landman; together with an Allowance, at the Rate of One Penny per Mile, for each Able Seaman, Ordinary Seaman, and Landman, for every Mile such Men may respectively travel to the nearest of Our Ships of War, or nearest Place of Residence of any of Our Sea Officers employed in raising Men; provided such Man shall be found fit for Our Service, and there shall not be Reason to suppose that he is an Apprentice: —And whereas it has been represented to Us, that it is expedient that the said several Bounties and Rewards should be continued until the Thirty-first Day of December, One thousand eight hundred and seven, save and except only that the Rewards to Persons who shall procure the voluntary Service of Able or Ordinary Seamen or Landmen fit for Our Naval Service, and shall convey them on board of any of our ships or Vessels, or to any of Our Sea Officers employed in raising Men, should be decreased. We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council to declare, and We do hereby declare, that, from and after the Thirty-first Day of December One thousand eight hundred and six, to, and until the Thirty-first Day of December One thousand eight hundred and seven, a Reward of Three Guineas and no more, for every such Able Seaman; Two Guineas and no more, for every such Ordinary

Seaman; and One Guinea and no more, for every such Landman, shall be paid to any Person who may procure the voluntary Service of any such Able Seaman, Ordinary Seaman, or Landman, together with the same Allowance for their travelling Expences, and with the same Provisos, as are specified in Our said Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Seventh Day of November, One thousand eight hundred and five: —And We do hereby, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, further promise and declare, that all other Bounties and Rewards granted by Our several Proclamations now in force, and declared by Our said Order in Council of the said Twentieth Day of January last to be continued to, and until the said Thirty-first Day of this inst. Dec. One thousand eight hundred and six, for the encouragement of Seamen and Landmen to enter into Our Royal Navy, and for the discovering of Seamen who may conceal themselves, shall continue to be paid in the Manner specified in Our said Proclamations respectively, to and until the Thirty-first Day of December, One thousand eight hundred and seven.

Given at Our Court at the Queen's Palace, the Twenty-second Day of December, One thousand eight hundred and six, and in the Forty-seventh Year of Our Reign.
