TO THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

*May it Please Your Majesty,—*

We, Your Majesty's loyal and devoted subjects, Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, convened in General Assembly, desire to express the deep appreciation and gratitude with which Your Majesty's letter was received by us. **W**HEREAS by Section 5 of the Merchant Shipping (Mercantile Marine Fund) Act, 1898 (hereinafter referred to as "the said Section"), it is, amongst other things, enacted as follows:—

" 5.—(1) On and after the commencement of this Act, the general lighthouse authorities shall levy light dues with respect to the voyages made by ships or by way of periodical payment, and not with respect to the lights which a ship passes or from which it derives benefit, and the dues so levied shall take the place of the dues now levied by those authorities.

" (2) The scale and rules set out in the Second Schedule to this Act shall have effect for the purpose of the levying of light dues in pursuance of this Act, but Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, alter, either gener-

ally or with respect to particular classes of cases, the scale or rules and the exemptions therefrom."

And whereas from time to time divers Orders in Council have been made in pursuance of the said Section:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Scale and Rules set out in the Second Schedule to the said recited Act should be further altered in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred upon Him by the said Section, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Merchant Shipping (Light Dues) Order, 1925, and shall have effect from the date of its publication in the London Gazette.

2. Each of the dues authorised to be levied in accordance with the Scale set out in the Second Schedule to the said recited Act shall be subject to an increase of ten per cent. for the purpose of levying of light dues in pursuance of the said recited Act.

**W**HEREAS by treaty, grant, usage, sufferance or other lawful means His Majesty the King has jurisdiction within the dominions of His Majesty the Sultan of Morocco and Fez:

And whereas by a Convention signed on behalf of His Majesty at Paris on the 18th day of December 1923, provision was made for the abrogation of the capitulations in the region defined in the First Schedule hereto (hereinafter described as the "Tangier Zone"), and for the establishment of an international jurisdiction to administer justice in the Tangier Zone to His Majesty's subjects and the nationals of other Powers:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, 1890 (53 & 54 Vic. c. 37) and 1913 (3 & 4 Geo. V., c. 16), or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. As from the commencement of this Order the operation of the Orders mentioned in the Second Schedule hereto, and of any King's Regulations, Rules or other enactments made thereunder, shall, as regards all such matters and cases as come within the jurisdiction of the Mixed Court of Tangier established under the Convention signed at Paris on December 18, 1923, be suspended in the Tangier Zone, except as regards any judicial matters pending in His Majesty's Consular Court at the date of the commencement of the Order; but such suspension shall not affect the past operation of

those Orders or enactments, or any of them, or any right, title, obligation or liability accrued, or the validity of anything done or suffered thereunder, before the commencement of this Order, or take away or abridge any protection or benefit given or to be enjoyed in relation thereto.

2. As from the commencement of this Order, in the operation outside the Tangier Zone of the Orders in Council mentioned in the Second Schedule hereto and any King's Regulations, Rules or other enactments made thereunder—

(1) the powers and duties of His Majesty's Minister and of the Consul-General shall be transferred in and so far as concerns the French Zone of Morocco to His Majesty's Consul-General at Rabat, and in and so far as concerns the Spanish Zone of Morocco to His Majesty's Vice-Consul at Tetuan, and any act required or permitted to be done by, to or before His Majesty's Minister or the Consul-General shall be done by, to or before His Majesty's Consul-General at Rabat, or before His Majesty's Vice-Consul at Tetuan, as the case may be, and the said Orders in Council, King's Regulations, Rules and enactments shall be read and construed as if the words "His Majesty's Consul-General at Rabat" or "His Majesty's Vice-Consul at Tetuan" were substituted for the words "His Majesty's Minister" or "the Consul-General," as the case may require;

(2) any act required or permitted to be done at the Consulate-General at Tangier shall be done at the Consulate-General at Rabat, or at the Vice-Consulate at Tetuan, as the case may be.

3. This Order may be cited as the "Morocco (Tangier Zone) Order in Council, 1924," and shall come into force on such date as the Secretary of State shall appoint by notice issued in the "London Gazette" and exhibited in the public Offices of the Consulate at Tangier.

And the Right Honourable Joseph Austen Chamberlain, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.

From Punta-Altares on the south coast of the Straits of Gibraltar, the boundary will run in a straight line to the crest of Djebel Beni-Mayimel, leaving on the west the village of Dzar-ze-Zeiken, and will then follow the boundary line between the Fahs on one side and the Anjera and Oued-Ras on the other to the junction with Oued Es-Seghir. Thence the boundary will follow the thalweg of Oued Es-Seghir, then those of Oueds M'Narhar and Tzahadartz to the sea.
