COUNTY OF LANARK.

NOTICE is hereby given that the County Council of the County of Lanark have, in terms of Sub-Section 3 of Section 44 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1894, as read along with Section 38 of the Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1897, as amended, given their consent to Resolutions by the District Committee of the Lower Ward—

- (1) Altering and enlarging the Bishopbriggs and Auchinairn Special Lighting District so as to include an area on the north-east of the existing Lighting District; adopting within the said Special Lighting District, as enlarged, the provisions contained in Sections 99 to 105 inclusive of the Burgh Police (Scotland) Act, 1892, and determining that the debt affecting the said Bishopbriggs and Auchinairn Special Lighting District, with the interest thereof, shall affect the whole Special Lighting District, as enlarged, and that from and after the 15th day of May 1927;
- (2) Altering and enlarging the Bishopbriggs and Auchinairn Special Scavenging District so as to include an area on the north-east of the existing Scavenging District; and adopting

within the said Bishopbriggs and Auchinairn Special Scavenging District, as enlarged, the provisions contained in Sections 107 to 127 and 253 to 255, all inclusive of the Burgh Police (Scotland) Act, 1892, and Sections 23 and 24 of the Burgh Police (Scotland) Act, 1903; and

- (3) Altering and enlarging the Stepps (formerly Millerston and Stepps) Special Lighting District so as to include an area at Mount Harriet Drive, Stepps, the said District, as altered and enlarged, to be known as "Stepps Special Lighting District"; adopting within the said Stepps Special Lighting District the provisions contained in Sections 99 to 105 inclusive of the Burgh Police (Scotland) Act, 1892; and determining that the debt affecting the said Millerston and Stepps Special Lighting District, with the interest thereof, shall affect the whole Special Lighting District as enlarged, and that from and after the 15th day of May 1927;
