## SHEEP SCAB MOVEMENT AREAS.

The following Areas are now "Movement Areas" for the purposes of Part I. of the Sheep (Double Dipping) Order of 1920:—

Inverness.—An Area comprising the islands known as the Outer Hebrides (except the Islands of St. Kilda, Dune, Soay and Boreray), in the county of Irverness.

Ross and Cromarty.—An Area comprising the island of Lewis, including the smaller islands adjacent thereto, in the county of Ross and Cromarty.

Commencing at the Pier at Tarbet on the

West Shore of Loch Lomond and proceeding westwards along the road leading from said Pier past Tarbet Hotel to Arrochar Pier; thence southwards along the Eastern Shore of Loch Long and eastwards along the northern Shore of the Firth of Clyde to Rosneath Point; thence south eastwards in a straight line from Rosneath Point to Ardmore Point; thence north eastwards along the road leading from Ardmore Point via Lyleston Farm, Darleith Farm, and Stoneymollan to the point where the said road joins the highway from Luss to Dumbarton; thence along the private road leading from the said last mentioned point to the boathouse at Drumkinnon Bay in Loch Lomond and thence northwards along the western shore of Loch Lomond to the point of commencement.
