We feel, in common with the great body of our fellow-subjects, that the act of the last session of Parliament, which prohibited the farther importation of slaves into the West India colonies, will ever be regarded as one of the most splendid events of your Majesty's reign; and while it proclaims to the world the justice of the British character, will send the tidings of peace and benevolence to the injured natives of Africa.

We watch with anxiety, but without dismay, the progress of the interesting events that dis-tinguish the times in which we live. We lament the calamities of war; but we have the consolation of thinking, that, although the inordinate ambition of our enemy renders the prolongation of the arduous contest indispensably necessary for the security and honour of the necessary for the security and honour of the British empire, the resources of the country are not exhausted, and the spirit of the people is unbroken. While we hear with admiration and gratitude of the gallant achievements of your Majesty's forces by sea and land, we behold all around us submitting patiently to the burdens and sacrifices to which the voice of their country calls them; and we account it our boundary. try calls them; and we account it our bounden duty to exert all our influence in cherishing that true patriotism which unites all orders of men in the national detence.
