The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Section 48 of the Patents and Designs Acts, 1907 to 1928 (a) it is provided that the said Section shall apply only to vessels, aircraft and land vehicles of a foreign state with respect to which His Majesty, by Order in Council, declares that the laws thereof confer corresponding rights with respect to the use of inventions in vessels, aircraft and land vehicles of the United Kingdom when coming into the foreign state or the territorial waters thereof:

And whereas by Section 91 of the said Acts it is provided that the provisions of that Section shall apply only in the case of those foreign states with respect to which His Majesty by Order in Council declares them to be applicable:

And whereas at The Hague on the 6th November 1925, His Majesty and the heads of certain foreign states having deemed it expedient to make certain modifications in and additions to the International Convention of the 20th March 1883, for the creation of an International Union for the Protection of Industrial Property, as revised at Brussels on the 14th December 1900, and at Washington on the 2nd

June 1911, agreed upon a convention (b) comprising the said International Convention as revised at Brussels and at Washington with the said modifications and additions, the ratification of which Convention was duly effected by Great Britain and certain other foreign states:

And whereas Hungary has acceded to the said Convention:

And whereas by reason of the accession to the said Convention of Hungary the laws thereof confer rights with respect to the use of inventions in vessels, aircraft and land vehicles of the United Kingdom when coming into Hungary or the territorial waters thereof corresponding to those mentioned in the said Section 48:

And whereas the said Convention is an arrangement of the nature contemplated by the said Section 91:

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 17th May 1909 (c) His late Majesty King Edward VII was pleased to declare that the provisions of Section 91 of the Patents and Designs Act, 1907 (d) should apply to Austria-Hungary:

And whereas by the Hague Industrial Property Convention Order 1928 (e) the said Order of the 17th May 1909, was revoked, in so far as it related to Austria, and it is expedient, on the making of this Order, that the said Order of the 17th May 1909, should be entirely revoked.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred upon Him in manner hereinbefore recited and of all other powers in that

behalf, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, as follows:—

1. The laws of Hungary confer rights with respect to the use of inventions in vessels, aircraft and land vehicles of the United Kingdom when coming into Hungary or the territorial waters thereof; corresponding to those mentioned in Section 48 of the Patents and Designs Acts, 1907 to 1928.

2. The provisions of Section 91 of the Patents and Designs Acts, 1907 to 1928, shall be applicable to Hungary.

3. The Order in Council dated the 17th May 1909, relating to Austria-Hungary, is hereby revoked.

4. This Order may be cited as The Industrial Property Convention (Hungary) Order, 1929.

And whereas the Registrar-General having regard to the objects and purposes of the said Act and to rendering the same more effectual proposes to make alterations on Schedule G. aforesaid so as to include therein, where the death of a married woman was known to have occurred during pregnancy or within four weeks after the termination of pregnancy, a statement that the death so occurred and has submitted for Our consent an amended Schedule G. as set forth in the Schedule to this Order giving effect to the aforesaid alterations,

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The amended Schedule G. as set forth in the Schedule to this Order and the alteration contained therein on the Schedule G. as annexed to the said Act are hereby approved.

2. This Order may be cited as the Registration of Births, Deaths and Marriages (Schedule G. Amendment) Order, 1929, and shall come into operation on the 1st day of August 1929.

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TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England on Friday the 28th June 1929, at 1 o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the War Loan Acts, 1914-1919, to the amount of £40,000,000.

4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

6. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 2 o'clock (Saturday 12 o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.

7. In virtue of the provisions of Section 1 (4) of the War Loan Act, 1919, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

8. Tenders must be made on the printed forms which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz.:—

REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS FOR THE SITUATION OF FEMALE SORTING ASSISTANT IN THE GENERAL POST OFFICE, LONDON.

These Regulations are liable to alteration for future examinations.

1. The limits of age for these situations are 15 and 18. If an examination begins in one of the first six months of any year, candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of April in that year. If an examination begins in one of the last six months of any year, candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of October in that year.

In reckoning age for competition, persons who have served in any established civil situation to which they were admitted with the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding two years which they may have spent in such service.

2. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

- (a) That they are unmarried or widows.
- (b) That they are duly qualified in respect of health and character.

No person will be eligible who is not a natural-born British subject, and the daughter of a father also a natural-born British subject; provided that exception may be made in the case of persons serving in a civil situation to which they were admitted with the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners.

Provided also that if the Civil Service Commissioners are satisfied in the case of any candidate who is a British subject but does not fulfil all the requirements of the rule as to nationality and descent, that the candidate is so closely connected by ancestry and upbringing with His Majesty's dominions that an exception may properly be made to that rule, they may accept such candidate as eligible provided that this discretion shall not be exercisable unless (a) the father or the paternal grandfather of the candidate was a natural-born British subject, and (b) neither

the father nor the paternal grandfather had acquired any other nationality by naturalisation or by any other voluntary and formal act.

3. At each Examination the number of candidates to be selected will be such as may from time to time be fixed.

4. The subjects of Examination and the marks they carry will be as follows:—

1. English	300
2. Reading Manuscript	100
3. Arithmetic	200
4. Geography	200

Candidates must obtain such an aggregate number of marks as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

5. The Examination is open only to candidates actually resident in the London district; and no candidate will be eligible for appointment unless she can satisfy the Postmaster-General that she possesses the required local residential qualification. It will be within the authority of the Postmaster-General to decline to employ a candidate successful in the Examination if he is not satisfied on inquiry that the candidate complies with this requirement.

6. Candidates must be at least 5 feet in height.

7. Persons holding situations in the Civil Service must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the Examination, before the commencement of the competition.

8. Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

9. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

10. A fee of 7s. 6d. will be required from every candidate attending an Examination.
