WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

THE WEIGHTS AND MEASURES (AMENDMENT No. 3) REGULATIONS, 1932, DATED JULY 8, 1932, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE UNDER SECTION 5 OF THE WEIGHTS AND MEASURES ACT, 1904 (4 EDW. 7 C. 28) EXTENDING THE PERIOD OF ALLOWANCE FOR CERTAIN WEIGHING AND MEASURING APPLIANCES.

The Board of Trade in exercise of the powers conferred upon them in this behalf by Section 5 of the Weights and Measures Act, 1904 (4 Edw. 7. c. 28), and of all other powers (if any) in that behalf do hereby make the following regulations, viz. :—

1.—(a) These Regulations may be cited as the Weights and Measures (Amendment No. 3) Regulations, 1932.

(b) The Interpretation Act, 1889 (52 & 53 Vict. c. 63) shall apply to these Regulations in like manner as it applies to an Act of Parliament.

2. Any weight measure or instrument in respect of which a period of 20 years was allowed in Regulation 14 (b) of the Weights and Measures Regulations, 1907, (a) from the date thereof, during which such weight measure or

instrument might be continued in use and be re-stamped may, provided that it is correct within the meaning of such Regulations, be continued in use and be re-stamped from time to time until such time as the Board of Trade may hereafter by regulation otherwise prescribe.

3. These Regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of October 1932.

MERCHANDISE MARKS ACT, 1926.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

SPOONS AND FORKS; GOLD AND SILVERSMITHS' WARES; WATCH AND CLOCK CASES.

With reference to the notice which was published in the London, Edinburgh and Belfast Gazettes of the 11th March 1932, regarding a reference made by the Board of Trade to the Standing Committee under the Merchandise

(a) S.R. & O. 1907, No. 698.

Marks Act, 1926, in respect of imported goods of the following descriptions:—

1. Articles of the following descriptions of a type used for domestic purposes:—

(a) Spoons and forks (other than carving forks) made wholly or partly of metal.

(b) Knives with blades made wholly or partly of metal, other than steel or iron.

2. Articles of the following descriptions made wholly or mainly of (i.) gold, silver, platinum, nickel or copper, or (ii.) of any alloy containing gold, silver, platinum, nickel, tin or copper, or (iii.) of any non-ferrous metal plated or otherwise coated with gold, silver, platinum, chromium, nickel or tin or any alloy thereof:—

(a) Articles used in connection with the serving of food or drink, including waiters, stands, frames and holders.

(b) Ecclesiastical ware.

(c) Smokers' requisites of the following descriptions:—

Cigar and cigarette cases and boxes; match stands, cases and boxes; and ash trays.

(d) Presentation shields, bowls and cups.

(e) Jewel and trinket boxes; dressing-table trays; epergnes; vases; bowls; candlesticks; candelabra; inkstands; pentrays; crumb scoops; gongs; photograph frames and calendars.

(f) Watch and clock cases.

MERCHANDISE MARKS ACT, 1926.

REFERENCE TO STANDING COMMITTEE.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 2, Sub-Section (4) of the Merchandise Marks Act, 1926, the Board of Trade give notice that, in pursuance of an application received by them for the making of an Order in Council to require imported goods of certain classes and descriptions to bear an indication of origin, they have made a reference to the Standing Committee appointed by them under the Act in respect of imported goods of the following descriptions:—

(a) Pencils consisting of strips made wholly or partly of graphite, carbon, chalk, gypsum, talc, colours or dyestuffs, encased in wood, paper, or other materials, but not including propelling pencils;

(b) Strips of the descriptions set out above including those for propelling and other mechanical pencils.

Attention is called to the fact that while under the provisions of the above Act the Committee must in every case referred to them consider whether the goods should bear an indication of origin at the time of sale or exposure for sale, they may also at their discretion consider and report on the question whether such goods should bear an indication of origin at the time of importation.

EXPLOSIVES IN COAL MINES ORDER.

The Secretary for Mines gives notice that on the 14th July 1932 the Board of Trade made an Order in pursuance of Section 61 of the Coal Mines Act, 1911, adding to the First Schedule to the Explosives in Coal Mines Order of the 1st September 1913, the explosive *Ammonite No. 1P*, manufactured by The Miners' Safety Explosive Company, Limited, and adding to the Second Schedule to that Order the explosive *Lumpit (L.D.)*, manufactured by The Colliery Explosives Company, Limited.
