A PROCLAMATION

PROHIBITING, UNDER SECTION 1 OF THE RUSSIAN GOODS (IMPORT PROHIBITION) ACT, 1933, THE IMPORTATION INTO THE UNITED KINGDOM OF CERTAIN ARTICLES.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by Section 1 of the Russian Goods (Import Prohibition) Act, 1933, it is enacted that We may by Proclamation prohibit the importation into the United Kingdom of all goods whatsoever grown produced or manufactured in the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics or of any class or description of such goods specified in the Proclamation:

And whereas We have deemed it expedient to prohibit the importation into the United Kingdom of goods so grown produced or manufactured of the classes or descriptions herein-after specified:

Now, therefore, We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, and in virtue and exercise of the powers aforesaid, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation declaring and it is hereby declared that on and after the 26th day of April 1933 the importation into the United Kingdom of goods of the classes or descriptions specified in the

Schedule hereto grown produced or manufactured in the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, is prohibited.

THE SCHEDULE above referred to.

- Butter.
- Wheat in grain.
- Barley in grain.
- Oats in grain.
- Maize in grain.
- Poultry and game.
- Cotton raw (including unmanufactured cotton waste and unbleached cotton linters).
- Petroleum oils.
- Wood and timber, hewn, sawn, planed or dressed (including pitprops, pitwood, staves and sleepers).
- Articles manufactured wholly or partly of wood and timber, namely,
 - Plywood;
 - Builders' woodwork (including window-frames, doors, gates, &c., and parts thereof).

Given at Our Court at Windsor Castle this nineteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and thirty-three, and in the twenty-third year of Our Reign.

MARKING OF IMPORTED MEAT AND
POULTRY.

MERCHANDISE MARKS ACT, 1926.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 2, Sub-section (4) of the Merchandise Marks Act, 1926, the Board of Trade give notice that, in pursuance of an application received by them for the making of an Order in Council to require imported goods of certain classes and descriptions to bear an indication of origin, they have made a reference to the Standing Committee appointed by them under the Act in respect of imported goods of the following descriptions:—

- (i.) Clocks, including mechanically driven, electrically driven (from mains and batteries), electro-magnetically driven, electrically wound, boudoir and travelling clocks;

- (ii.) Clock movements of all descriptions with or without escapements;
(iii.) Synchronous electric motors of the type used for clocks, clock movements, or time recording instruments;
(iv.) Platform escapements;
(v.) Clockwork movements for apparatus or instruments other than apparatus or instruments used for indicating the time of day.

Attention is called to the fact that, while under the provisions of the above Act the Committee must in every case referred to them consider whether the goods should bear an indication of origin at the time of sale or exposure for sale, they may also, at their discretion, consider and report upon the question whether such goods should bear an indication of origin at the time of importation.
