RULES PUBLICATION ACT, 1893. IN THE MATTER OF THE ROAD TRAFFIC Аст, 1934.

Notice is hereby given under the Rules Publication Act, 1893, that, whereas the Minister of Transport on the twenty-third day of August 1934 made the Motor Vehicles (Construction and Use) (Amendment) Provisional Regulations, 1934, prohibiting as from the twenty-seventh day of August 1934 the use of motor horns or other sound devices used for signalling the approach of a motor vehicle between the hours of 11.30 p.m. and 7 a.m. within a radius of five miles from Charing Cross, London, it is proposed by the Minister of Transport after the expiration of at least 40 days from this date in pursuance of the

powers conferred upon him by Section 9 of the aforesaid Road Traffic Act to make amending Regulations under which the prohibition is made applicable to all roads throughout Great Britain in "built-up" areas, that is to say, roads on which there is provided a system of street lighting furnished by means of lamps placed not more than 200 yards apart.

And notice is hereby further given that on account of urgency the Minister of Transport has under Section 2 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, made the Motor Vehicles (Construction and Use) (Amendment No. 2) Provisional Regulations, 1934, to bring into force the above-mentioned extension of the prohibition on the sixteenth day of September 1934, as Provisional Regulations to continue in force until Statutory Rules have been made in accordance with the provisions of Section 1 of that Act.
