The following addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkesbury, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the home department, have been by his Lordship presented to the King: which addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Council of the City of Edinburgh, in Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Council of the city of Edinburgh, beg leave to address your Majesty at this period so interesting to your Majesty's kingdoms, and to the whole nations of Europe.

We are not insensible of the evils to which we are exposed, or of the dangers with which we are threatened. We cannot and we do not wish to disguise from ourselves that the war in which your Majesty is engaged has been distinguished by perils hitherto unknown to the civilized world. But it can never be forgotten that this war was not undertaken from views of ambition and conquest, but for the just and necessary purpose of defending the honour of your Majesty's crown, and the liberty and dignity of your people, against the presumptuous usurpations of a power, whose unceasing aim, amid the variety and extent of its designs against the rights of independent nations, has been the subjugation of this happy empire; and it is not without feelings of an honourable pride we reflect, that the wisdom of your Majesty's councils, and the efforts of your arms, have not been in vain; that by them the encroachments of the enemy had

been staved; and that Great Britain has been, and, under the blessing of Almighty God may continue to be, the refuge to which other nations may still resort for assistance and protection.

With these sentiments deeply impressed on our hearts, we have felt it a duty we owe to the community of this ancient metropolis, which we represent, humbly to express to your Majesty our firm conviction, that a peace suitable to the interests and dignity of your realms is only to be attained by persevering in those measures which have given to this country the high station she now holds among the people of the earth; and that whatever exertions or sacrifices may be required, we are willing to support, or to fall with the honour of your Majesty's crown, the independence of your empire, and the rights and liberties of your subjects.

To the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty,
