The following addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkesbury, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by his Lordship presented to the King; which addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Magistrates, Merchants, Bankers, Ship-Owners, and other principal Inhabitants of the Town and Port of Leith.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

At this important crisis, when the eyes of Europe are bent on the exertions of the nation, we, your Majesty's most loyal subjects, the Magistrates, Merchants, Bankers, Ship-Owners, and other Inhabitants of Leith, conceive it our duty to approach the throne, and thus humbly to express to your Majesty our sentiments of veneration for your sacred person, and attachment to our inestimable constitution.

While the honour and dignity of your Majesty's crown, the existence of the empire, and the weal of your subjects, call for a continuation of the arduous contest in which your Majesty is unavoidably engaged, we presume to offer our assurances of cheerfully submitting to all those burdens and privations that are ever the concomitants of war; satisfied that no sacrifice can be too great for the preservation of our happy constitution, which we trust will ever be supported by the concord and unanimity of your subjects.

While we mark the progress of a rapacious tyrant; while we behold the once powerful nations that surround us humiliated, degraded, and fallen, we look with gratitude to that Pro-

vidence which hath hitherto supported this happy land, confident that, under the blessing of Heaven, the wisdom of your Majesty's counsils, the continued energy of your arms, and the loyalty of your people, every effort of our enemies will terminate in glory to the British name; and that your Majesty's paternal wishes will ultimately be gratified in the attainment of a safe, permanent, and honourable peace.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,
