The following addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkesbury, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by his Lordship presented to the King; which addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble address of the Provost, Magistrates, and Town-Council of the City of Aberdeen, and of a numerous meeting of the Burgesses and other Inhabitants of the said City, assembled in the Town-hall.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's very dutiful and loyal subjects, the Provost, Magistrates, Council, and a numerous meeting of the Burgesses and other Inhabitants of your populous commercial City of Aberdeen, beg leave to express at this important crisis our united and cordial attachment to your Majesty's royal person and government, and our unalterable resolution to support at all times, and by every means in our power, the just rights of our beloved Sovereign, and the interests of the British empire.

Impressed as we are with a due sense of the difficulties and dangers of the present arduous conjuncture, we are fully satisfied that, under the blessing of Divine Providence, the only way to attain a safe, honourable, and lasting peace, is by uniting in those spirited, wise, and vigorous measures, which such a conjuncture demands.

We rejoice therefore to see that the menaces of our enemies, and the approach of dangers, have served only to animate the courage of your faithful people, and to call forth that national spirit, which has so often checked and defeated

the projects of ambition and injustice, preserved the liberties of Europe in general, and which enables us at present to vindicate our own rights and independence. And we can with the utmost confidence assure your Majesty, that there is no part of your dominions where your loyal subjects are more firmly determined to encounter any difficulty or danger in defence of their country, than they are in the City of Aberdeen.

To the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble address of the Provost, Magistrates, and Town-Council of the ancient Royal Burgh of Inverness, in Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, the Provost, Magistrates, and Town-Council of the ancient Royal Burgh of Inverness, in Council assembled, beg leave humbly to approach your Majesty on the present eventful period, with an assurance of our loyalty and attachment to your Majesty's sacred person, and of our determined resolution to support with our lives the dignity of your Majesty's throne, and the privileges of our most invaluable constitution.

We are not ignorant of the power maintained by the present ruler of France over the continent of Europe, nor of the means by which he has acquired it; and while we learn with regret the conduct of some states, and with horror the oppression of others, we cannot enough admire the wisdom and firmness of your Majesty and your Government, nor be sufficiently thankful to Providence for the peculiar blessings we enjoy in common with your Majesty's subjects.

In your Majesty and your Councils we place the firmest reliance, convinced that perseverance in the vigorous measures lately adopted affords the most probable means of obtaining an honourable and lasting peace; and we are determined to submit to every privation which the last effort of the enemy against our commercial independence may impose.

That your Majesty may long reign over a loyal, free, and happy people, and live many years after a successful termination of the present war, is the most ardent wish and prayer of the Magistrates and Town-Council of the Royal Burgh of Inverness.
