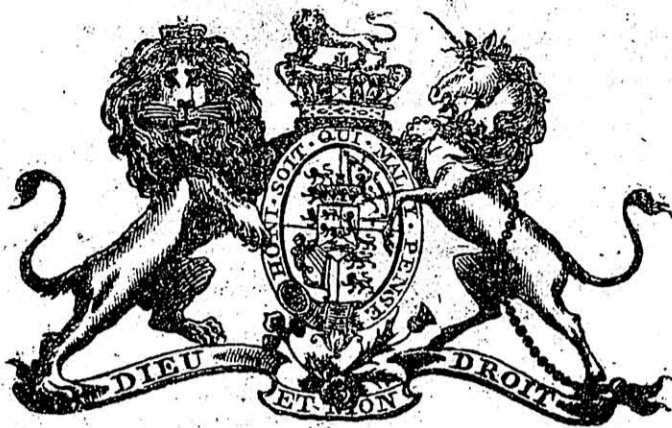

The following addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkesbury, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by his Lordship presented to the King; which addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Unto the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble address of the Magistrates and Council of the Town of Kilmarnock, in Common Council assembled, and of the principal Merchants and Manufacturers thereof.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, your Majesty's ever dutiful and loyal subjects, the Magistrates and Council, and principal Merchants and Manufacturers of the Town of Kilmarnock, beg leave to approach the throne at this particular and eventful period, and to renew our assurances of attachment to your Majesty's person and government.

Aware of the obstacles which the enemy ever throws in the way of actual negociation for a solid peace, we are determined cheerfully to submit to every privation attendant on, and to contribute every aid in our power towards the prosecution of the war in which the nation is engaged;—a war unexampled in history for the mode in which it is conducted on the side of the enemy, but which is waged on the part of your Majesty for the preservation of all that is dear to Britons. And we rejoice in those vigorous measures lately adopted by your Majesty's Ministers, which we hope will be continued, and which, under Divine Providence, we are persuaded are the only effectual means of bringing about an honourable and permanent peace. To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Provost, Magistrates, and Council of your ancient Town of Stirling, humbly beg leave at the present eventful crisis to repeat our sincere attachment to your Majesty's person and government, and our readiness to contribute every thing in our power towards the support of your Majesty's just rights, and the true interests of the empire, which are inseparably connected.

Whilst we behold the usurper of the throne of France, with insatiable ambition, cruelty, and injustice, trampling upon the other powers of Europe, and threatening to cramp the industry, and to annihilate the commerce of your Majesty's dominions, we are fully sensible that it is our duty cheerfully to submit to those burdens and privations which may be necessary during such an unprecedented state of warfare.

But we firmly trust, through the blessing of Divine Providence, that your Majesty's well known magnanimity and steadiness, with the united exertions of a brave and loyal people, will be ultimately crowned with success; and that your Majesty will long continue to reign the bright example of a patriot king, surrounded with the love and confidence of your grateful subjects.
