To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty, The humble address of the Noblemen and Gentlemen Heritors of the County of Fife,

at a General Meeting assembled. Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Noblemen and Gentlemen Heritors of the County of Fife, humbly approach the throne at this period, when we consider the dangers to which our country is exposed from the power and ambition of our enemies, to declare our firm resolution to support with our lives and fortunes the safety, honour, and independence of the British empire.

We are persuaded that it is only thorugh the united and vigorous exertions of the strength and resources of the country we can expect either success or security; and being deeply impressed with a sense of the unexampled difficulties with which the state is surrounded, we reflect with pride and satisfaction that a due sense of all these difficulties will only serve to arouse in the minds of all ranks and descriptions of your Majesty's subjects, a firm resolution to surmount them, and a fixed and steady determination to consider no sacrifice too great, where the liberties, honour, and independence of our country are at stake.
