ST. JAMES'S, MARCH 9, 1808

The following addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkesbury, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by his Lordship presented to the King; which addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty.

We, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Provost, Magistrates, and Town-Council of St. Andrews, the Principals and Professors of the University, the Clergy, and other Inhabitants of the City, assembled in a General Meeting, beg leave to approach your Majesty's throne, in order to express our warm and steady attachment to your Majesty's person and government.

We are aware of the difficulties in which our country is involved by the present unexampled state of Europe; but we cannot entertain a doubt that, in a war undertaken, not for the purposes of ambition and aggrandizement, but in defence of your Majesty's crown, and of the independence and glory of the British empire, you will meet with the affectionate and zealous support of all your people; and we trust that, with the blessing of Divine Providence, the issue will be successful and glorious for Britain.

We have seen with much satisfaction that, by the promptitude, decision, and energy of your Majesty's government, and the valour and good conduct of your Majesty's fleets and armies, the schemes and efforts of the enemy against this country have hitherto been frustrated. And, convinced that it is only by a perseverance in vigorous measures that we can hope to obtain such a peace as is consistent with the interests and the dignity of your empire, we pledge our-

selves to your Majesty, that we will submit, without murmuring, to the privations and burdens which the prosecution of a just and necessary war may require; and that no perils or hardships shall shake in our breasts that firm determination to defend all that is dear to Britons, which this awful crisis imperiously demands.

To the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, the Provost, Magistrates, Clergy, Merchants, Manufacturers, Traders, and other Inhabitants of Dundee and neighbourhood, beg leave to approach your Majesty with the most sincere sentiments of loyalty and attachment to your Majesty's person and government. At a period unexampled in the history of our country, or even of the world, your Majesty must be filled with anxious care and solicitude for the happiness and welfare of your people. While we lament the miseries which the scourge of nations has inflicted upon our fellow-creatures in other countries, we rejoice that, by the blessing of Providence upon your Majesty's councils, these evils have not reached this happy land. Though he has been permitted to trample upon the sacred ties of social life, and to destroy the important relations which bound together the community of nations, our free constitution, our equal laws, our national prosperity, remain untouched by his unhallowed hand.

To the virtue and bravery of our forefathers your Majesty owes the dignity of reigning over a free people; from them we inherit the blessings of a free government. How great the responsibility upon us, upon whom depend the

maintenance and transmission of these invaluable privileges. Should the unbounded ambition of the enemy still prompt him to avoid peace, we are prepared for the contest. Our trade, our property, our comforts may be abridged, but our religion, our constitution, our independence, we trust, are invulnerable. Though he has united the powers of the world for our destruction we do not despond. We indulge in the belief that the finger of Omnipotence points to our country as the bulwark of liberty and religion; and we hope that Divine Providence, by giving wisdom and energy to your Majesty's councils, and zeal and unanimity to your people, has in reserve for your Majesty the highest honour that a Monarch can enjoy, that of arresting the torrent of despotism, and of giving peace, liberty, and happiness to a suffering world.
