We trust that the continuance of the same prompt and decisive measures will, through Divine Providence, completely defeat all his malicious designs, maintain inviolate the honour of your Majesty's crown, and the liberties of your people.

Convinced that these invaluable objects can only be obtained by firm and manly conduct, we assure your Majesty, that we will cheerfully make every exertion, and submit to every privation, that may be necessary for prosecuting the war with vigour, and bringing the enemy to conditions of peace safe and honourable to your Majesty's empire.

That your Majesty may long sway the sceptre over a free, loyal, and happy people; and that your illustrious house may reign over the British empire to latest posterity, is our most ardent wish and prayer.

To the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble address of the Magistrates and Town-Council of your Royal Burgh of Queensferry.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Magistrates and Town-Council of the Royal Burgh of Queensferry, beg leave, in the present arduous situation of the country, humbly to approach your Majesty with expressions of our gratitude for that paternal care of the welfare and interests of your subjects, which has invariably manifested itself in your Majesty's conduct; and with the assurance of our confidence in the wisdom of your Majesty's councils towards the attainment of a permanent security to these realms, against the attempts of all our enemies. We feel that this great object cannot be accomplished without exertions such as at no former period of our history were called for. We feel also the value and magnitude of the stake for which we have to contend. The efforts of our foes are directed against our independence; against those liberties which have been handed down to us from a long series of ancestors, and which have been the admiration and envy of all the surrounding nations. For the preservation of these, pure as they have been transmitted to us, we beg most humbly to assure your Majesty that no personal or private considerations shall influence our conduct, and that such shall never by us be put in competition with the birthright of Britons.
