WESTMINSTER, MARCH 27, 1808.

This day the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molineux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of his Majesty's Commission for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for settling and securing a certain annuity on Viscount Lake and the two next persons to whom the title of Viscount Lake shall descend, in consideration of the eminent services of the late General Viscount Lake.

An Act to amend and continue, until the 25th day of March 1809, so much of an Act of the 47th year of his present Majesty; as allows certain bounties on British plantation raw sugar exported.

An Act for further continuing, until the 25th day of March 1809, certain bounties and drawbacks on the exportation of sugar from Great Britain, and for suspending the countervailing duties and bounties on sugar, when the duties imposed by an Act of last session of Parliament shall be suspended.

An Act to continue, until the 25th day of March 1809, certain Acts for regulating the drawbacks and bounties on the exportation of sugar from Ireland, and allowing British plantation sugar to be warehoused in Ireland; and for warehousing in Ireland rum or spirits of the British sugar plantations.

An Act for amending and further continuing an Act, made in the 38th year of his present Majesty, for regulating the payment of the duties on cinnamon, cloves, nutmegs, and mace.

An Act for punishing mutiny and desertion, and for the better payment of the army and their quarters.

An Act for the regulation of his Majesty's Royal Marine forces while on shore.

An Act to empower the Commissioners appointed

for distributing the money paid by the United States of America, to withdraw the same from the Bank, and vest it in Exchequer Bills.

An Act for making perpetual several laws relating to permitting the exportation of tobacco pipe-clay from Great Britain to the British sugar colonies in the West Indies; the importation of salt from Europe into Quebec in America; and the prohibiting of foreign wrought silks and velvets.

An Act to continue, until the 25th day of March 1810, an Act made in the forty-sixth year of his present Majesty, for permitting the importation of masts, yards, bowsprits, and timber for naval purposes, from the British colonies in North America, duty free.

An Act to continue several laws relating to the granting a bounty on the importation into Great Britain of hemp, and rough and undressed flax, from his Majesty's colonies in America; and to the more effectually encouraging the manufacture of flax and cotton in Great Britain; until the 25th day of March 1810; and for granting a bounty upon certain species of British and Irish linens exported from Great Britain, and taking off the duties on importation into Great Britain of foreign raw linen yarns made of flax, until the 25th day of March 1811.

An Act for further continuing, until three months after the ratification of a definitive treaty of peace, an Act made in the 44th year of his present Majesty, for permitting the importation into Great Britain of hides and other articles in foreign ships.

An Act to continue, until the 25th day of March 1810, several laws relating to the encouragement of the Greenland whale fisheries, to the admission to entry in Great Britain of oil and blubber of Newfoundland, taken by his Majesty's subjects carrying on the fishery from, and residing in the said island; and to the allowing the importation of fish from Newfoundland and the coast of Labrador.

An act for further continuing, until the 25th day of July 1809, an Act made in the 33d year of his present Majesty, for rendering the payment of creditors more equal and expeditious in Scotland.

An Act for completing the improvement of the port of Bristol.

An Act to enable the Company of Proprietors of the East London Water-Works to purchase other water-works, and to amend an Act of the 47th year of his present Majesty, relating to the said East London Water-Works.

An Act for better assessing and collecting the poor and other rates in the parish of St Saviour, in the borough of Southwark, in the County of Surry, and regulating the poor thereof.

An Act to continue the term, and alter and enlarge the powers, of two Acts of his late and present Majesty, for repairing the roads from Hinckley to Melbourn-Cummon, and other roads in said Acts mentioned, in the counties of Leicester and Derby.

An Act for continuing the term, and enlarging the powers of three Acts, for repairing the road from Northallerton through Thrisk and Easingwold, to Burton Stone near the city of York, and also the road from Thrisk to Top Cliffe, in the county of York.

And four private Acts.

Commission in the 38th, or Ayrshire Regiment of Militia, signed by the Lord Lieutenant.
