DANGEROUS DRUGS ACTS, 1920 to 1932.

CANCELLATION OF SUSPENSION OF WITHDRAWAL OF AUTHORISATIONS.

(GEORGE SANDERS.)

Whereas, in pursuance of the power conferred upon the Secretary of State by Regulation 6 of the Raw Opium Regulations, 1921, as extended by the Coca Leaves and Indian Hemp Regulations, 1928, and by Regulation 7 of the Dangerous Drugs (Consolidation) Regulations, 1928, the authorisations granted by the Raw Opium Regulations, 1921, as extended by the Coca Leaves and Indian Hemp Regulations, 1928, and the Dangerous Drugs (Consolidation) Regulations, 1928, to persons lawfully keeping open shop for the retailing of poisons to be in possession of and to supply raw opium, coca leaves, and Indian hemp, and to manufacture any extract or tincture of Indian hemp or any preparation to which Part III. of the Dangerous Drugs Act, 1920, applies, or to carry on the business of retailing, dispensing, or compounding drugs or preparations to which Part III. of the Dangerous

Drugs Act, 1920, applies, were, by notice dated 19th March 1934 and published in the London and Edinburgh Gazettes on the 23rd March 1934, withdrawn from George Sanders, of 157 Ombersley Road, Worcester, who had been convicted of offences against the Dangerous Drugs Acts:

And whereas the operation of the notice of withdrawal of the said authorisations from the said George Sanders was, by notice dated the 7th May 1935 and published in the London and Edinburgh Gazettes on the 10th May 1935, suspended until further order:

And whereas I am of opinion that the said George Sanders cannot properly be allowed to remain an authorised person.

Now, therefore, after consultation with the Council of the Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain, I hereby cancel, as from to-day's date, the Notice of Suspension dated the 7th May 1935 and published in the London and Edinburgh Gazettes on the 10th May 1935.
