Unemployment Insurance Act, 1935.

MERCHANDISE MARKS ACT, 1926. Reference to the Standing Committee.

In accordance with the provisions of subsection (4) of Section 2 of the Merchandise Marks Act, 1926, the Board of Trade give notice that they have referred to the Standing Committee appointed by them under the Act an application for the making of an Order in Council amending Part I. of the Merchandise Marks (Imported Goods) No. 2 Order, 1928, so as to provide that the indication of origin required by that Order to be applied to imported sanitary ware of pottery shall be applied in a prescribed position and in letters of a minimum size.

Part I. of the Merchandise Marks (Imported Goods), No. 2 Order, 1928, renders it unlawful to import into the United Kingdom, or, if

imported, to sell or expose for sale in the United Kingdom, inter alia, any goods of the above description, unless they bear an indication of origin stamped, printed, embossed, or impressed on each article indelibly.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

PAPER BOX TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

Proposal to vary minimum rates of wages.

In accordance with Regulations made by the Minister of Labour under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, and dated 21st April 1927, the Paper Box Trade Board (Great Britain) hereby give notice that they propose to vary minimum rates of wages at present set out in their Notice B.(19) dated 17th June 1933, so as to provide for the current rates of wages being paid for a week of 45 hours instead of 48 hours.

Particulars of the proposed variations may be obtained on application to the Secretary of the Trade Board at the address given below.

In accordance with Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board will consider any objections to the proposed variations which may be lodged with them within two months from 8th October 1937. Any such objection should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary, Paper Box Trade Board, Metropole Buildings, Northumberland Avenue, London, W.C.2. It is desirable that objections should state precisely, and, so far as possible, with reasons, what is objected to.
