To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble address of the Freeholders, Commissioners of Supply, Justices of the Peace, and Heritors of the County of Ross, at a General Meeting assembled at Dingwall, on the 17th day of March 1808 years.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

We, your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, humbly approach the throne at this period, when we consider the dangers to which our country is exposed from the power and ambition of our enemies, to declare our firm resolution to support with our lives and fortunes the safety, honour, and independence of the British empire, and to express our inviolable attachment to your Majesty's person and family.

We are persuaded that united and vigorous exertions in applying the resources of the country will insure success and security. And being impressed with a sense of the unexampled difficulties with which the state is surrounded, we reflect with pride and satisfaction that a due sense of our danger has served to excite in the minds of all ranks and descriptions of your Majesty's subjects, a firm determination to surmount them, and a fixed and steady resolution to consider no sacrifice too great where the liberty, honour, and independence of our country are at stake.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty, The humble address of the Noblemen, Freeholders, Commissioners of Supply, and Heritors of the County of Lanark.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

We, the Noblemen, Freeholders, Commissioners of Supply, and Heritors of the County of Lanark, actuated by the purest principles of loyalty and patriotism, beg leave to approach your Majesty's throne, to express at this critical situation in which the British empire is placed, our assurances of unshaken attachment to your Majesty's person, family, and government; and our firm resolution of maintaining to the utmost of our power the honour and dignity of your Majesty's crown, and the true interests of the united kingdom.

We contemplate with unfeigned concern the dangers which surround the British empire by the mischievously successful policy of our most inveterate enemy, whose influence and power have already subjugated surrounding nations to his ambitious views. We at the same time felicitate ourselves, that this more favoured empire has hitherto been enabled to resist the rage of our implacable enemy, and that we still retain the courage and power to check the progress of his arms; but it requires the unanimity of Britons of every description to support the arduous contest, and to persevere in their attachment to that unrivalled constitution of which he wishes to deprive us.

Convinced that the preservation of the invaluable constitution under which we live is worthy of every sacrifice we can make, we are anxious to express to your Majesty our firm determination to suffer any privations, to undergo any hardships, and to sacrifice our lives and fortunes, if necessary, for the maintenance of the honour and dignity of your Majesty's crown, and of the inestimable blessings of that free con-

stitution handed down to us from our forefathers.

That your Majesty may long continue to reign on the throne of this kingdom, and in the hearts of a faithful and loyal people, is the most ardent prayer of your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Noblemen, Freeholders, Commissioners of Supply, and Heritors of the County of Lanark.

the necessity of the times may render necessary, too great for maintaining the honour and dignity of your Majesty's crown, and the support of our happy constitution, and transmitting the same inviolate to posterity.

That all prosperity and happiness may attend your Majesty, and that the Divine Providence may grant a blessing on your councils, and success to your arms, in securing the honour and independence of the country, is our earnest wish and prayer.
