Whereas, by an order of his Majesty in Council, of the 25th day of November 1807, it was ordered and declared, that information of his Majesty's order in Council of the 11th day of the same November should be taken and held to have been received in the places therein mentioned, at the periods therein respectively assigned, to such places respectively: And whereas the countries on the continent of North and South America, extending from the tenth to the thirtieth degree of north latitude, are not included in the places so specified; his Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, to order and declare, that information of the said order of the 11th of November 1807, shall be taken and held to have been received in all places on the continent of North and South America, extending from the tenth to the thirtieth degree of north latitude, including the island of New Orleans, on the 10th day of February 1808; and that all matters contained in the said order of the 25th of November 1807 shall apply to vessels sailing from the places aforesaid, as having received notice of the said order of the 11th of November 1807, on the said 10th day of February 1808: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, and Judges of the Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to take the necessary measures herein, as to them shall respectively appertain.

Copies of Letters from Captains MASON and BATHURST, of his Majesty's Ships *Daphne* and *Salsette*, addressed to Rear-Admiral Sir Samuel HOOD, and transmitted to the Honourable WILLIAM WELLESLEY POLE by Vice-Admiral Sir JAMES SAUMAREZ.

His Majesty's Ship Daphne, April 26, 1808,
SIR,
off Lessor.

Judging from the cargo of the sloop destroyed on the 22d, that the rest of the enemy's vessels at Flodstrand were also loaded with provisions, and destined for the relief of Norway, I conceived it to be an object to attempt getting them out; and the officers and crews of both ships having volunteered, I, last night, sent three boats from this ship, and the *Tartarus* two, all under the direction of Lieutenant William Elliot, First of the *Daphne*, accompanied by Mr Hugh Stewart, Master; Lieutenant Boger of the Royal Marines; and Messrs Beazely, Durell, Elliot, Moore, and Ayton, midshipmen; and Lieutenants Gittins and Patterson, and Messrs Septford, Luffman, and Andrews, midshipmen of the *Tartarus*. They were towed near the shore by the Forward gun-brig. They found the vessels moored close under the fort of the castle, which mounts ten guns, with hawsers fast to the shore; and immediately on getting to them the alarm was given by some Danish boats; the Danes instantly forsook the vessels, and the castle and three other guns began, and kept up a heavy fire of round, grape, and musketry. Many of the shot went through the hulls and sails of the vessels; notwithstanding which the five boats cleared the harbour of all but two brigs, both light, and one of them with neither sails nor rudder. As no credit can accrue but to those who planned and executed this enterprize, I trust, Sir, I may be allowed to express to you my admiration of the steady

valour and good conduct of Lieutenant Elliot, (whose behaviour at all times led me to expect it from him), as well as every officer and man employed in it. He speaks in the strongest terms of the courage and steadiness of the officers, petty officers, seamen, and marines of both ships. I am happy, Sir, to add, that the loss is very trifling on either side, which I am surprized at, having observed from the ship the heavy fire kept up by the enemy. A Danish boat, with five men in, having the temerity to persist in endeavouring to retake one of the vessels, although repeatedly warned by Lieutenant Elliot, the latter was obliged, with his people, to fire in their own defence, and three of the five fell: on our side there were three wounded by the enemy, and one by mistake, but none badly. Amongst the former is Lieutenant Elliot, which, with his being an old lieutenant, and a very deserving officer, will, I trust, be an additional inducement with you to recommend him to the notice of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

I inclose a list of the wounded. There is a man slightly wounded belonging to the *Tartarus*, but I have not learnt the nature of his wounds. All but my First Lieutenant and one seaman are able to do duty.

5 brigs, of from apparently 130 to 190 tons, deeply laden with grain and provisions.
3 galliots, of about 110 tons each, 2 deeply laden as above, and 1 light.
1 schooner, of about 80 tons, deeply laden as above.
1 sloop, of about 90 tons, deeply laden as above.



A List of Officers and Seamen belonging to his Majesty's Ship Daphne, Francis Mason, Esq. Captain, and Tartarus Sloop, William Russell, Esq. acting Commander, wounded on the 25th of April 1808, in cutting out ten vessels from Flodstrand, on the coast of Jutland, laden with Provisions, and supposed to be bound to Norway.

Daphne—Lieut. William Elliot, severe contusion on the middle of the right thigh by a splinter, when on board one of the enemy's vessels. Mr Hugh Stewart, master, slight contusion in the elbow, received when in the act of boarding. Henry Tod, seaman, punctured wound in the neck by one of the *Daphne's* crew, having mistaken him for a Dane. William Johnson, seaman, lacerated wound in the hand by a splinter, when on board one of the enemy's vessels.

Tartarus—One man slightly wounded.

To the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Clergy, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of Peace, Freeholders, Incorporated Trades, Merchants, and principal Inhabitants of the Royal Burgh of Kirkwall, in the County of Orkney.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, the Clergy, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of Peace, Freeholders, Incorporated Trades, Merchants, and principal Inhabitants of the Royal Burgh of Kirkwall, in the County of Orkney, beg leave to lay at the foot of your Majesty's throne the assurances of our most unfeigned regard for your Majesty's person and government.

We are fully sensible, Sire, of those invaluable blessings which we, in common with all your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, enjoy under your Majesty's mild and wise administration. We are alike mindful of the paramount necessity at this eventful period of endeavouring, by every possible means, to animate our fellow citizens in the continuance of that unshaken fidelity and attachment to your Majesty's family, by which, we trust, we have hitherto ever been distinguished.

We feel most poignantly yet patiently the pressure of war; but we comfort ourselves with the hopes of hereafter enjoying the sweets and the blessings of peace.

We have to express our ardent wishes for our country's pre-eminence and glory; and that, at a time when the thrones of so many European monarchs have been overturned by the overwhelming influence of France, no peace will be concluded at the smallest sacrifice of our national honour.

Insulated as our situation is, and distant from the seat of our government, yet we humbly as-

sure you that that distance shall never tend to diminish our loyalty; and whatever, from our locality, can afford the means of adding to the number of our seamen, it will be our constant aim and study to support.

The military defence with which we understand it is your gracious intention to succour us, we, with the greatest submission, assure you will be received amongst us as an aid as much to be desired as it is necessary; and with this force, coupled with the spirit which we trust is inherent in the breast of every Briton, we feel confident that we shall be able to maintain our possessions against any attacks of our inveterate enemy.
