The following address having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkesbury, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been by his Lordship presented to the King; which address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING'S Most Excellent Majesty,  
The humble Address of the Baillies and Trustees of Port-Glasgow and Newark.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

We, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Baillies and Trustees of your Towns of Port-Glasgow and Newark, in Council assembled, on occasion of the patriotic struggle of the Spanish and Portuguese nations for their liberties and independence, and your Majesty's dignified and liberal declaration, and prompt and vigorous assistance, furnishing another opportunity of convincing the continent that your Majesty's exertions against the tyrant and enemy of mankind are solely directed to the safety and defence of your own empire, and the relief of the other powers of Europe, from his cruel and treacherous usurpations and oppressions, beg leave to express our loyal and grateful thanks to your Majesty for the speedy aid so afforded to these noble patriots, in support of which your Majesty will have the unanimous concurrence of your subjects.

Your Majesty's disinterested and decisive conduct is thus laid open of new to the other powers. Let them rouse from their inglorious inactivity and fatal stupor; open their eyes to their detestable and ignoble alliances with the upstart universal destroyer, or a dastardly neutrality, equally dangerous to their safety; free themselves from the thralldom and unworthy in-

fluence of the usurper; fix their wavering minds to the dire necessity of war against the all-devouring monster; tear off the badges of their basely surrendered liberties; wrest their necks from the despot's ignominious chains; and let the spirit of independence, freedom, and just vengeance animate and invigorate their affrightened souls.

Your Majesty's powerful co-operation is offered. May they study their true interest in embracing it, and imitate the example of the brave Spaniards, who have resolved to die or be free; and their liberties and independence lost and put in hazard will yet be recovered and established; its due balance of power restored to the oppressed continent, and peace, under your Majesty's honourable dictates and high guarantee, given to the distracted world.

That your Majesty may ever be looked up to as the exalted defender and safeguard of liberty and independence, and long enjoy that inestimable satisfaction, is our most hearty and sincere prayer.
