**A PROCLAMATION,**  
*For a General Fast.*

GEORGE R.

We, taking into our most serious consideration the just and necessary war in which we are engaged, and putting our trust in Almighty God that he will graciously bless our arms both by sea and land, have resolved, and do, by and with the advice of our Privy Council, hereby command, that a public day of fasting and humiliation be observed throughout that part of our Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, on Thursday the ninth day of February next ensuing; that so both we and our people may humble ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain pardon of our sins, and, in the most devout and solemn manner, send up our prayers and supplications to the Divine Majesty for averting those heavy judgments which our manifold provocations have most justly deserved, and for imploring his blessing and assistance on our arms for the restoration of peace and prosperity to us and our dominions: and we do strictly charge and command that the said public fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all our loving subjects in Scotland, as they tender the favour of Almighty God, and would avoid his wrath and indignation, and upon pain of such punishment as we may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the performance of so religious and necessary a duty: Our will is, therefore, and we charge that this our proclamation seen, ye forthwith proceed to the market cross of Edinburgh, and all other places needful, and there, in our name and authority, make publication thereof, that none pretend ignorance: And our will and pleasure is, that our solicitor do cause printed copies hereof to be

sent to the sheriffs of the several shires, stewarts of stewardries, and bailiffs of regalities, and their clerks, whom we ordain to see the same published: And we do appoint them to send copies hereof to the several parish churches within their bounds; and that upon the Lord's day immediately preceding the day above mentioned, the same may be published and read from the pulpits immediately after divine service.

Given at Our Court at the Queen's Palace, this Twenty-first day of December One thousand eight hundred and eight, in the Forty-ninth Year of Our Reign.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

QUEEN'S PALACE, DECEMBER 21, 1808.

This day Admiral Apodaca had a private audience of his Majesty to deliver his letters of credence as Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the Supreme Junta of Spain, in the name of his Catholic Majesty Ferdinand the Seventh; to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable George Canning, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for foreign affairs, and conducted by Sir Stephen Cottrell, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.
