The Right Honourable George Canning, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for foreign affairs, has this day notified to the Ministers of neutral powers resident at this Court, that his Majesty has judged it expedient to establish the most rigorous blockade of the isles of Mauritius and Bourbon; and that the same will be maintained and enforced in the strictest manner, according to the usages of war acknowledged and allowed in similar cases.

HORSE-GUARDS, March 4, 1809.

His Majesty has been most graciously pleased to grant his permission to the Five Companies of the Royal Corsican Rangers, which composed part of the force employed under the orders of Lieutenant-General Sir John Stuart, on the 4th July 1806, to bear on their appointments (in addition to any other badges or devices to which the regiment may be entitled) the word "*Maida*," as an honourable and lasting testimony of the distinguished gallantry displayed by those companies, in common with certain other corps of the British army, in the action fought on the plains of Maida, in Calabria, on the day above mentioned.
