WAGES COUNCILS ACT, 1945.

BOOT AND SHOE REPAIRING WAGES COUNCIL (GREAT BRITAIN).

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz. :—

TEMPORARY (RECONSTRUCTION) REGULATIONS FOR FILLING VACANCIES FOR MEDICAL OFFICERS IN GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS.

1. Both men and women may compete under these Regulations.

2. Every candidate must have been born on or after 2nd August 1891, and have attained the age of 28 by the 1st January of the year in which he or she competes.

3. Every candidate must satisfy the Commissioners that he or she is either

(1) a natural-born British subject :—

(a) having at least one parent who is or was at the time of death a British subject; or

(b) of any other parentage, provided that he or she has resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of his or her appointment; or

(2) a naturalised British subject who has resided in His Majesty's dominions and or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of his or her appointment; or

(3) a British subject who, although not fulfilling the requirements of paragraph (1) or paragraph (2), satisfies the Commissioners that he or she is so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing, or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in his or her favour.

Provided that a candidate will not be eligible for appointment to the Admiralty, War Office, Air Ministry, or Ministry of Supply, unless he or she is a natural-born British subject and born within the United Kingdom or in one of the self-governing Dominions of parents also born within the United Kingdom or in one of the self-governing Dominions, except when the circumstances are such as to justify a departure from the general rule, in which case, provided the candidate satisfies the conditions prescribed by the preceding paragraphs, he or she may be admitted to appointment or competition by special permission of the First Lord of the Admiralty, the Secretary of State for War, the Secretary of State for Air, or the Minister of Supply, as the case may be.

4. Every candidate must be a fully qualified and registered Medical practitioner. Particular qualifications noted below are needed for posts in the main Departments in which the present vacancies occur, but all candidates should state in their application the nature of any medical work in which they have special qualifications or experience.

Ministry of Pensions.—Candidates should have held House appointments in general (preferably teaching) hospitals and possess wide clinical experience. Some posts will be reserved for those with recognised specialist's qualifications and experience.

General Post Office.—Good general post-graduate experience in hospital appointments and practice. Experience of or an interest in industrial medicine is an advantage.

Prison Commission.—Candidates should have had psychiatric experience and have held House appointments.

Ministry of Supply.—Experience of industrial medicine or analogous work in the Services while not absolutely essential would be an advantage.

5. (1) Every candidate must satisfy the Commissioners as to his or her health and character.

(2) The Commissioners reserve the right to give such preference to disabled persons or to particular classes of disabled persons as may be necessary in order to give effect to any general policy regarding the employment of such persons which may be adopted by His Majesty's Government provided that the disability is not of a nature to interfere with the discharge of the duties required.

6. No person who is undergoing a course of study with the aid of a grant from public funds shall be eligible to compete before the completion of the course, unless he or she has previously obtained permission to do so from the authority which administers the grant.

7. Every candidate must apply on the appropriate form within the time and in the manner of which notice is given by the Commissioners.

8. The Commissioners may summon to appear before a Selection Board all who are found to be *prima facie* eligible, or may, if they see fit, summon only those whose qualifications and experience are considered to be specially suitable. The Selection Board shall have power to give such preference to candidates born on or after 2nd August 1901 as the Commissioners consider appropriate, and candidates born before that date will be expected to have specially useful experience to their credit, of the particular kind required by employing Departments. Subject to this preference the Board will take into consideration the candidates' record of experience and education, with due regard to service in the Forces, any

recommendation from persons named by the candidates as having direct knowledge of their work in the past, and the personal qualities of the candidates as shown at the interview; and on their estimation of all the above facts they will frame their recommendations. The decision of the Commissioners will be final.

9. It will rest with the Commissioners to determine the Department to which each successful candidate shall be assigned. In making the assignments the Commissioners will be guided by the requirements of the public service. Subject to this condition, the wishes of candidates will, where possible, be respected.

10. Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their Application Forms, will disqualify them for appointment. The Interviewing Board will disregard spontaneous recommendations from persons who are not personally acquainted with the candidate's work, whether at school, at the University, in the Forces, or otherwise.

11. A successful candidate will be required to pay a fee of £1 before the issue of a certificate of qualification for appointment.

TEMPORARY (RECONSTRUCTION) REGULATIONS FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF ASSISTANT CIVIL ENGINEERS (MALE) IN THE DIRECTORATE GENERAL OF WORKS, AIR MINISTRY.

1. Every candidate must have been born on or after the 2nd August 1905 and have attained the age of 25 by 1st January of the year in which he competes.

2. Every candidate must be a natural-born British subject, and born within the United Kingdom, or in one of the self-governing Dominions, of parents also born within the United Kingdom or in one of the self-governing Dominions, except when the circumstances are such as to justify a departure from the general rule, in which case he may be admitted to the competition by special permission of the Secretary of State for Air provided the candidate satisfies the following conditions: that he is either

(a) a natural-born British subject

(i.) having at least one parent who is or was at the time of death a British subject; or

(ii.) of any other parentage, provided that he has resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of his appointment; or

(b) a naturalised British subject who has resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of his appointment; or

(c) a British subject who, although not fulfilling the requirements of sub-paragraph (a) or sub-paragraph (b), satisfies the Commissioners that he is so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing, or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in his favour.

3. A candidate will be expected to possess wide professional experience in private practice or in the service of a Local Authority or Government Department and must be qualified as follows :—

(a) be a Corporate Member of the Institution of Civil Engineers, or

(b) have passed examinations recognized by that Institution as granting exemption from Sections A and B of their examination for Associate Membership; in this case Corporate Membership must be attained within two years of entry into the Civil Service.

4. Candidates must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character.

The Commissioners reserve the right to give such preference to disabled persons or particular classes of disabled persons as may be necessary in order to give effect to any general policy regarding the employment of such persons which may be adopted by His Majesty's Government, provided that the disability is not of a nature to interfere with the discharge of the duties of an Assistant Civil Engineer for which a high physical standard is normally required.

5. No person who is undergoing a course of study with the aid of a grant from public funds shall be eligible to compete under these Regulations before the completion of the course, unless he has previously obtained permission to do so from the authority which administers the grant.

6. Every candidate must apply on the appropriate form within the time and in the manner of which notice is given by the Commissioners.

7. The candidates' credentials shall be examined at the Air Ministry and the names of those candidates who appear to have the requisite qualifications and to be best fitted for appointment will be submitted to the Civil Service Commissioners. The Civil Service Commissioners may, if they think fit, assist in the scrutiny of the application forms of the candidates.

8. Candidates who are recommended by the Air Ministry, and are accepted by the Civil Service Commissioners as possessing the requisite qualifications, will be summoned to an interview before a Selection Board which will recommend, for the vacancies existing, those candidates who appear to them to possess the highest qualifications, and their decision will be final.
