The KING has been pleased, by Warrant under His Majesty's Royal Sign Manual bearing date the 22nd February 1947, to direct Letters Patent to be passed under the Seal appointed by the Treaty of Union to be kept and made use of in place of the Great Seal of Scotland appointing Mr. George Mathers, D.L., M.P., to be His Majesty's High Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, which is to meet on the 20th May next.

## TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Friday the 7th March 1947, at 1 p.m., for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, the National Loans Act, 1939, and the Miscellaneous Financial Provisions Act, 1946, to the amount of £170,000,000.
2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000, £10,000, £25,000, £50,000, or £100,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday the 10th March 1947 to Saturday the 15th March 1947 inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.
3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.
4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000 and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.
5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House, or Broker.
6. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 1.30 p.m. (Saturday 12 noon) on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.
7. Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.
8. Tenders must be made on the printed forms which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.
9. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

In pursuance of Section 129 of the Factories Act, 1937, and the Second Schedule to that Act, the Minister of Labour and National Service hereby gives notice that he proposes to make Special Regulations under Section 60 of the Act applying to factories where luminising is or is proposed to be carried on.

The proposed Regulations take the place of the Draft Factories (Luminising) Special Regulations, 1946, as previously published in May 1946. Incorporated in the revised draft are some amendments proposed in the light of objections made to the previous draft.

The following Regulations are published by the Civil Service Commissioners with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz. :—

**TEMPORARY (RECONSTRUCTION) REGULATIONS FOR THE COMPETITIVE SELECTION OF ASSISTANTS IN THE NATIONAL LIBRARY OF SCOTLAND.**

1. Competitions under these Regulations are open both to men and women.
2. Candidates must be at least 22 and under 33 years of age on 1st August 1947.
3. Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions :—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either  
(i.) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or

(ii.) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment;

(b) If naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment;

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing, or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

4. Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g. the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

5. The Trustees of the National Library of Scotland will take such steps as they think most appropriate to make known the existence of any vacancy or vacancies which they desire to fill on any one occasion, and the Civil Service Commissioners will satisfy themselves that the steps taken have been such as to secure all desirable publicity.

6. Application shall be addressed in the first instance to the Librarian of the National Library of Scotland and shall be made on the appropriate form. After the last day for application has been reached the authorities of the Department shall scrutinize all the applications received and recommend to the Commissioners such candidates as appear to them qualified for the duties of the posts in question. They shall then forward to the Civil Service Commissioners all the application forms received, who may then, if dissatisfied with the candidates presenting themselves, take such steps in consultation with the authorities of the Library, as they may think fit to obtain other candidates. The list of

qualified candidates shall then be settled by agreement between the Civil Service Commissioners and the authorities of the National Library of Scotland.

7. Candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that they have received such systematic education, general or technical, or general and technical together, as in their opinion fits them for the post. In general, candidates should possess a University 1st or 2nd Class Honours Degree in English, Classics, History, or Modern Languages. The Commissioners may, if in doubt submit any or all of the candidates to a qualifying examination to test such education, or any part of it.

8. Candidates who are recommended by the authorities of the Department and are accepted by the Civil Service Commissioners as possessing the requisite qualifications will be summoned to an interview before a Selection Board, who will recommend for the vacancies existing those candidates who appear to them to possess the highest qualifications, and their decision will be final. The Selection Board shall be constituted by the authorities of the Department in consultation with the Commissioners who shall be represented on the Selection Board. The Selection Board will take into consideration the candidate's record of experience and education, any recommendation that they may receive from persons named by any candidates as having direct knowledge of their work in the past, and the personal qualities of the candidate as shown at the interview; and on their estimation of all the above evidence they will frame their decisions.

9. Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons except as referees to be named by them in their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment. The Selection Board will disregard recommendations from persons who are not personally acquainted with the candidate's work, whether at school, at the University, in the Forces, or otherwise.

10. If a qualifying examination is held, each candidate subjected thereto will be required to pay a fee of 5s. A selected candidate will be required to pay a fee of 10s. towards which the fee paid at the qualifying examination (if any) will count, before the issue of a certificate of qualification for appointment.

**BURGH OF FORT WILLIAM.  
NOTICE.**

**WHEREAS** a Writ was presented to the Sheriff of Inverness, Elgin, and Nairn, at Fort William, on 22nd May 1939, by the Provost, Magistrates, and Councillors of the Burgh of Fort William, craving the Court :—

1. (b) That area of ground lying to the East of the said Burgh containing 49.712 acres or thereby and as delineated and shown coloured pink on the said Plan herewith produced bounded as follows :—Commencing at a point marked "D" on said Plan and continuing a distance of 84 feet or thereby in an easterly direction along the South bank of the River Nevis to the East side of Nevis Bridge at a point marked "R" on the said Plan; thence in a North easterly direction a distance of 1040 feet or thereby following the Eastern parapet of the said bridge and the Eastern boundary of the Glasgow-Inverness road till it reaches the Eastern abutment of the bridge carrying the light railway of the North British Aluminium Company Limited over the said road at a point marked "I" on said Plan; thence

Eastwards for a distance of 252 feet or thereby to a point marked "J" on said Plan; thence in the same direction a distance of 675 feet or thereby to a point marked "O" on said Plan; thence generally in an Easterly direction following the Northern boundary fence of Claggan Farm a distance of 1863 feet or thereby to a point marked "Q" on said Plan; thence in a Southerly direction a distance of 339 feet or thereby to a point marked "S" on said Plan; thence in a Westerly direction along a stone dyke a distance of 408 feet or thereby till it reaches the centre of the River Nevis at a point marked "T" on said Plan; thence in a Westerly direction along the centre of the River Nevis until it reaches the point marked "U" on said Plan at the East side of the old bridge crossing the River Nevis; thence in a Southerly direction a distance of 228 feet or thereby to a point marked "V" on the said Plan; thence in a Westerly direction a distance of 508 feet or thereby along the base of the Cow Hill till the South-easterly point of the present Burgh Boundary marked "A" on the said Plan is reached, or such other boundaries as may appear to the Court just and proper, and to grant Warrant to record this application and the Deliverance thereon of the tenor prayed for in the Books of Court, all in terms of and in compliance with the Burgh Police (Scotland) Act, 1892, and more particularly of Section 11 thereof as amended by the Housing and Town Planning (Scotland) Act, 1919, Section 47, and other Acts applicable; and

2. To do otherwise as the Court shall deem fit, and to find any person appearing to oppose this application liable in expenses.

And whereas after certain procedure the Petition was not then proceeded with in consequence of the terms of Section 6 (1) (a) of the Local Elections and Register of

Electors (Temporary Provisions) Act, 1939, and the Process accordingly fell asleep.

By Minute of Wakening the Petitioners have now craved the Sheriff of Inverness, Moray, Nairn, and Ross and Cromarty to waken the cause in terms of the Sheriff Courts (Scotland) Act, 1907, upon which Minute the Sheriff has pronounced the following Interlocutor:—
