## TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office at the Bank of England, on Friday the 29th October 1948, at 1 p.m., for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the National Loans Act, 1939, to the amount of £170,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000, £10,000, £25,000, £50,000, or £100,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday the 1st November 1948 to Saturday the 6th November 1948 inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000 and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House, or Broker.

6. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 1.30 p.m. (Saturday, 12 noon on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.

7. Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

8. Tenders must be made on the printed forms which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

9. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury and the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, viz. :—

### RECRUITMENT UNDER NORMAL REGULATIONS TO THE SENIOR BRANCH OF THE FOREIGN SERVICE.

1. No Candidate may compete more than twice in all under Normal and Reconstruction Regulations.

2. Age. Candidates must (save as provided below) be at least 20½ years and under 24 years of age on the 1st day of August 1949, but

(a) a candidate who has served, or is serving, on a regular (including a regular short-service) engagement in H.M. Forces may deduct the period of such service from his actual age;

(b) a candidate who has served or is serving voluntarily in H.M. Forces otherwise than on a regular or short-service engagement or who has performed, or is performing, compulsory national service under the National Service Acts may deduct the period of such service from his actual age, up to a maximum of two years.

3. Marriage. Both men and women may compete under these Regulations; but

(a) every woman candidate must be unmarried or a widow;

(b) women will normally be required to resign their appointments on marriage, but in exceptional cases they may be retained with the permission of the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

The approval of the Secretary of State is required before a successful male candidate who is married takes up appointment.

4. Nationality. (1) Every candidate must :

(a) be a natural-born British subject; and

(b) have been born within the United Kingdom or within one of the self-governing Dominions of parents both of whom were also born within the United Kingdom or within one of the self-governing Dominions.

(2) No departure from this rule will be made without the special permission of the Secretary of State for Foreign

Affairs, and then only in exceptional cases and in favour of candidates who are British subjects and who also satisfy one of the following conditions :—

- (a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either
- (i.) have at least one parent who is, or was at death, a British subject; or
  - (ii.) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment;
- (b) If naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.
- (c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this sub-paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions, either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

5. *Health and Character.* Successful candidates must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character.

6. *Education.* (i.) Candidates must either (a) have completed a full course of study for an honours degree at a recognised University, and obtained at least second class honours at their degree examination, or (b) be in the last year of a full course for an honours degree at a recognised University. In the latter case, they will not be declared successful unless they can produce evidence, not later than 1st September 1949, that they have obtained at least second class honours in their degree examination.

(ii.) Candidates who are unable to satisfy the provisions of sub-paragraph (i.) may qualify if they take the written examination under Method I. for the Administrative Class of the Home Civil Service and reach in it a standard satisfactory to the Commissioners (see Appendix).

(iii.) A candidate who has served, or is serving, on a regular (including a regular short-service) engagement in His Majesty's Forces may be admitted to compete, notwithstanding that he fails to satisfy either sub-paragraph (i.) or sub-paragraph (ii.) if (a) he is in other respects eligible under these Regulations to compete; and (b) he is recommended to the Civil Service Commissioners by the appropriate Service Authority as warranting consideration for appointment to the Senior Branch of the Foreign Service by reason of his record, education, intelligence, and personal qualities.

Successful male candidates will start in Grade 9 at a salary of £360 per annum, rising by annual increments of £25 to £410, and then by annual increments of £30 to £470. For a woman the starting salary is £360 per annum, rising by annual increments of £25 to £460.

NOTE.—If you are already a Civil Servant, you will not carry your existing salary if successful in the competition, but will start at the pay shown above.

7. *Examination.* (i.) The examination consists of the following :—

(A) a written qualifying examination consisting of papers in English, two General Papers, and a test of General Intelligence.

(B) a qualifying oral test in a foreign language approved by the Commissioners (normally French, German, Italian, Russian, Spanish); but the Commissioners may dispense with this in the case of a candidate who satisfies them that he possesses adequate ability to speak a modern foreign language.

(C) for candidates who pass the qualifying examination and who pass, or are exempted from, the oral test : a series of tests of personal qualities at a residential centre, followed by an interview before the Final Selection Board.

(ii.) The final order of merit will be determined by the mark awarded by the Final Selection Board out of a maximum of 300. This will take into account the candidate's record, his intelligence and personal qualities, his work in the qualifying examination, and the report on his performance at the residential centre. In the event of a tie between two or more candidates, the Commissioners will decide which to declare successful.

8. *Candidates trained as Teachers.* Candidates who have been trained as teachers and upon whose training public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

9. *Canvassing.* Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

10. *Fee.* A fee of £1 is payable by all candidates. This must be sent with the Application Form.

11. These Regulations apply to the examination of 1949, and are liable to be modified for subsequent examinations. They are issued by the Civil Service Commissioners with the approval of the Treasury and the Foreign Office.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination under the above Regulations will be held in London in 1949. The qualifying examination will be held on the 22nd and 23rd February 1949, and the tests of personal qualities and the final interviews will be held in April and May 1949.

No person will be admitted to the examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received by the 31st December 1948, an application in the candidate's own handwriting, on the prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz :—

RECRUITMENT UNDER NORMAL REGULATIONS TO THE ADMINISTRATIVE CLASS OF THE HOME CIVIL SERVICE.

1. There will be two Methods of entry: Method I. and Method II. Regulations 2 and 3 relate to Method I., and Regulations 4 and 5 to Method II.; the remaining Regulations relate to both Methods. No candidate may compete more than twice in all under Normal and Reconstruction Regulations; but if he competes under both Method I. and Method II. in the same year this will be treated as a single attempt.

METHOD I.

2. *Subjects of Examination.* (i.) The examination consists of the following :—

(A) A written examination, comprising :

(a) 3 compulsory subjects, namely Essay, English, and Present Day, for each of which 100 marks is allotted,

(b) a selection from the optional subjects set out in the Appendix, which is to be construed as forming part of these Regulations. Subject to the provisions in the Appendix, candidates may take optional subjects up to a total of 700 marks (making 1,000 marks in all for the written examination).

(B) Interview, comprising :

(a) a preliminary interview by a single interviewer who will supply a report for the information of the Final Interview Board,

(b) an interview before the Final Interview Board which will award a mark out of a maximum of 300 for the candidate's record, intelligence, and personal qualities.

(ii.) The final order of merit will be determined by the total marks gained in the whole examination. In the event of a tie between two or more candidates, the Commissioners will decide which to declare successful. The Commissioners may at their discretion require a candidate to attend a second time before the Final Interview Board if they consider it necessary to enable them to reach a decision.

3. *Eligibility.* Candidates must (save as provided below) be at least 20½ years and under 24 years of age on the 1st day of August 1949. But

(a) A candidate who has served or is serving on a regular (including a regular short service) engagement in H.M. Forces may deduct the period of such service from his actual age;

(b) a candidate who has served or is serving voluntarily in H.M. Forces otherwise than on a regular or short service engagement or who has performed or is performing compulsory national service under the National Service Acts may deduct the period of such service from his actual age, up to a maximum of two years.

METHOD II.

4. *Subjects of Examination.* (i.) The examination consists of the following :—

(A) A written qualifying examination consisting of two papers in English, two General Papers, and a test of General Intelligence.

(B) For candidates who pass the qualifying examination : a series of tests of personal qualities at a residential centre, followed by an interview before the Final Selection Board.

(ii.) The final order of merit will be determined by the mark awarded by the Final Selection Board out of a

maximum of 300. This will take into account the candidate's record, his intelligence and personal qualities, his work in the qualifying examination, and the report on his performance at the residential centre. In the event of a tie between two or more candidates the Commissioners will decide which to declare successful. The Commissioners may at their discretion require a candidate to attend a second time before the Final Selection Board if they consider it necessary to enable them to reach a decision.

5. *Eligibility.* (i.) *Age.* Candidates must be at least 20½ years and under 24 years of age on 1st August 1949. But—

(a) a candidate who has served or is serving on a regular (including a regular short service) engagement in H.M. Forces may deduct the period of such service from his actual age;

(b) a candidate who has served or is serving voluntarily in H.M. Forces otherwise than on a regular or short service engagement or who has performed or is performing compulsory national service under the National Service Acts may deduct the period of such service from his actual age, up to a maximum of two years.

(ii.) *Education.* Candidates must either (a) have completed a course of study for a full honours degree at a recognized University and obtained at least second class honours at their degree examination, or (b) in the last year of a course for a full honours degree at a recognised University. In the latter case, they will not be declared successful unless they can produce evidence, not later than 1st September 1949, that they have obtained at least second class honours in their degree examination.

(iii.) A candidate who has served or is serving on a regular (including a regular short service) engagement in H.M. Forces may be admitted to compete, notwithstanding that he fails to satisfy the requirements of sub-para. (ii.), if (a) he is in other respects eligible under these Regulations to compete; and (b) he is recommended to the Civil Service Commissioners by the appropriate Service Authority, as warranting consideration for appointment to the Administrative Class of the Home Civil Service by reason of his record, education, intelligence, and personal qualities.

*Methods I. and II.*

6. *Sex and Marriage.* (i.) Both men and women are eligible, but women will not ordinarily be appointed to posts in the Ministry of Defence, Admiralty, War Office, or Air Ministry.

(ii.) Married women who have formerly been established civil servants and have drawn marriage gratuity (other than those who are widows or divorced, or who are separated from their husbands, or whose husbands suffer without hope of recovery from total physical or mental incapacity) will not be eligible unless they undertake to refund on appointment the marriage gratuity paid.

7. *Nationality.* Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i.) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject, or

(ii.) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) If naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing, or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

8. *Health and Character.* Successful candidates must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character.

9. *Vacancies.* The number of vacancies to be filled from the Competition as a whole, and the number to be filled by Method I. and Method II. respectively, will be determined by the Commissioners, but the number of vacancies to be filled from Method II. will not exceed 25 per cent. of the whole.

10. *Candidates trained as Teachers.* Candidates who have been trained as teachers and upon whose training public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

11. *Assignment.* The Commissioners will decide to which Department each successful candidate is to be assigned. A candidate who declines to accept the post offered will have no claim to be assigned to another, but will be regarded as having declined appointment. Assignments will be made in

accordance with the needs of the public service, but the wishes of candidates will, where possible, be taken into account.

12. *Canvassing.* Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

13. *Fees.* The normal fee, payable by all candidates, is £1 for each attempt, and must be sent with the Application Form. A candidate who applies to compete by both Methods at different times must send the full fee with each Application Form; but one who sends in both Application Forms together may pay a reduced fee of 30s.

14. These Regulations apply to the examination of 1949, and are liable to be modified for subsequent examinations. They are issued by the Civil Service Commissioners with the approval of the Treasury.

2. Candidates may take optional subjects up to a total of 700 marks. A candidate who wishes to offer subjects the aggregate value of which exceeds 700 marks must name a subject to be valued on a reduced maximum in order to bring the aggregate to 700. This option cannot be exercised by a candidate who can reduce his aggregate to 700 by omitting one or more of the subjects he proposes to offer.

3. The following restrictions apply to particular optional subjects:—

(a) International Relations (25) may not be taken by a candidate who offers European History, Period 3 (8), or International Law (14).

(b) Greek Literature (60) may be taken only by candidates who offer Greek Translation (57), and Latin Literature (64) only by those who offer Latin Translation (61).

(c) In subjects 68 to 78 the history or literature paper associated with a language may be taken only by candidates who offer the language itself for examination.

(d) A candidate who offers one or more of the subjects French History (68), German History (71), Spanish or Italian History (74), Russian History (77), may not offer either subject 7 (European History, Period 1 or Period 2), or subject 8 (European History, Period 3).

4. A candidate desiring to offer Experimental Psychology (22) or any of the subjects 37 to 48 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training in an institution of university rank. For Astronomy (36), Engineering (49), Geography (50), and the Physical Anthropology branch of Special Anthropology (52), other equivalent training will be required. There will be no laboratory test as part of the examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination under the above Regulations will be held in London in 1949. For Method I. the written examination will begin on the 5th July 1949 and the interviews will probably extend from the middle of April till the middle of July. For Method II. the written qualifying examination will be held on the 22nd and 23rd February 1949 and the tests of personal qualities and the final interviews will be held in April and May 1949.

No person will be admitted to the examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received by the 31st December 1948 for candidates competing under Method II., or 31st January 1949 for candidates competing under Method I., an application, in the candidate's own handwriting, on the prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.
