## WHITEHALL, JUNE 6, 1809.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Sir Ruper George, Knt., Ambrose Serle, James Bowen, Esquires, the Honourable John Douglas, John Harness, Doctor in Physic, and the Honourable Courtenay Boyle, to be his Majesty's Commissioners for conducting the transport service, for the care of sick and wounded seamen, and for the care and custody of prisoners of war.

## WESTMINSTER, JUNE 15, 1809.

This day the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molineux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of his Majesty's Commission for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to bear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An act for enabling his Majesty to raise the sum of 3,000,000l. for the service of Great Britain.

An act to amend several acts, made in the Parliament of Ireland, for granting life annuities, with the benefit of survivorship.

An act to rectify a mistake in an act, made in this session of Parliament, for continuing and making perpetual several duties of 1s. 6d. on offices and employments.

An act to continue, until the 25th day of March 1810, an act of this present session of Parliament, to suspend the importation of British or Irish made spirits into Great Britain or Ireland respectively.

An act to continue, until the 25th day of March 1811, an act of the 45th year of his present Majesty, for appointing Commissioners to inquire into the public expenditure, and the conduct of the public business in the military departments therein mentioned.

An act to amend an act, passed in the 44th year of his present Majesty, to provide for the defence of the realm, with respect to the purchase of lands and hereditaments for the public service.

An act for better regulating the office of Agent-General for volunteers and local militia.

An act to amend the several acts for securing the collection of the duties on auctions in Ireland.

An act to amend an act made in the last session of Parliament, for making provision for the building and rebuilding of churches, chapels, and glebe-houses in Ireland.

An act to amend the several acts, for the regulating and securing the collection of the duties on spirits distilled in Ireland, and for the regulating the sale of such liquors by retail.

An act to regulate the fees payable by persons charged with treason, felony, and all other offences, at assizes and quarter sessions in Ireland, and for amending an act of the Parliament of Ireland, made in the 36th year of his present Majesty, relating thereto.

An act for the more effectual recovery of penalties and forfeitures incurred in the British colonies and plantations in America.

An act for allowing further time for taking goods out of warehouse, and paying duties thereon.

An act to appoint Commissioners to inquire and examine, until the 1st day of August 1811, into the nature and extent of the several bogs in Ireland, and the practicability of draining and cultivating them, and the best means of effecting the same.

An act to amend the several acts respecting the payment of wages, and prize-money, and allotment of wages to persons serving in his Majesty's royal navy.

An act to repeal several acts respecting the woollen manufacture, and to amend other acts relating to the said manufacture; and for allowing persons employed in any branch of the woollen manufacture to set up trade in any place in Great Britain.

An act for reviving, continuing, and amending an

act, passed in the 26th year of his present Majesty, for laying a toll upon all horses and carriages passing upon a Sunday over Blackfriars Bridge, and for applying the money to arise thereby towards increasing the fund for watching, lighting, cleansing, watering, and repairing the said bridge.
