The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz.:—

REGULATIONS FOR THE RECRUITMENT OF YOUNG MEN WHO HAVE COMPLETED A PERIOD OF COMPULSORY NATIONAL SERVICE FOR THE EXECUTIVE CLASS (AND CORRESPONDING DEPARTMENTAL Classes) and the Information Officer Class of the Home CIVIL SERVICE.

- 1. Nationality.—Candidates must be British sul They must also satisfy one of the following conditions: subjects.
 - (a) If natural-born British subjects they must either-
 - (i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a
 - British subject; or

 (ii) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or
 been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for
 at least five years out of the last eight years preceding
 the date of their appointment.
 - (b) If naturalized British subjects they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years

out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour

- that an exception may properly be made in their favour 2. Education. No precise educational qualifications are pres r bed, but candidates will be expected to have attained the standard of education of persons who have had whole time systematic education up to the age of at least 17 years.

 3. Service. Candidates must have completed before the first day of the examination a period of compulsory hatforal service under the National Service Acts, they may not make more than two attempts in all and these must be made multiple than the third examination held under these Regulations after he completion of national service. The date officially recorded as the last day of national service is normally the last day of demobilisation or release leave; candidates are not, however, precluded from competing at an examination not. however, precluded from competing at an examination held during the r demobilisation or release leave.
- 4. Health and Character. Successful candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners as to their health and character.

5. Examination. The candidates will undergo a written examination consisting of papers in English and Arithmetic, three General Papers, and a test of General Intelligence.

Of the candidates who obtain the highe marks in the written amination a certain number, to be fixed by the Commi sioners, will be summoned to an interview at which the Interview at Papers. for h r cord and personal qua te

- 6 Cand dates Traned as Teachers.—Candidats who have been trained as tea hers and upon whose training public money has been spent, cannot be appointed until the con ent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Mini try of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.
- 7. Assignment.—The Commissioners will decide to which Department each successful candidate is to be assigned. candidate who declines to accept the post offered will have no claim to be assigned to another, but will be regarded as having declined appointment. Assignments will be made in accordance with the needs of the public service, but the wishes of candidates will, where possible, be taken into account.
- A fee of 15s. is payable by all candidates. This must be sent with the application form, and is not returnable

in any circumstances.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination will be held under the above Regulations commencing on the 4th July 1950.

No person will be admitted to the Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 20th April 1950, an application on the prescribed form which may be obtained from the the prescribed form which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.
