

Civil Service Commission,

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz. :—

RECRUITMENT UNDER NORMAL REGULATIONS TO THE SITUATION OF OFFICER OF CUSTOMS AND EXCISE (MALE).

1. No candidate may compete more than twice in all under Normal Regulations and under Reconstruction Regulations for the situation of Officer of Customs and Excise.

2. Age.

Candidates must be at least 19 and under 21 years of age on the 1st March 1951, but—

(a) a candidate who has served or is serving on a regular (including a regular short-service) engagement in H.M. Forces may deduct the period of such service from his actual age;

(b) a candidate who has served in H.M. Forces otherwise than on a regular engagement may deduct the period of such service from his actual age, up to a maximum of two years;

(c) candidates who have served in any established post to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding two years which they have spent in such service before 1st March 1951.

3. Sex and Marriage.

Men only are eligible.

4. Nationality.

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions :—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either—

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or,

(ii) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) If naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph, they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing, or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

5. Health and Character.

Successful candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners as to their health and character.

(B) Interview 400

The Interview will be held at a later date than the written examination. Of the candidates who obtain the highest aggregate marks in the written examination a certain number, to be determined by the Civil Service Commissioners, will be summoned to interview. The final order of merit will be made up by combining the results of the two parts of the examination. Candidates must obtain such an aggregate of marks in the examination as a whole as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

7. Candidates Trained as Teachers.

Candidates who have been trained as teachers and upon whose training public money has been spent, cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

8. Fee.

A fee of 15s. is payable by all candidates. This must be sent with the application form and it not returnable in any circumstances.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination will be held under the above Regulations, commencing on the 16th May 1951.

No person will be admitted to the Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 8th March 1951, an application on the prescribed form which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH FOR SCOTLAND.

PUBLIC HEALTH (IMPORTED FOOD) (SCOTLAND) REGULATIONS, 1937 TO 1948.

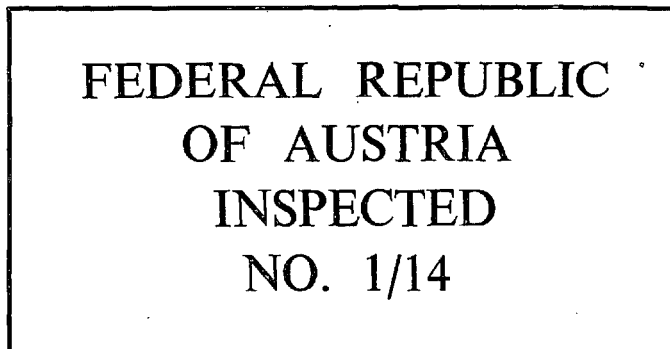
The Secretary of State for Scotland gives notice, in pursuance of the above-named Regulations, that he hereby recognizes the Official Certificate, of which particulars are given in the Schedule hereto, as showing (a) that the meat from which the meat product to which the Certificate relates was prepared, was derived from animals inspected ante- and post-mortem and passed in accordance with criteria satisfactory to the Secretary of State, and (b) that all necessary precautions for the prevention of danger to public health were taken in the preparing and packing of the meat product.

The Certificate being in the form of a label or stamp, recognition will apply only if the label is securely affixed to, or the stamp is clearly impressed on, the package containing the meat product and if the label or stamp has not in any other circumstances or on any other occasion been used as an Official Certificate.

SCHEDULE.

FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF AUSTRIA.

For canned meat products and other cooked meat products a label or stamp having on it the following design :—



In place of the numbers 1/14, other numbers may be inserted.
