

The Procession moved up the Nave, headed by the Choir and Clergy, and the opening Sentences of the Burial Service were chanted by the Choir.

The Earl Marshal, The Lord Chamberlain and the Lord Steward walked immediately in front of the Coffin, which was followed by The Queen, the other Members of the Royal Family, the Royal representatives, and the remainder of the Procession.

HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN stood at the Head of the Coffin.

The Lord Chamberlain took his place at the Foot of the Coffin.

The Lesson was read by The Bishop of Winchester. The Hymn "The Strife is o'er" was then sung and the Sentence "I heard a Voice from Heaven" was sung by the Choir.

The Prayers were said by The Archbishop of Canterbury and The Archbishop of York, and the Dean of Windsor.

Garter King of Arms pronounced the Styles of His late Majesty ;

" Thus it hath pleased Almighty God to take out of this transitory life unto His Divine Mercy the
" late Most High, Most Mighty, and Most Excellent Monarch, George the Sixth, by the Grace
" of God, of Great Britain, Ireland, and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender
" of the Faith, and Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

" Let us humbly beseech Almighty God to bless with long life, health, and honour, and all worldly
" happiness, the Most High, Most Mighty, and Most Excellent Monarch, our Sovereign Lady,
" Elizabeth the Second, now, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, Ireland, and the British
" Dominions beyond the Seas, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and Sovereign of the Most Noble
" Order of the Garter."

" GOD SAVE THE QUEEN."

The Choir sang " God be in my head and in my understanding " and The Archbishop of Canterbury then pronounced the Benediction.

The King's Company Colour of the Grenadier Guards was handed to The Queen by Colonel G. C. Gordon Lennox, D.S.O., Lieutenant-Colonel Commanding Grenadier Guards and placed on the Coffin by Her Majesty.

H.E. Monsieur Queuille (member of the French Delegation), H.R.H. Princess Yukanthor (representing the King of Cambodia), and Monsieur Ourot Souvannavong (representing the King of Laos), were present amongst the distinguished guests in the Chapel, as was also Madame Ofelia Segreda de Wright (representing the Republic of Costa Rica) : the Principality of Liechtenstein was represented by the Swiss representative.

His Majesty's Body Guard of the Honourable Corps of Gentlemen at Arms were on duty in the Nave of the Chapel.

Minute Guns were fired in the Long Walk at Windsor while the Procession moved from Windsor Station to St. George's Chapel.
