

appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

11. *Assignment.*

Candidates will be considered for all the posts for which they are eligible under these Regulations; they will, however, be asked to state on their Application Forms their preferences among the four Departments. The Commissioners will decide to which Department each successful candidate is to be assigned. Assignments will be made in accordance with the needs of the public service and the candidates' suitability for particular Departments, but the wishes of candidates will, where possible, be taken into account. Candidates' suitability for Departments will be assessed by the Interview Board.

The names of the successful candidates will be issued in four lists according to the Departments to which they are assigned; a candidate who declines to accept the post for which he is declared successful will have no claim to be assigned to another.

A candidate cannot be considered for appointment as J.I.B. Officer, Grade III, in the Ministry of Defence, unless (a) as a Method I candidate he includes in his optional subjects one or more of the following:—(29) General Economics, (30) Industry and Trade, (33) Social Economics, (34, 35) Economic History, (36) Economic Statistics, (47, 48) Geology, (54) Geography, or (b) as a Method II candidate his degree is in economic subjects, geology, or geography.

12. *Canvassing.*

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

13. *Fees.*

The total fee payable by all candidates is £2 for either Method separately, and £3 for both Methods. Of this £1 must be paid on application.

2. Candidates may take optional subjects up to a total of 500 marks. A candidate who wishes to offer subjects the aggregate value of which exceeds 500 marks must name a subject to be marked on a reduced maximum in order to bring the aggregate to 500. This option cannot be exercised by a candidate who can reduce his aggregate to 500 by omitting one or more of the subjects he proposes to offer.

3. The following restrictions apply to particular optional subjects:—

(a) Industry and Trade (30), Money, Banking, and Exchange (31), Public Finance (32), Social Economic (33), may be taken only by candidates who offer General Economics (29) or any two of the following:—History of Political Thought (24), Political Theory (25), Political Organisation (26), Modern British Government (27).

(b) International Relations (28), may not be taken by a candidate who offers European History, Period 3 (8) or International Law (15).

(c) Candidates may not offer more than two of the three periods of English Literature (59-61).

(d) Greek Literature (68) may be taken only by candidates who offer Greek Translation (65), and Latin Literature (72) only by those who offer Latin Translation (69).

4. A candidate desiring to offer Experimental Psychology (23) or any of the subjects 41 to 52 must produce evidence satisfactory to the Civil Service Commissioners of laboratory training of university standard. For Astronomy (40), and Engineering (53) equivalent training will be required. There will be no laboratory test as part of the examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competition will be held under the above Regulations, the written examination under Method I being held in July 1953, and that under Method II in January 1953.

No person will be admitted to the Competition from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received on or before the 29th November 1952, for candidates competing under Method II or 28th February 1953, for candidates competing under Method I, an application on the prescribed form which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.
