A candidate cannot be considered for appointment as J.I.B. Officer, Grade III, in the Ministry of Defence unless

(a) as a Method I candidate he includes in his optional subjects one or more of the following: (30) General Economics, (31) Industry and Trade, (34) Social Economics, (35, 36) Economic History, (37) Economic Statistics, (51), 52) Geology, (55) Physical Geography, (56) Human Geography, (57) Geography of the British Isles, (93) Russian Language, (94, 95) Russian Civilisation; or (b) as a Method II candidate his degree course has (b) as a Method II candidate his degree course has included the study of one or more of the above as a main subject.

12. Canyassing.

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

The total fee payable by all candidates is £2 for either Method separately, and £3 for both Methods. Of this £1 must be paid on application.

Candidates may take optional subjects up to a total of 500 marks. A candidate who wishes to offer subjects the aggregate value of which exceeds 500 marks must name a subject to be marked on a reduced maximum in order to bring the aggregate to 500. This option cannot be exercised by a candidate who can reduce his aggregate to 500 by omitting one or more of the subjects he proposes to offer.

- 3. The following restrictions apply to particular optional subjects:
 - (a) Industry and Trade (31), Money, Banking, and Exchange (32), Public Finance (33), Social Economics (34), may be taken only by candidates who offer General Economics (30) or any two of the following: History of Political Thought (25), Political Theory (26), Political Organisation (27), Modern British Government (28).
 - (b) International Relations (29), may not be taken by a candidate who offers European History, Period III (8) or International Law (17).

(c) Subjects 44-54

- (i) Natural Science (Essay Paper) (44) may be taken only by candidates who offer one or more of the subjects 45-54.
- (ii) Candidates may not offer more than three of the subjects Chemistry, Part I (45), Physics, Part I (47), Botany, Part I (49), Geology, Part I (51), Zoology, Part I (53).
- (d) Candidates may not offer more than two of the three periods of English Literature (63-65).
- (e) Greek Literature (72) may be taken only by candidates who offer Greek Translation (69), and Latin Literature (76) only by those who offer Latin Translation (73).
- (f) Candidates will not be permitted to offer subjects totalling more than 400 marks in either language or literature. English Literature, Latin, and Greek come under this rule as well as modern foreign languages. Thus no candidate may offer French Language, German Language, and Spanish Language, or French Civilisation, German Civilisation, and English Literature. The papers on the History of the French Language, the History of the German Language, Old English, Middle English, and English Criticism, do not come within the scope of this restriction. this restriction.
