The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council WHEREAS by Section 65 of the Merchant Shipping (Safety and Load Line Conventions) Act, 1932 (22 & 23 Geo. 5, c. 9), it is enacted that Her Majesty, if satisfied that the Government of any country has ratified, acceded to, or denounced the Load Line Convention or that the Load Line Convention has been applied or has ceased to apply to any country, in pursuance of the provisions of Article 21 thereof, may, by Order in Council, make a declaration to that effect:

And whereas Her Majesty is satisfied that the Governments of the countries specified in Part I of the Schedule to this Order have acceeded to the Load Line Convention; and that the Load Line Convention has been applied to the country specified in Part II of the said Schedule
