8. Competition

(i) The Commissioners may at their discretion summon

candidates to a preliminary informal interview.

(ii) A certain number of the candidates will be chosen on the basis of the information available, to appear before a Selection Board appointed by the Commissioners.

(iii) The decision of the Commissioners will be final.

9. Assignment

It will rest with the Commissioners to determine the Department to which each successful candidate shall be assigned. In making the assignments the Commissioners will be guided by the requirements of the public service but the wishes of candidates will be met as far as possible.

10. Fee

A successful candidate will be required to pay a fee of £2 before the issue of a certificate of qualification for appoint-
