## 5. Health and Character.

Successful candidates must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character,

### 6. Application.

Only one application may be made for the competition governed by these Regulations.

# 1. Competition.

Those candidates who on the evidence of the application forms, and any further information which the Commissioners think necessary to obtain, are found to be prima facie eligible, will be summoned to a Selection Board. The Commissioners may, if they see fit, summon only those candidates who by reason of their experience and qualifications appear to be most suitable for appointment. The Selection Board will take into consideration the candidates' record of experience and training, any recommendation from persons named by the candidates as having direct knowledge of their work in the past, and the personal qualities of the candidates as shown at the interview. The decision of the Commissioners will be final.

#### 8. Candidates Trained as Teachers.

Persons upon whose training, elsewhere than in England or Wales, for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent, cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority (e.g., the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

#### 9. Assignment.

The Commissioners will decide to which Department each successful candidate is to be assigned. Assignment will be made in accordance with the needs of the public service but the wishes of candidates will, where possible, be respected.

#### 10. Canvassing.

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their application through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named in their application forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

#### 11 Fee

A successful candidate will be required to pay a fee of £4 before the issue of a Certificate of Qualification for appointment.
